"SKINNING OUT THE RIBS"

"Skinning out the ribs," is the name applied to the method by which eyes opened from time to time. The butchers are able to pass tubercular beef under the eyes of these local inspectors. With the removal of the entrails the chief means of detecting tuberculosis in an animal is gone. Unless the animal was very seriously affected the inspector is, as a rule, mable to detect the disease then. But when the disease has gone further and the nodules have begun to cluster on the frame, the butcher is p against a different problem. Then he "skins out the ribs." This con-

sists of stripping off the heavy layer of skin on which the nodules cling, and then, to all appearances, the beef is perfectly sound. Only an expert can detect presence of the dread disease.
