**HOCKEY POT IS BOILING  
MERRILY AMONG BIG CLUBS**

Horace Gaul, Veteran of Many Seasons Bound for the Coast--Fred Taylor's Position Still in Doubt  
--George Kennedy Says Canadiens will be Strong

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—The hockey pot is starting to simmer, and in the course of the next few days will possibly reach the boiling point. The Patricks have already rifled the east of half its stars for the British Columbia League but are apparently not content until they get them all. Just at present they are after Fred Taylor, the biggest card the N.H.A. has, and are so determined to take him out to the west that they ask him to name his own price. Taylor announces he will probably go. Last summer Frank Patrick, who has the Vancouver Club in hand, told Taylor he would like to have him with him, but at that time it was not known that Renfrew intended to disband. When Patrick learned of the distribution of the Renfrew players about the N.H.A. and of Taylor's disinclination to play in Montreal he wired him to come out to the coast at his own price. It is well known that Marty Walsh and Albert Kerr only have to say the word and the Patricks will rush transportation for them to trek for the Pacific slope at once.

**GAUL FOR WEST.**

Horace Gaul, the well known hockey and lacrosse player of Ottawa, is the latest to respond to the call of the west. Gaul will leave within the next fortnight for the coast, where he will play with one of the clubs in the British Columbia League. In all probability he will take up his residence permanently on the coast and may be a lacrosse "come-back" next summer. Gaul's hockey experience has been varied. He has played with Pittsburg, Renfrew, Haileybury, Ottawa, and in the Ontario Professional League, and is recognized as one of the most finished stick handlers in the game. He was the leading scorer in the International League five seasons ago.

**STELLARTON GETS SOME  
MORE FAST QUES**

J. D. Keith, Stellarton, has purchased The Peer at the New York horse sale, bought two others. He bought the fourth horse offered at the sale, Rundemere, 4862, own brother to Baronhurst (3), 2.274, by Moko, dam Ozanam, 2.07 (winner of the Transylvania 1902) by Axtell. Rundemere is a bay stallion, foaled in 1907, stands 16 hands, and an ideal road horse. He has received only a limited amount of training, but he has the ear-marks of a fast one. He also purchased the weanling Billy Judy, by Foros, 2.224 at 4 years, by Bingen dam Frances Wilkes by Charley Wilkes.

Mr. Keith has secured a richly bred horse in The Peer, who is the sire of Cascade (4), 2.084, and Patrick, 2.151, and others, is own brother to Grace (1), 2.204, and out of own sister of Teir-at-Law, 2.051, and Prince Regent, 2.164. The top lines of his pedigree, Chimes-Mambino King, are the same as produced The Abbott, 2.031. He has a record of 2.154, has a trial of 2.114, though his speed development has been meagre. He is one of the most perfect products of Village Farm breeding, and Mr. Keith is to be congratulated on bringing such valuable stock to the country.

**WANDERERS WANT HIM.**

The Montreal Herald has the following:  
With regard to the story from Ottawa to the effect that the Western Hockey League clubs were after Fred Taylor, President Sam Lichtenhein of the Wanderers, said:

"If Taylor wants to go west we can't get hold of him and pull him back, but Taylor passed his word to me that he would play with the Wanderers if I could assure him that his position in the Civil Service would be there for him at the end of the season. I expressed myself as perfectly satisfied with the salary we offered him, but he wanted to feel sure that he could get back to his job in the spring. I am doing all I know to get the necessary assurance from Ottawa that he can get back in the spring. That's all I have to say about the Taylor matter."

**KENNEDY TALKS.**

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—"Nothing to all this talk of Taylor going west," said George Kennedy. "I have pretty good information that Taylor will figure with the Wanderers this year. He is trying to get three months' leave of absence in order to join the team in Montreal, and it is a cinch that he won't throw up his job to chase out to the Patricks."

Kennedy claims that he will have a better team than he had last year. "I have some pretty nifty men trying for a place on that team, and I will give possibly twenty men a try-out," he announced. "While most of the old men are left, I will have a couple of new stars that should make good in any company. The Canadiens will be just as strong as ever this winter."

**TUCUMSEHS OF TORONTO  
AFTER OTTAWA AMATEURS**

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—The Tecumsehs are after several of the amateur stars in Ottawa. Geo. Gorman, who played on the Capital Lacrosse team and is now with the Tecumsehs, is acting as a scout for the Lol Solman's Indians. He has written several of the hockey stars here, and will be in Ottawa shortly to attempt to arrange for their playing with the Tecumsehs this year.

Broadbent is one of the men whom the Tecumsehs are after. He is one of the best right wings in the country, and it is claimed has been offered a place on the Wanderers. Allan Kerr, of the New Edinburgh team, has also received an offer from the Indians.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate and erect a house worth \$300.00.
