JEW OBSERVE YOM KIPPUR

New York, Oct. 2.—The Jewish people throughout the world today celebrate Yom Kippur, or the Day of Atonement, the most widely observed of all the many feasts and fasts in the Hebrew calendar. This fast day is considered the most important of all the Mosaic holy days. With its observance the penitential season which began with the New Year comes to an end and the Jews then look forward with joyful anticipation to the celebration of Succoth, the Feast of Tabernacles, the harvest festival of the ancient Israelites.

Among the orthodox Jews, Yom Kippur is kept as a solemn fast, and for twenty-four hours no food or drink or nourishment is allowed to pass the lips of the pious and observing Jew. From this observance none is exempt except the sick, children, under age, very old people whose health would be affected by abstention from nourishment and nursing mother. The reformed Jews join with the orthodox in the celebration of Yom Kippur, but as a rule they do not fast nor are the services in the reform temples continuous on the day of celebration.

Tuskahoma, Okla., Oct. 2.—A special session of the Chickasaw and Choctaw Council assembled here today to make recommendation as to the disposition of tribal property and to wind up the affairs of the tribe. FLORENCE FAIRBANKS ON FADS AND FASHIONS

New York, Sept. 30.—The latest importations from Paris make it clear beyond a doubt that greater fullness in skirts is the latest dictum of the rulers of fashion. Of course, the change is by no means sudden. There is merely a gradual transition, but it is noticeable even to the inexperienced eye. To be sure, the average frock is straight in line, but here and there one sees the double skirt, the triple skirt, the shirk of tiny frills, and this note of fullness becomes more insistent as the season advances.

The great fashion designers of Paris are beginning to bring out models in which fullness has a decided place. Narrow flounces are seen on the hems of frocks fashioned of chiffon and gauzes. The straight wide hem and the hand of satin finishing skirts has claimed the attention of fashionable women for so long a time that a change of this sort immediately calls attention to itself.

There will undoubtedly be an effort on the part of the more progressive fashion makers to widen the skirts very perceptibly; but this is not likely to be taken up, at least during the early season. Frills of Valenciennes and narrow laces will go to give new skirts the desired fullness. Yet even these are soft enough to hang perfectly straight but give a delightful froth effect without actually widening to any perceptible degree the general lines.

A dainty model of flounced silk muslin had a group of lace frills set close to the hem. The bodice was almost entirely of lace, with three overlapping frills of lace forming a fichu effect. A sash and girdle of soft peach-pink satin completed this simple but handsome costume. Width is also introduced in some cases by slashing the skirt on the side from waist to hem and inserting an inverted point of some contrasting material or trimming. Pleats that lap under and only are noticeable when the wearer walks are another way of obtaining the new line of fullness.

The coats of very short hip length seem to have gone entirely out of fashion, which will be gratifying to many women who found those coats exceedingly unbecoming. The belief that the new coats would be more closely fitted seems to have been without any foundation, however. There is a slight curving in front and side lines on some of the new models, and there are, of course, certain belted and girdled models which are loosely held in, but the average coat keeps its loose, straight lines and its shortened waist line in the back, an effect usually obtained by clever cutting and handling of the side sections and various seams.

That the kimono sleeve has every intention of surviving the change of seasons is evident. Even among the best of the imported models one finds it, and the domestic models unhesitatingly confess allegiance to it, but long sleeves are a feature of some of the most successful frock and blouse models, and it seems safe to prophesy that the ultra-modish woman of the winter will choose long sleeves for her daytime frock.

One of the best models seen, a black cloth stunningly embroidered in blue a long close cleave of black chiffon and dull yellow of a sulphur tone, had with a little finish of embroidery under the chignon where it fell over the hand, and with a fold of yellow chiffon and a shorter fold of blue veiling the very top of the sleeve and disappearing under the embroidered cloth at the armhole. Other models showed the upper part of the sleeve slightly full and joining a long, close cuff or an upper sleeves with close under sleeve. A chic velvet front of fine

NUTMEG TOWN ELECTIONS

Hartford, Conn., Oct. 2.—Almost all the towns in Connecticut hold their annual meetings today for the choice of town officials for the coming year. The occasion is usually referred to in this State as "Little Town Election Day," and in years gone by when a presidential election was to follow, some significance attached to the way the parties lined up. In recent years the political significance of these elections has disappeared, but this year a new interest has been aroused in them by the referendum vote on two proposed amendments to the constitution, one to give the lieutenant governor larger powers in case of the death or disability of the governor, and the other to the effect that the General Assembly shall adjourn sine die not later than the first Wednesday after the first Monday in June, following the organization. The complications following the death of Governor Lilley showed the necessity of the first of the proposed amendments, and the unusually long session of the legislature this year, out of all proportion to the results, the latter.

INSANITY PLEA FOR WILLIAM LEE

Boonville, Ind., Oct. 2.—William Lee the confessed murderer of his parents and brother was brought here from the State reformatory at Jeffersonville and arraigned for trial today in the Warrick circuit court. It is anticipated that counsel for the defense will make an insanity plea in an effort to save him for the death sentence. The triple murder occurred at the Lee homestead near here early last August. According to the confession of the young man he committed the crimes to obtain money with which to marry and set up a home.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 2.—Prof. Samuel E. Tillman, for more than thirty years an instructor at the West Point Military Academy, was placed on the army retired list today on account of age. Prof. Tillman is a native of Tennessee and graduated from West Point in 1869.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

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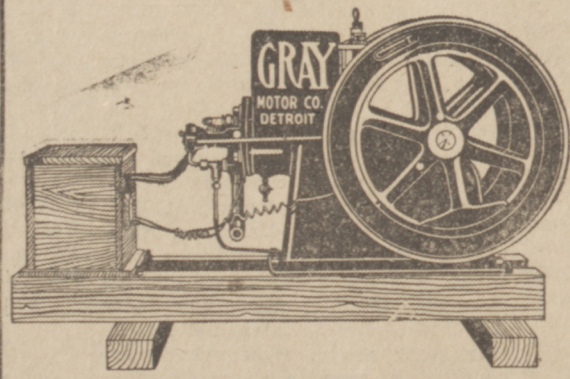
