LEWIS FOREST

BEAT OUT BELVASIA
FOR OHIO STAKE

Anvil Went Lame and Could Not Race --Cox Claimed Murphy Struck His Horse

Cleveland, Aug. 11.—All race attendance records for Cleveland were broken yesterday afternoon, when 800 persons entered the gates of North Randall track. It was the largest number that ever attended a grand circuit meeting at either North Randall or Glenville. And the racing was as great as the attendance.

Mike McDevitt upset all the carefully laid plans of Tommy Murphy's friends, who banked on Belvasia to win the \$5000 Ohio stake, by landing the third heat with Stroller, thus giving the race to Lewis Foster.

The free-for-all pacers gave a thrilling exhibition and came within three-eighths of a second of equaling the best time for three heats in a pacing race. The interest was so keen in this race that the men who wager went to it hook line and sinker. Independence Boy sold for \$200, Earl Jr. \$135, The Elc \$50, Bess H. Kay \$40, while the field, with Major Mal-low and The Ative in it, sold for \$20.

To win the first heat Independence Boy had to pace in 2.01½, while Earl Jr. won the next two heats on 2.02½ and 2.03½, which made the average for the three heats 2.02, or 1 second slower than the world's record for a three-heat pacing race. At Readville in 1905 Bolivar won the first heat of a race in 2.00½, and Gratt won the next two heats and race in 2.02½, 2.03½.

ALMOST CAME TO BLOWS

So hard fought was the race that drivers Murphy and Cox nearly came to blows after the event was ended. Cox claimed that Murphy hit Earl Jr. across the nose at the turn into the stretch in the first heat, and protested to the judges against the illegal use of Murphy's whip, but the judges did not see it. After the race Cox and Murphy exchanged angry words in the paddock.

In the \$5000 Ohio stake for 2.11 trotters, but just at the last moment a severe accident befell the favorite, Anvil, which thus deprived those present of seeing what probably would have been a record-breaking performance.

BELVASIA FAVORED

With Anvil out of race Belvasia was picked to win, although Lewis Forest was well liked for the first heat. Lewis trotted to form and won the opening round in 2.04½, with Al Stanley, Douglas McGregor and Charlie Thomas right up close and coming fast at the finish.

Murphy could not get through with Belvasia and had to be contented with sixth place. But in the next round the Glen Cove drive was up in front from the sendoff and by gradually bettering his position he piloted Belvasia home a winner, hosing out Lewis Forest about 25 feet from the wire. The time was the same as in the first heat 2.06½.

With the race standing a tie between Belvasia and Lewis Forest Mike Devitt came on and put a sudden change in affairs by winning with the Michigan trotter, Stroller, and the race, instead of going to Murphy as many thought it would, was won by McDonald on points.

In the 2.14 trot Charley Mitchell won in straight heats, being forced to step in 2.11½, 2.08½, 2.07½, to win. High Admiral was good for second place each time, but the Geers trotters could not do any better. Lazarus won third money.

Another victory went Murphy's way in the fourth event which he won with Cascade. As in the first Murphy won in straight heats and Geers filled the runner-up position. This time Geers drove Lady Willow.

Portland has a great team this season and the Oregon city was a fine chance to win the Pacific Coast League pennant.

Manager Steve Flanagan, of the Brockton team, says that in Henriksen he has the star outfielder in the New England League.

President Carson says that the Central League will play out its schedule and that no further changes in the circuit are contemplated.

The Boston and the St. Louis Americans and the Cincinnati Nationals are all bidding for Pitcher Will Kirwin of the Danville Three-I League team. San Bernardino, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Oxnard, Venice, Doyle and San Diego, Calif., have organized a winter league and will open the season after the closing of the major leagues. Quite a number of big leaguers have agreed to join the organization.

This Augusta team has been taken over by the directors of the South Atlantic League and will be known as the S. A. L. team the balance of the season.
