Score 19 to 13--Game Very Ordinary Exhibition and College Team Weak--Finley and Latham Starred for Visitors, Rigby and McKnight for U. N. B.

The U. N. B. basketball team lost 19 to 13 to the St. John Y. M. C. A. team at the College gym. The game was played before a slim audience and was not distinguished by anything extraordinary in the way of playing. The defeat was the first ever administered to a U. N. B. five on its own floor. The team that wore the Red and Black however, did not play much like U. N. B. teams have in the past. The veterans Rigby and McKnight were there but it was only occasionally that they showed flashes of their old time form. As far as combination was concerned St. John had what their was. The Red and Black failed to get the ball to their scoring man and the shooting was poor. The same was true of the St. John team which would have run up a bigger score if it had had any luck in locating the baskets.

Fred Finley who scored the try which beat the U. N. B. football team in their game with the Algonquins here on Thanksgiving Day was the bright star for St. John with Latham also showing up well. Rigby and McKnight were the best of the U. N. B. team.

U. N. B. TEAM WEAK

The U. N. B. team was weak. Kinghorn one of the strongest players was off on account of sickness and his absence was felt. Late in the game Joe Alexander went on at centre and Jennings replaced Laughlin. The shake-up made little difference however. St. John scoring with the new men on. The college team did not go on the floor at all confident and the result of the game justified that lack of confidence. There will

have to be a lot of hard work done to get the team into shape.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
