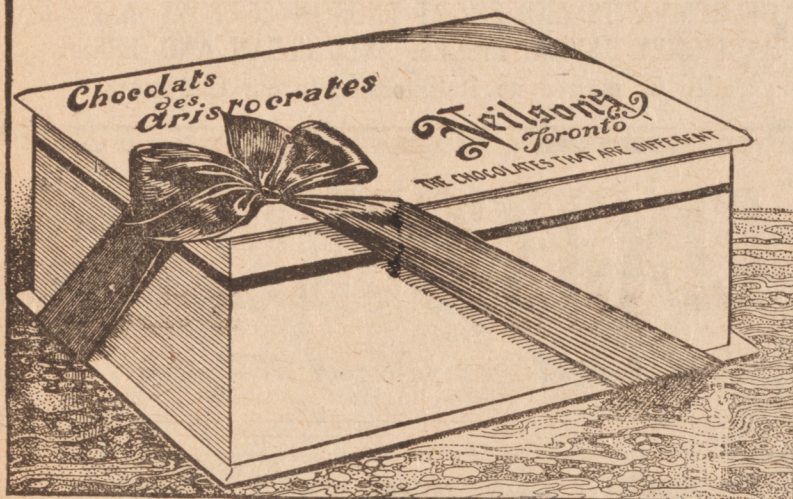

### THE LATE REV. GEO. F. DAY

(Wesleyan)

The many friends and old comrades of the Rev. G. F. Day, will learn with sorrow of his sudden death, at the home of his son, Thorburn, Picton Co., on the night of Tuesday, 14th inst. Mr. Day had been in very poor health for a long time, but on the evening of his decease was fully as well as he had been for some time and his passing away was quite unexpected.

He was born in Carleton, St. John studied at Mount Allison, was received on probation for the ministry in 1868, was ordained in 1872, and was stationed as follows: Salisbury and Elgin, Advocate Harbor, Weymouth, Gables, Burlington, Shubenacadie, Musquodoboit Harbor, (1883 Supernumerary on account of poor health), Shubenacadie for one year, (Supernumerary at Wolfville 1885-1888), Wallace, Acadia Mines, Mahone Bay, Boylston, Lockport and North East Harbor. In 1906 he finally retired from circuit work and went to Thorburn to reside, as his son was practising medicine in that community.

Although apparently endowed with much physical strength, at the beginning, his health began to fail early in his ministry. He found this to be a serious handicap, but he labored up to his full strength and faithfully served on circuits of such extent as to tax the powers of the strongest. He was a man of kindly disposition and good intellectual endowment.

He leaves a wife (formerly Miss Hardwick of Bear River, N. S.), two sons, Dr. Frederick B. of Thorburn, N. S., and Prof. Frank P., of the University of New Brunswick, and one daughter Hattie, now Mrs. Dr. Dorman, of Winnipeg, to all of whom much sympathy will be extended in this time of bereavement.

### THE PEACE RIVER COUNTRY

Owing to the development in that part of Western Canada west of Edmonton and the business impetus that is now going on in that territory, and in order to adequately take care of the trek into Peace River country, where 15,000 new homesteads will be offered for free entry by the Dominion Government this year, a daily, except Sunday, passenger train will be operated by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway between Edmonton and Edson, Alta., commencing on Monday, February 13th.

From the latter point the new government wagon road enables settlers with their effects to travel with ease and comparative comfort in about one week's time to the Grand Prairie as against the much longer and more expensive routes through gateways east of Edson, which occupy from a month and a half to two months.

The new train will leave Edmonton daily except Sunday at 6.30 a.m., arrive Edson (130 miles) at 1.00 p.m., returning, leave Edson at 3.30 p.m., daily except Sunday, arrive Edson 10.05 p.m.

#### CAUSES OF ALCOHOLISM

"There are five reasons why men drink—

Good wine, a friend, because I'm dry,

Or lest I should be by and by.

Or any other reason why."—Sirmond.

Alcohol is not a demon." A great deal of harm has resulted from personifying alcohol, and investing it with mystic powers which it does not possess. Alcohol is simply a combination of carbon hydrogen, and oxygen, after the formula C<sub>2</sub>H<sub>5</sub>OH.

Possessing a fairly sound nervous system, there is any sufficient reason why a human being should be a slave to two atoms of carbon, six atoms of hydrogen, and one atom of oxygen? Certainly not. All that is necessary is the cultivation of will power and a denial of the call of habit.

#### THE FORCE OF HABIT

Many worthy people, including temperance folk, are just as firmly in the grasp of some habit as the confirmed alcoholic; they eat too much, or talk too much, or are intemperate in the use of water. The alcoholic habit is a habit and nothing more, barring actual insanity or grave organic degeneration. True, confirmed habit of any kind may constitute a "neurosis" or functional nervous malady, but there is a desire for cure, regular medical treatment can effect it.

#### HEREDITY

Heredity is often an explanation of alcoholism, but seldom a good excuse. The "taste" for alcohol is not directly transmitted, but merely a defective nervous organization which readily yields to the temptation of alcohol, or any other temptation that offers the easiest way out of trouble. But a weak or unstable nervous organization may be trained up to stability and control, just as a round-shouldered, clumsy, faulty physique made be made over and "set up" by proper drill.

#### LIMITATIONS OF HEREDITY

It is claimed by one school of biologists that gross over-indulgence in alcohol by a man who has inherited a healthy nervous system from healthy ancestors, cannot affect his offspring. There is doubtless some truth in this theory, or alcohol would long since have caused widespread degeneration. Recent evidence however, supports the belief that in many such cases a decided effect is transmitted.

#### PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY

A man with a tendency to drink should not lay the blame on his ancestors, but look the two atoms of carbon, six atoms of hydrogen, and one atom of oxygen in the face, if we may use the expression, and deny their power to enslave him.

#### ALCOHOL CRAVING

It has been claimed by some that the normal healthy man has substances in his blood called "hormones," which stimulate vital activities and give a sense of well-being. In those addicted to drink, these "hormones" may be deficient, and alcohol seems to supply the deficiency. But the "hormones" improve cellular vitality, while alcohol poisons cell life. Alcohol is not, therefore, a true "hormone," and its use lessens the amount of "hormones" in the blood, as the depressed state of the alcohol user during the intervals of indulgence demonstrates.

#### EFFECT ON THE RACE

It is also claimed that alcohol is of benefit to the race, as it tends to weed out the unfit. But the unfit are still with us, and continue to arrive, after centuries of alcoholic indulgence by the race, for alcohol is a slow poison, and rarely kills until after maturity has arrived, and the defective nervous control has been passed on to another generation.
