ENDS BITTER FIGHT

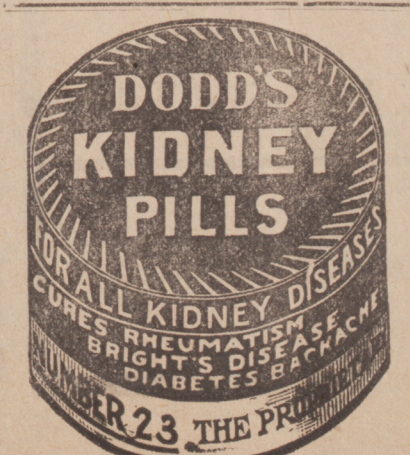
Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 4.—Amid a blaze of oratorical pyrotechnics and political rallies, the bitterest municipal campaign in the history of Los Angeles came to an end today. Tomorrow the voters of the city, among them 75,000 women to whom the right of suffrage has been given by the recent amendment of the State constitution, will elect a mayor, members of the city council and other city officials. Public interest centers chiefly in the contest for the mayoralty between George Alexander, the present mayor and the choice of the good government forces for re-election, and Job Harriman, the candidate of the Socialist and the labor union. In the primaries Harriman polled a larger vote than any of the other candidates, which has led his supporters to predict his election tomorrow. The woman vote, however, is an unknown quantity and the campaign managers on both sides admit that it will decide the election.

TO IMPROVE UNITED STATES WATERWAYS

Washington, D.C., Dec. 5.—Senators, representatives, diplomats and other persons high in official life are here to take part in the eighth annual convention of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, which will meet tomorrow for a session of three days. At the concluding sessions of the congress participants will include the nine Western States' governors who are making a tour of the Eastern cities. The representative attendances and the wide range of subjects scheduled for discussion combine to give promise of one of the most notable gatherings ever assembled in the history of this country in the interest of waterway development.

The congress is national in its purpose representing all sections and all waterways. Representative Joseph E. Ransdell of Louisiana is the president of the body and will occupy the chair at the several sessions. Secretary of War Stimson and Gen. Bixby, chief of engineers, U.S.A., will represent the government. Senator Jones of Washington will speak for the Pacific Northwest, and Stephen M. Sparkman of Florida, chairman of the House committee on rivers and harbors, will be another prominent participant. Others on the programme will include the presidents of the leading waterway and river improvement associations throughout the country. The speakers will endeavor to impress upon the sixty-second congress, whose leaders are demanding economy, that there is a widespread sentiment throughout the country for a continuance of generous appropriations for improved waterways.

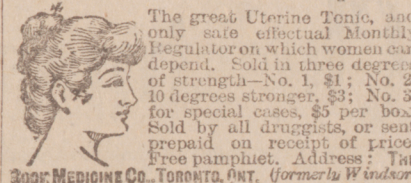
