FREDERICTON MAN ON TRIP TO ALASKA

(Seattle Post-Intelligencer)

H. Disston of Henry Disston & Sons, saw manufacturers of Philadelphia, is at the New Washington with Mrs. Disston and F. A. Janney, formerly of Paris, France, but now of Fredericton, N. B., they having just returned from a hunting expedition in Alaska, arriving Tuesday on the Humboldt.

After a day's rest Mr. Disston consented to talk yesterday of his trip. The party had sailed North on Sept. 8, traveled by rail from Skagway to White Horse, thence drove by buckboard over a trail 140 miles to the village of Silver on Klunene lake, whence a journey into a practically unknown region was begun.

At Silver guides and helpers were met, a pack train of eighteen horses was equipped, and the party, now numbering nine, rode into the White river country for 125 miles. After the first day out all trails were left behind, and Mr. Disston and his friends found themselves in a virgin hunting territory, with big game abounding. The country was wild and mountainous, and on Sept. 25 a heavy snow storm covered mountains and valleys. The temperature varied from zero to 15 degrees below and once went down to 35 below, but after the single storm the weather was clear.

Caribou, mountain sheep, and bears were plentiful, and ptarmigan also abounded. The party brought back eleven fine caribou heads, three of the largest being shot by Mrs. Disston. Six sheep and a huge grizzly were included in the trophies.

Mr. Disston hopes to return to the same district at an early date. His party leaves for the East today.

NEW STEAMSHIP LINE TO AUSTRALIA

St. John, N. B., Dec. 5—Today saw the inauguration of a new steamship service between St. John and New Zealand and Australian ports, including Melbourne, Auckland and Sydney. Two first-class steamships, the Waiwera and Wakanui, will engage in the service.

HOW CROOKS WORK SOME OIL STOCKS

The Alberta Oil Company—the same concern which Saturday Night wrote of in business in Toronto some time since—figures as an obsolete company in a book compiled by R. M. Smythe, the title of which is "Obsolete American Companies." According to this list there are 28,000 concerns which took money from the credulous public, and afterwards were wound up. The author gives the following interesting account of how expert promoters work their tricks to the detriment of purchasers of their worthless stocks:

"The promoters purchase one-sixteenth of an acre and organize four companies, each company owning one-quarter of the one-sixteenth of an acre. At the centre of this plot, where the properties of the four companies join, a well is drilled, each company owning one-fourth of the well. They proceed to issue certificates of stock, and declare that they are now actively drilling on their property. If this one well strikes oil, all four companies notify their stockholders that they have struck oil. When a well does not strike oil, the four companies stop business, and the promoter moves to another one-sixteenth of an acre to organize four more companies."

SOLD \$6,000,000 OF BANK STOCKS

Wall Street, Dec. 2—The National City Co., the so-called holding concern of the National City Bank, announced yesterday that it had completed the sale of its holdings of shares in other banks.

The largest block of any other institution's shares owned by the National City Co., was that of the National Bank of Commerce, which was sold to various interests and individuals connected with that institution. The market value of the entire holdings of the National City Co. was estimated at more than \$6,000,000.

Fluctuations in American Tobacco over the past six months have shown big possibilities for the number of traders that operate in the crowd.

Just before the Supreme Court decision the stock touched the highest price in its history, which was 520; afterwards it rapidly declined until it sold at 365, which was the low price on the decline. Since that time it has touched 511.

Traders continue a big factor in the stock, but it is not believed that the majority have made much money in their operations. It is a good deal of a buzz-saw.

RAPID RISE IN VALUES
"Toronto Saturday Night" states that a year ago English holders of an option on the North Dome property did not take up the option, which was for \$20,000.

Since the above said event, a shaft has been sunk to the forty foot level and the property sold to the Temiskaming Company, through that company's president, at the fancy price of \$229,000.

The appreciation in the market price of some out-of-town properties is almost as great as that of real estate on St. James or St. Catherine streets, Montreal.

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BOSTON AND ST. JOHN MARKET PRICES

(St. John Telegraph)

For several weeks The Telegraph has given its readers each Friday a list of the prices obtained in the local markets as compared with those in the Boston markets. A further comparison is made this morning and as on all previous occasions shows a wide divergence with the difference in favor of the Boston markets. In Boston, Canadian hay, for instance at jobber's prices brings \$25 to \$25.50 per ton, while here in St. John the farmer receives but from \$10.50 to \$11 per ton. In Boston hennery eggs are selling as high as fifty-five cents a dozen while in St. John the farmers realize forty cents a dozen. Wholesale quotations and jobber's prices are alone given. The following are quoted:

Canadian hay, jobber's price—St. John, \$10.50 to \$11; Boston \$25. to \$25.50.

Western oats, average weights—St. John, 51c. to 53c; Boston 55c to 55½c. Potatoes—St. John, \$1.50 to \$1.75 per barrel of 160 pounds; Boston, \$2.05 to \$2.15 per bag of 120 pounds. Apples, King—St. John, \$2.25 to \$2.00 per barrel, Boston \$3 to \$4 per barrel.

Turnips—St. John, 75c per barrel Boston \$1.10 to \$1.35 per barrel (in Boston turnips have gone up 10c per barrel in the last two weeks while in St. John the price has remained stationary.

Turkey—St. John, 20c to 22c per pound; Boston, Northern fancy, 25c. to 27c per pound, western fresh killed, choice 20c to 21c per pound.

Butter, dairy by the tub—St. John 21c to 24c per pound; Boston creamery by the tub, 35c to 35½c per pound, (jobber's price)

Butter, creamery prints—St. John, wholesale price 24c to 27c per pound; Boston, jobber's price 35c to 35½c per pound.

Eggs, hennery—St. John 40c, a dozen, Boston, 53c to 55c a dozen.

FARMERS SELL TO U.S. AND PAY THE DUTY

The Boston News Bureau points out the difference in the market price of Canadian and United States grain, in the following despatch from St. Paul, Minn.

"Prices for grain in Winnipeg and Minneapolis have varied considerably the past week and many farmers are hauling their grain across the border into North Dakota, paying the duty and still making fancy profits on their crop over what they would have got in Winnipeg."

"During the week, price of oats between Minnesota and Canada markets varied nine cents, barley 54, flax, 17 cents all higher in Minneapolis than Winnipeg. The price on wheat varies in the same way from seven to nine cents in favor of Minneapolis."

"Instances are cited of many farmers in Manitoba driving across the border with their grain. A farmer of Manther, Man., hauled 500 bushels of barley to an American market, paid the duty and cleared 18 cents over the Canadian price."

Another farmer near Manning paid \$64 duty on four loads and realized \$15 over his home price.
