IS A BISHOP OLD AT SIXTY?

London, Dec. 26.—Dr. Cecil Hook, bishop of Kensington-on-Thames, is the latest opponent of the theory that a man is "too old" not only at forty, but at over sixty years of age. He recently applied for an appointment as honorary chaplain of the British army, and the War Office returned the reply that he was "too old." Dr. Hook, who is a youth of sixty-seven, entirely disagrees with the War Office.

"Is the War Office view the correct one?" asks a London paper. "Lord Halsbury led the 'Diehards' at eighty-six, Lord Strathcona is high commissioner for Canada at ninety-one, Lord Lister is just short of eighty-five, Lord Morley is in his seventy-fourth year, while among the world's greatest men in harness, and, to put it vulgarly, 'going strong,' are the Emperor of Austria, 81; Lord Rayleigh, 79; Thomas Alva Edison, 65; Admiral Togo, 65; Rodin, the famous French sculptor, 71, and J. Pierpont Morgan, 74. The War Office label must also apply to Mme. Sarah Bernhardt, Mrs. Pankhurst and Mrs. Fawcett as nearing the fatal line."

"Sixty-seven, as the ruthlessly applied limit mark, would cause an international disruption. In this country the Bishop of Gloucester, with almost half his brethren, would be compelled to step down to retirement but the editors of all the London newspapers would be secure. At the law courts Lord Alverstone would lead eight of his brethren to the simpler life, and at Spring Gardens and in the Court of Common Council twenty-five per cent. at least, for the men who 'govern' London with their ripe experience, would cease from committee meetings.

"Lord Rothschild must perforce consider his position in danger, and the Lord Mayor, Sir Thomas Crosby, must quit the Mansion House. Sir Charles Owens and many of his railway confreres would have to think about the immediate ar join the ranks of the unemployed."

WOUNDED TIGER MADE FOR KING

New York, Dec. 27.—A despatch from Bombay printed here this afternoon says: A sensational report that King George had a narrow escape from death while tiger hunting in Nepal was circulated here today. The story was told by a native who had accompanied the royal expedition as a game beater.

Although every precaution possible had been taken to protect the life of his majesty an enormous tiger, streaked with blood from several wounds and frantic from pain and rage, leaped upon the elephant, from whose back King George did his shooting, before it was finally put to death.

Two of the best shots in India were stationed on elephants on each side of the king. Each had fired upon the tiger when it was driven from cover by the horde of game beaters, but their first bullets missed a vital spot. King George fired first, that honor being accorded all guests of the Maharajah. He missed and after the beast had been wounded in half a dozen places it made the leap and landed upon the elephant just back of the royal howdah.

The king's nerve remained unshaken and the tiger fell to the ground with two well directed bullets through its head fired by the marksmen on either side of his majesty.

NATIONALISTS AND TORIES IN MERGER

Ottawa, Dec. 27.—The extinction of the Nationalists as such, has been determined upon by the Borden government. Gossip in well informed official circles here is that the government feels that Nationalism has served out its usefulness to the Conservative party and that it would be a source of danger if allowed to continue and develop.

Therefore word has been sent out that the Quebec supporters of the government are to be called Conservatives and not Nationalists, and for evidence that this mandate is being respected one has but to refer to the Parliamentary Guide, in which the French members, who were voted for Nationalists, all describe themselves in the sketches which they furnish, as Conservatives.

BILLETS FOR NATIONALIST LEADERS

It is understood that the suppression of the Nationalists will be attempted by the removal of leaders from active politics to government posts.

Mr. Bourassa is likely to have pressed upon him a most desirable post as representative of Canada in France.

Mr. Laverne will be given his choice of several pleasing positions in Canada and Hon. Mr. Monk is certain to go on the bench within a few months. It is well known that he does not find the business of administering the busy department of public works at all to his taste. He has been surly ever since Premier Borden sent him to work signing contracts for buildings and breakwaters, and has taken satisfaction for his own discomfort by indulging in wholesale dismissals of Liberal civil servants.

With Messrs Bourassa, Laverne and Monk bound and gagged by the ties of office it is believed that the Nationalist movement will speedily lose its identity entirely and that its adherents will fall into step with the Conservative party in Quebec.

When this takes place Premier Borden will be able to sleep easier and give more attention to the movement which George Bradbury proclaimed in the west to place Hon. Robert Rogers in Mr. Borden's place as prime minister.
