## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead

pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

## UNITED STATES WON GORDON MEDAL FROM CANADIAN RINKS

Boston, Feb. 20—Plans are completed for the biggest curling meet that Boston has ever known. The chief event will be the nineteenth annual match for the Gordon Medal, an international competition with eight rinks entered from Canada and an equal number representing the United States. The series at present stands 12 to 6 in favor of Canada.

The Gordon Medal matches began this afternoon at two o'clock and some of the curlers who are taking part in the match are known far and wide in curling circles such as the Rev. Dr. Barclay, Messrs. F. F. G. Wills, H. E. Scudder, W. B. Hutchinson, D. Kingdon, D. Guthrie, W. B. Johnston and other well known players from Montreal. The four Edwards brothers from Jersey City, Dr. Paul and John McGaw from Boston; Tom Nicholson from New York, and J. H. Brown from Utica, are some of those who are representing the United States and are also known far and wide.

### FINAL RESULTS
