

## A STATESMANLIKE APPEAL

"To you my fellow-countrymen of New Brunswick, I now appeal. The issue is in the hands of the Canadian people. Let New Brunswick do as she did last time; let Quebec do the same—and she will do it let me tell you—(loud applause)—and within three months the great boon of reciprocity will be ours. I appeal to you to support a policy of moderation and conciliation in developing a united Canadian nationhood. I appeal to you against the unholy alliance of the Nationalists in Quebec and the jingoes in the other Provinces. In my own Province I am branded by the trumpets and organs of Bourassa and his allies as a traitor to the French race. In other Provinces I am denounced by the jingoes as a traitor to the Empire. What I have sought to be is a true Canadian and true British subject. I have kept the double connection before me throughout the whole of my public service. It has been to me my cloud by day and my pillar of fire by night. I have followed its leading earnestly faithfully, and I hope, may I believe, with happy results to the best development of the highest lines of our Dominion. I thank you for the four times you have endorsed that aim by your votes, and I depend upon you, I am sure, as sure as I am of the verdict of my own Province of Quebec for the renewed triumph of that policy on September 21." ## A MAINE VIEW OF RECIPROCITY

WITHOUT WARNING A CLAP OF THUNDER BROKE OVER THEIR HEADS AND MANY, VERY MANY, OF OUR WORTHY CITIZENS WERE DAZED AND STUNNED. THE THUNDER PROVED TO BE PRESIDENT TAFT'S RECIPROCITY SCHEME AND AROOSTOOK'S ENTERPRISING CITIZENS ARE STILL DAZED AND BLINDED BY THE DARK CLOUD THAT HANGS OVER THE LAND. Today the Garden of Maine is filled with gloom. SHOULD, THIS ATROCIOUS BILL become a law Aroostook is doomed. Don't try to tell us to cheer up and look pleasant. WE HAVE CANADA ON THREE SIDES OF US AND KNOW ALL THE CONDITIONS. HUNDREDS OF CANADIANS COME ANNUALLY TO AROOSTOOK. THEY BURN THEIR BRIDGES BEHIND THEM BY SELLING THEIR FARMS AND HOMES FOR A SONG AND BUY LAND IN AROOSTOOK THAT COSTS \$100 PER ACRE. They are thrifty citizens, soon pay for their farms and become independent. In New Brunswick they barely make a living. CANADIAN MERCHANTS THAT CAME HERE TEN YEARS AGO HAVE PROSPERED. SOME OF THEM COULD NOW BUY EVERY STORE ON THE ST. JOHN RIVER BETWEEN GRAND FALLS AND WOODSTOCK. AND STILL IN THE TWO COUNTRIES THAT LIE SIDE BY SIDE, THERE IS THE SAME RICH SOIL UNDER FOOT, THE SAME BLUE SKY OVER HEAD AND THE SAME BREED OF PEOPLE.

Party lines have vanished in Aroostook. There are good Christian people here who would feel like assassinating President Taft and using his body for a fox bait. ## FRAME UP IN GOTCH-HACK MATCH SPOILS WRESTLING

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Followers of the wrestling game today question the announced reasons for the Empire A. C. calling off bers on the Gotch-Hackenschmidt match yesterday, which action gave the first intimation to the crowd that all might not be well with one of the men.

Sporting men remember bygone days when bets on the ring encounters were called off by the referee in the ring. This was generally taken to mean that something crooked was being planned behind the scenes, and the desire to protect the public was the reason for calling off all bets, thus forcing both men to fight at their best.

It is now plainly evident that Hackenschmidt knew long before the day of the match that he had no chance of winning and that he went into the ring merely that he might collect the money for himself and others concerned. His miserable excuse that he had heard Gotch had been injured and therefore thought one "poison" would counteract the other, is not accepted. He was not a fit man to enter the ring and, in justice to the thousands who had paid high prices to see a real wrestling match, should never have attempted the bout.

