AUDIENCE HEARD

DR. TRYONS ADDRESS

Assistant Secretary of American Peace Society Spoke on World's Peace Movement and Its Results.

There was a very representative audience in attendance at the address given last night in the Y. M. C. A. Hall by Rev. Dr. Tryon of Boston, Assistant Secretary of the American Peace Society. The address was given under the joint auspices of the University of New Brunswick and the Canadian Club. Chancellor Jones of the U. N. B. was in the chair and the U. N. B. faculty were well represented in the audience. The speaker dealt in his address with the World's Peace Movement and made particular reference to the Hague Tribunal.

CANADA'S DESTINY

That Canada is destined to take a prominent part in spreading the gospel of peace in the world was the opinion expressed by Dr. Tryon. The latter is now on a speaking tour of Canadian clubs and churches between Hamilton and Halifax.

He will speak in St. John churches tomorrow, at Mt. Allison University Sackville on Tuesday and at Acadia University, Wolfville, N. S. on Thursday. He concludes his tour at Halifax on Friday March 2nd.

THE HAGUE IDEA

Dealing with the Peace Movement in his address last night Dr. Tryon said,

"The peace tribunal by the intervention of friendly powers brought a period of meditation in which belligerent nations were often induced to come to peaceful terms. He commended in The Hague peace idea the international commissions of inquiry, the successful working of which was illustrated by the North Sea incident the reference of international disputes to a board of judges, such as settled the fishery question between the United States and Great Britain and lastly, the World Congress, which is seen to have its beginning already established in the periodic meetings of The Hague conference.

INTERNATIONAL HISTORY OF BRITAIN

In the course of his address Dr. Tryon drew frequently upon events in the international history of Great Britain. He paid a high tribute to Prince Albert, who in correcting the despatch which the British Government had prepared to send to the United States with regard to the Trent affair had probably averted war between the two nations. He also told the dramatic story of the arbitration between Chile and Argentina, which is commemorated by a statue known as "The Christ of the Andes." "In this connection" he said "the question was referred to the man who has borne the peerless title of all the rulers of the world, King Edward, the Peacemaker."

In closing Dr. Tryon expressed the opinion that Canada with her spotless record as to war, with her examples of success in industrial arbitration with her habit of dealing with all her serious questions in a constitutional manner, was destined to lead the nations into the pathways of peace.

The Arts building of the University of New Brunswick was in gala attire last evening, the occasion of the annual Conversazione given by the students. Over one thousand invitations had been issued and upwards of four hundred guests assembled in the main hall at half-past eight last evening.

BEAUTIFUL DECORATIONS

The halls and the library were lavishly decorated with evergreens in which nestled countless red roses, flags were draped in places and college banners adorned the walls. The most striking object in the main hall was a large crescent with the class number 1911 in the centre, which was placed over the main entrance. An innovation of this year was the introduction of class colors in the scheme of decoration. The seniors' colors, light blue and dark blue were conspicuously displayed in the library, the juniors' red and white adorned the second hall, and the sophomore and freshmen colors were used to decorate the rooms on each side of the main hall.

A program of eighteen dances was furnished by the Opera House Orchestra while Mrs. Calder played the three extras. Although the number of dancers was large, the floor was not uncomfortably crowded.

Refreshments were served on the upper floor throughout the evening. The chaperones were Mrs. C. C. Jones, Mrs. L. W. Bailey, Sr. and Mrs. E. A. Stone. The ball was over shortly after two o'clock.

FISHERIES DEPT.

OFFICIAL WILL LOOK INTO TROUBLE

Prof. Hockin Will Inspect Dams at Green River and Magaguadavic Preparatory to Installing Fishways.

Prof. Hockin of Pictou, N. S., who has designed the greater number of fishways which have been installed in this part of Canada under the direction of the Department of Marine and Fisheries will arrive in the city Monday night and on the following day will leave for Green River, Madawaska County, accompanied by Fisheries Inspector H. E. Harrison of this city. The visit to Green River is occasioned by the building of a dam near the falls on that stream, in connection with the development of electricity to supply the town of Edmundston with power and light. A fishway is to be installed in the dam, but the type has not yet been decided upon. Prof. Hockin will decide what will be done.

TROUBLE AT MAGAGUADAVIC

The two officials will also visit Magaguadavic where there have been numerous complaints on account of the dam of the St. George Pulp and Paper Company at the outlet of the lake. The residents of the locality have asked that a fishway be put in the dam. At present there are two gates in the dam, one of which has been kept raised during the summer. The residents of the locality complain that the fish are still interierred with and demand a fishway. This is not the first clash that has occurred between the St. George Pulp and Paper Company and residents of Magaguadavic. Some time ago a number of summer residents of the region claimed that their property was damaged by floods caused by the company's dams.

BASKETBALL TOUR IS OFF

On account of the inability of H. C. Kinghorn, one of the forwards of the U. N. B. basketball team to leave the city the tour of the team through Quebec and Ontario has been indefinitely postponed. The illness of Mr. Kinghorn's mother has prevented him from going with the team. An attempt was made to get J. D. McBeath of Moncton to play in Kinghorn's place, but was unsuccessful.
