## RECIPROCITY WILL WIN OVER PRIVATE INTERESTS

Hon. L. P. Brodeur in Striking Speech Before Montreal Audience Discusses Leading Questions of the Day--The Annexation Bugaboo.

(Montreal Herald.)

"While I am not in a position to make any official statement myself, I shall be surprised if we do not soon hear from Sir Wilfrid's own mouth that this great work will soon be accomplished and that Montreal, which was fifty years ago considered a little village, will become a city of more than a million people, and consequently becoming one of the most prominent cities in the whole of America," declared Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, referring to the construction of the Georgian Bay Canal in a speech on the leading political questions of the day before the members of the Club Chénier, at College Hall last night.

On the platform with the honorable minister were Dr. Beland, M.P. for Beauce, Mr. Rivet, M.P. for Hochelaga, and Mr. Gladu, M.P. for Yamaska.

The minister, who was most enthusiastically received, held the undivided attention of his hearers for a solid hour and a half, while he clearly pointed before them the true import of the big national questions at present in the limelight of the political arena.

Dwelling at length on the question of reciprocity, Hon. Mr. Brodeur pointed out that when a political movement in the United States set in motion by the will of the people and of the working classes, demanded a modification of the fiscal policy the Federal Government which had ever been ready to better the conditions of the working classes and of the farmers, had seized the favorable opportunity to conduct reciprocity negotiations.

### A PUBLIC TRIUMPH.

Referring to the treaty of 1854 the speaker said that it was a triumph of public will over the so-called interests of certain privileged classes. It was the earnest desire of the people of Canada and the United States to have a treaty such as that which had been drawn up for it would mean a reduction in the cost of the necessities of life.

The country was prosperous, but this was no reason why the working and the laboring classes should be satisfied with the present condition of things.

The minister briefly disposed of the objections which had been made to the treaty. "They say," he said, "that if the policy becomes law it will be of disadvantage to England. We say that England if she wishes, can willingly partake of any privileges which may be enjoyed by Canada."

### THE ANNEXATION BOGEY.

As far as annexation was concerned, Mr. Brodeur dismissed the subject by remarking that annexation existed only in the minds of those who had not confidence in themselves, since nothing in that direction could be done without their consent. To annex Canada anyhow the minister added, it would be necessary for the United States to obtain our consent as well as that of Great Britain.

### CANADA'S FIRST TREATY.

The speaker laid stress on the fact that the Franco-Canadian treaty was the first important foreign treaty he was sure, that had ever been carried through by Canadian Government ministers solely, and in pointing out that in the present reciprocity treaty there was benefit to the country, de-

clared that he spoke for the Government when he said that as long as the Liberal party was at the head of the country the protection of our national industries would continue. "It is for Canada to assert her trade autonomy and to fulfill the desires of her manufacturing and working classes."

### THE NAVAL QUESTION.

Regarding the naval question, which when introduced by the honorable speaker as one of the most important questions of the day, gave rise to a storm of applause. Mr. Brodeur declared that if it had been worth while for the Canadian fishermen to have had protection for forty years it was high time that the work of the men standing before him should be given protection as well as the commerce and the people of Canada.

"The navy bill is the most laudable work of the Liberal party," the minister said. "We ought to defend our territory and protect our seas. The time has come when we can no longer depend on the British navy or the Monroe doctrine to help us in time of trouble and Canada could, should and will have her own navy."

Touching on the question of a dry dock for Montreal the honorable minister declared that he hoped he would still be in public life when Montreal's first dry dock would be opened in that part of the city which they now were--Maisonneuve.

### "DE GUERRE" NECESSARY.

Dr. Beland of Beauce, who was the next speaker, created no little laughter by his remark that "when a Liberal spoke of the navy he always spoke of it as the 'marine de guerre.'" Dr. Beland said people would not be impressed by the mere word "navy" but when "de guerre" was tacked on they had the vision of a grim fighting force before them, something that could protect them. This idea strengthened them in support of the Government bill. "Whenever an omission of 'de guerre' be thought would tend to the opposition of the measure."

When Dr. Beland put the question if there was anyone in the hall opposed to the navy? not one of the several thousand in the hall replied and a pin could have been heard to drop.

The doctor pointed out that there was a Canadian navy forty years ago and that it had been in existence since then, working for the protection of the Canadian fishermen.