There is furthermore, a general impression that this was known to others. That his own camp followers knew of his poor condition, there is no doubt and it is thought that there was more than the feelings of the various parties mentioned in the calling off of bets.

Hackenschmidt deceived the public without a quiver, allowing reports to be sent out daily from his camp that he was loafing because he did not need any more work, that he was fit to meet the best man in the world. That wrestling has received a black eye there is no doubt, and that Monday's attendance will stand as a record for many years to come is a certainty. ## CHARACTER OF TORY MEETINGS IN YORK CO.

Described as Insulting to Intelligent and Thoughtful People in the Constituency

THE SMALL ATTENDANCE THUS ACCOUNTED FOR

Sample of Arguments by Another Who Sees Things as They Are

To the Editor of The Mail

Sir.—I read a letter in a newspaper a day or two ago having reference to the poorly informed class of speakers, some of them mere boys, whom the Conservative managers in this county are sending out to the country to talk to the farmers on the subject of the day. I agree with all that the correspondent says, but I will go further and say, and I say it with regret, that in sending out such men to address public audiences, the Conservative managers are offering an insult to the intelligence of the farmers of this county. Now, I am not a Conservative, and although a Liberal, I am not a partizan. As a traveller I have to go about the country a good deal, and I not only get the opportunity in this way to attend many of the political meetings in this campaign, but to hear afterwards the candid opinion of farmers who have attended the meetings.

I am not even a voter in York, but from what I have seen and heard I am not surprised that intelligent and thoughtful Conservatives decline to take interest in the party's affairs, and that hundreds of them have gone over to the other side, ashamed of their former company, and disgusted with the Crockett clique management of their party's affairs.

This campaign has shown me just why the Conservatives are losing ground in this county. I have heard Fred Robinson, Duncan Thomas, E. T. McLeod, R. B. Hanson, Lewis Bliss, Percy Guthrie, J. K. Pinder—not, of course, all at one meeting—perhaps the greatest aggregation of presumption and ignorance that I have ever listened to. At one of the homes at which I stopped after one of the meetings, the man of the house said to me:

"Heavens, isn't that the worst drive you ever listened to? If a boy of mine had that presumption as went upon the platform and displayed such ignorance I would consider it my duty as a father to thrash him soundly."

I heard Mr. Pinder growl and scold by the hour because H. F. McLeod was taken into the Hazen cabinet over his head. That, he said, was the reason why he had an incurable grouch. He had been promised a portfolio by Hazen, but when the time came to deliver the goods he was simply turned down flat. Now he was compelled to sit back and watch McLeod draw a fat salary while all he got was his sessional indemnity, and part of that was deducted for stampage.

I have heard H. F. McLeod declare at a meeting that American people were not importers as they could raise all that the country could consume and more besides; and therefore the great market was not open to Canada—and this said in the presence of men who have been shipping lamb's, potatoes and turnips to the United States for years.

I have heard O. S. Crockett, the Conservative candidate, childishly urge that Reciprocity was a good thing fifteen years ago when he supported it, but it was of no benefit now because conditions have changed probably meaning that he had changed his politics.

I have heard Dr. B. M. Mullin, at several meetings, put on a high class stunt in imitation of a "wind-bag." I have also heard Fred Robinson, the gentleman farmer of the Nashwaakiss, who, like the majority of Tory orators in York, holds a Hazen government job, tell the farmers how they should conduct themselves in order to be prosperous. I was employed at the cheek of the fellow, and when I was told by a farmer at the close of the meeting that he (Robinson) had himself made a dismal failure of farming on a farm which he got for nothing; that he had recently assigned with assets nil, and had stuck most of his personal friends, including O. S. Crockett, to the tune of hundreds of dollars, I said to myself:

"What fools these mortals be to listen to such a presumptuous wretch."

## UNDER TORY RULE.

"Under the Conservative regime people were flying from Canada as from a plague-stricken country. 
