## MacDONALD ELECTION TO BE PROTESTED

Winnipeg, Nov. 18.—A petition against the return of Alex. Morrison of Homewood, as member for Macdonald was filed here yesterday. The petitioners are Dr. Andrew W. McLes of Treherne, and John E. Woods of Somerset, electors of the division.

The petition charges that Mr. Morrison was, by himself and agents before, during and after the said election, guilty of bribery, treating, personating and undue influence, whereby the said Morrison is incapacitated from serving in parliament. Intimidation is also charged.

## MISUSE OF POLICE POWER.

The most interesting charge is the one in which the misuse of the police powers of the province is charged. It is alleged that Hon. Robert Rogers, Sir Rodmond P. Roblin, Hon. Colin H. Campbell and W. H. Sharpe M.P., acting as agents for Mr. Morrison, employed and set to work and gave instructions to certain justices of the peace, police constables, detectives, agents and other persons to arrest, to put in jail and keep confined therein persons whom they should discover in the said electoral district to be engaged in soliciting votes for or in advocating the candidature of R. L. Richardson. It is charged that the said justices of the peace, constables, etc., were paid for carrying out said instructions, either by the provincial government or by the persons named as agents for the said Alexander Morrison. It is charged that in accordance with these instructions these officials, at said election, falsely and maliciously and without reasonable or probable cause, arrested or caused to be arrested, on warrants issued in blank to them and on other warrants corruptly and wickedly issued, contrary to law, a number of persons who were found soliciting votes for and advocating the candidature of R. L. Richardson, on false, fictitious, pretended and malicious charges preferred by them against said persons, and caused said persons to be deprived of their liberty and confined to jail. It is further charged that by the arrest of certain persons the right of freedom of free discussion and free speech and the right to solicit votes at said election for and to advocate the candidature of R. L. Richardson were taken away and destroyed. This is given as a reason why Mr. Morrison is, under the law, incapacitated from serving in parliament and his election made wholly null and void.

## REVEALS SECRETS OF HAREM OF THE SULTAN

Mme. Blanche Arral, who spent several weeks in the harem of Sultan Abdul Hamid, before he was deposed by the Turks, has revealed the information she obtained while singing to the ruler's wives.

Mme. Arral was provided with rooms at the palace, and so had an opportunity to learn the inner workings of life in this place such as is seldom offered to any but a Turkish woman.

Here is some of the information Mme. Arral imparts:

"In secluded dwellings Turkish girls are brought up with the most extreme effort to prevent them from acquiring any knowledge of the world. The result is that the women of the harem show an astounding degree of ignorance.

"They cannot read or write. They have never heard of a newspaper or other matter-of-course things of modern life.

"They know nothing of other countries than Turkey except through strangely warped and twisted stories which they hear from friends who have met some foreign women. Doubtless my own stay has furnished material for many queer ideas of America and France.

"Apparently the women have only one accomplishment. This consists of laying on a peculiar three-stringed instrument which produces a rather wild music. They also sing a few simple songs.

"I have been asked whether the girls and women are happy. This is a rather hard question to answer. I could not say that they are happy in the way that American girls of their class are happy. They may be compared to wild animals torn in a menagerie. They are contented with their shut-in and endless life because they have known no thing else. Thus they might be called happy. It is, however, a case of 'where ignorance is bliss,' but not where it would be folly to be wise."

## NEED EDUCATION

"Education is just what the Turkish women need the most. As conditions are today, they are all right while they have home ones to care for them, but if their husbands die without providing for them they are helpless.

"Suppose an American girl who has always been cared for in a good home is suddenly left destitute. She can always turn to something to support herself because she knows much of the world and has education. But consider a Turkish woman in the same situation. She cannot teach school, because she is more ignorant than the poorest scholars. As for business, what chance would a woman have who couldn't even write her own name?

"Then, too, she would be so unacquainted with the world that speedy ruin would overtake her. For the Turkish woman left destitute it is a choice between suicide and the street.

"Education is sadly needed, but it is combatted by the two most powerful social factors, the race customs and the religion. However, the gradual awakening which is spreading through Turkey will probably do much toward bettering women's condition.

"The most familiar feature of the Turkish woman's costume is her veil. It seems to testify her seclusion and mystery. She is veiled everywhere except in the harem, and her husband is the only man in the world who can look on her unveiled face. Every one cannot do so until after the wedding, a condition which would possibly strike the American man as being a decidedly risky proposition.

"The idea of romantic love has little or no place in the minds of Turkish girls. The groom's mother usually makes the arrangements with the bride's parents. Neither of them sees the other at all. At the wedding itself a certain hangs between the contracting parties, thus preventing any tendency on the part of either one to back out at the last minute. By the time the worst is known is too late to escape.

## RULES FOR WOMEN

"As a direct result of wearing the veil Turkish women never appear on the street with men, either walking or in carriages. The reason which they give for this is quite logical. Since women are always veiled, one could not tell whether a man was in company with his wife or some one else. So the safe thing to do is to forbid walks or drives with the fair sex entirely. I suppose this might be used as an argument for or against the use of the veil according to the point of view.

"So fixed a feature is the veil that the Turkish woman feels a real sense of shame if seen by a man with her face uncovered. Their religion requires two baths a day. In the country women take three baths in 'treasures. If any men chance along the women hastily veil themselves and feel satisfactorily clothed.

"It is sometimes said that harem life must be attractive in some ways

it seems to me that this is an entirely mistaken idea. The dull monotony of the harem would be almost unendurable to the American girl. Long before my six weeks were over I had grown heartily tired of the place, even with the freedom to come and go which was allowed me.

"On rising in the morning the Turkish woman begins one of her two occupations namely, beautifying herself. Her other occupation is luxuriating in a graceful manner. The luxuriating part is provided for by the appointments of the place. There are no chairs, but all around the walls in the room are wonderfully comfortable sofas and piles of pillows. Lounging around in silken comfort, the women have nothing to do except to look pretty.

## CHIEF AIM OF WOMEN

"In this latter they are ably assisted, and it is really their chief aim in life. They are attended by a corps of beauty specialists, whose duty it is to attend to their personal appearance. A good part of each day is spent under the care of these women. It seems difficult to see how so much time can be spent in this way. Their hair is cared for until it seems as if each hair received individual attention. The face is carefully treated, but rouge is used on the lips only.

"Of course the idle and easy existence tends to make the woman stout. As a matter of fact, Turkish 'like 'em plump,' but there is, of course, such a thing as going too far. To guard against this the women use a peculiar sort of tea, having such wonderful qualities that it is remarkable that some patent medicine firm has not exploited it in this country. I tried it myself, as I was a little overweight at the time, and found it most efficacious.

"So interested is the Turkish woman in her personal appearance that she is almost always seen with a mirror in her hand. Even when she receives a visitor and chats with her she holds the omniscient mirror in her hand, and reptuously contemplates her own special type of beauty. There are some situations in which this might be practiced in our own country, because whatever your face is like, you are used to it, and so there would be no painful shock.

"At any and all times of day the inhabitants of the harem may be found drinking strong black coffee. They also smoke cigarettes very

"Indoor and outside games are totally unknown to Turkish women, as are all forms of exercise. The amusements of the American girl would be regarded by her Turkish cousin as a sort of imprisonment at hard labor.

"These women usually sit down cross legged, and as I wore Turkish costume while at the Sultan's palace I was able to sit in this way, but I should like to see the woman who can do it in the conventional clothes of this country."


