A NON-PARTIZAN OPINION OF THE RECIPROCITY PACT

The Montreal Pharmaceutical Journal calls Attention to Some Features of the Agreement—It Will Open up the Widest, Nearest and Best Market in the World to Canadian Producers

(Montreal Pharmaceutical Journal.) Reciprocity has passed the United States Senate, and the signature of President Taft has been affixed. It now rests alone with Canada to accept or reject what her statesmen have sought for some forty odd years. If the Canadian parliament had brought the question to a vote of would surely have carried by a large majority. The Conservative opposition determined to obstruct the usual procedure and it was within the power of this minority to keep up the debate for months. The government desired to let the Canadian producers have a chance at the new market opened by this agreement with this season's harvest. Under the circumstances, and facing the obstructing tactics, possible under our parliamentary rules—Sir Wilfrid Laurier decided to dissolve the House—appeal to the electorate—rush an election through and get a new parliament together by October.

The government has full confidence that the great majority of the Canadian people want reciprocity—from the Atlantic to the Pacific—and there is little doubt but that the new House will quickly pass the necessary legislation to accept and put in force what now stands firm as the offer of the United States to trade freely with Canada, in natural products particularly. Much delay will be saved in view of the obstruction by this drastic action, and Canadians will be in a measure relieved of a positive feeling of shame that was growing greatly in regard to the action of the minority in the national parliament. The party opposing reciprocity held the reins of power at Ottawa for many years prior to 1896, and has always striven for it, and the statute book records in legal form the proofs of efforts in that direction—yet when their opponents at those days—the Liberal party—of which Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the chief—succeeded in obtaining all that had ever been aimed at—it is made the signal for attack—obstruction and denunciation. There is nothing logical, or natural even, about this attitude of the Conservative minority, which has by the action of its chief and members brought about this appeal to the people of Canada.

You cannot find a manufacturer—opposed to reciprocity—who can, in detail, give any reasonable objection to the reciprocity proposed. When you can get one to talk calmly and finish a discussion on the subject as a reasonable and reasoning mortal, he will finish all or any argument on the subject by saying:—"I cannot pick out items to object to—there is no objection to reciprocity in produce and unmanufactured products of Canada, but what I do object to is that if this is put in force it may succeed and tempt the government to reduce the tariff on the manufacturers of the country." This is the selfish line of the manufacturers. They object to the producers—the farmers—from benefiting by reciprocity—not that it hurts them, but because it may help to effect another change in the fiscal system later on that would hurt them!

The government cannot do what these people think they might do under some circumstances—the government is committed—the country is bound to keep faith with capital carrying on the industries of the country—investments in rational industries are safe with one government as with another. The faith of the country is pledged along certain lines for the building up of Canada's industries. The manufacturers are at the bottom of the political attack upon the Laurier government in connection with reciprocity. It is costing them time, energy and much money that might be better employed in view of the fact that a great increase in the volume of produce from field, forest and farm will make an infinitely greater and better home market for the same manufacturers.

Many who talk of reciprocity insist upon calculating the produce of the Canadian farms, etc., on its present basis as a continuing basis, or base for calculations as to what will happen when the markets of the United States are opened to our producers. If Canada were to stand still as to production possibly the aspect would be different in some respects, and one might not be as anxious to move. IT IS RIDICULOUS TO SAY THAT PRODUCTION WILL STAND STILL OR DECREASE IN THE FACE OF READY DEMAND AND THE OPENING OF THE NEAREST, BEST AND WIDEST MARKET IN THE WORLD TO OUR PRODUCERS. What reciprocity really means to

Eastern Canada at least is—CULTIVATION. WITH A GOOD MARKET AND GOOD PRICES THE FARMS WILL BE CULTIVATED TO A GREATER EXTENT, AND IN A FEW YEARS THERE WILL BE NO VACANT, UNUSED LAND WITH THE ORDINARY FARMER. Instead of cultivating and seeking crop from five or ten acres in the hundred acres of his farm, he will till twenty or fifty acres or more and reap his golden harvest with his increased production from the United States markets, always large and always open. He will have money to employ help. HE WILL BE A MASTER FARMER! INSTEAD OF A DRUDGE, AND PLENTY TO USE HIS BRAINS IN MANAGING HIS BUSINESS LIKE HIS BROTHERS WHO "RUN" STORES IN THE TOWNS AND VILLAGES.

Reciprocity will give a great impetus to industry and business through out the country, and when we look back five years from now the folly of all and any opposition to reciprocity will be better understood. History will not spare the man or the men who are responsible now for holding up the government in its desire to accept the offer of the United States for the great and even incalculable benefit of the producing community, and incidentally as well, of the business men of the country.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's appeal to the people of Canada is clear and concise. It bears the stamp of a statesman. It tells the whole story effectively, and it will reach the mark. Mr. Borden challenged the government to bring on the elections when he was in the west. Now that the elections have been called he has issued an address to the people remarkable solely for its weakness. He avoids the subject of reciprocity that brings about the election itself. He complains of having the elections this brought on for a most sensible object, in one way or other, and his real "piece de resistance" is the Oliver inquiry and sympathy for the poor witnesses summoned by the committee and who were disappointed in the journey by the dissolution!

THE ELECTION WILL PUT THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY OUT OF BUSINESS FOR TWENTY YEARS, AND UTTERLY DISCREDIT FOR THE FUTURE THE MEN RESPONSIBLE FOR OBSTRUCTING PARLIAMENT, PREVENTING A VOTE AND COMPELLING AN ELECTION to extricate the Dominion from an impracticable position. On top of great prosperity the country will boom with a new vigor and increased volume of trade and profit to all with the acceptance of reciprocity now offered by the United States.

TOGO TO VISIT WEST POINT

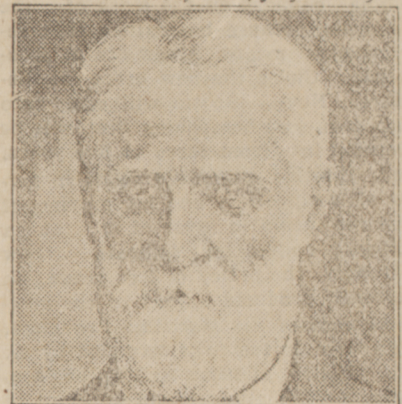

MISSIONARIES' CONVENTION

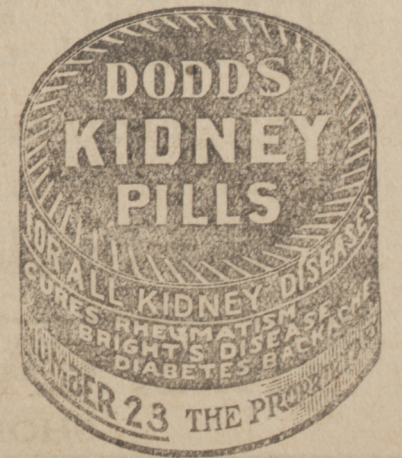
