THE KING'S MESSAGE TO HIS PEOPLE

London, June 30—King George tonight issued a message of thanks to his subjects throughout the Empire for their loyalty unstintingly expressed by them during the Coronation period. His Majesty says it has encouraged him to go forward with the renewed hope that whatever perplexities or difficulties may arise he and his people shall unite in facing them, and that the ultimate outcome will be the common good. The message is as follows:

"Now that the Coronation and its attendant ceremonies are over, I desire to assure the people of the British Empire of my grateful sense of feeling that their hearts have been with me through it all. I felt this in the beautiful and impressive service in the Abbey—the most solemn experience of my life—and scarcely less in the stirring scenes of the succeeding days, when my people have signified their recognition and their heartfelt welcome of me as their Sovereign, for this has been apparent not only in the loyal enthusiasm shown in our passage to and from Westminster, and in the progresses which we have made in the different districts of London, but also in the thousands of messages of good-will which have come to me across seas from every part of the Empire. Such affectionate demonstrations have profoundly touched me, and have filled me afresh with faith and confidence.

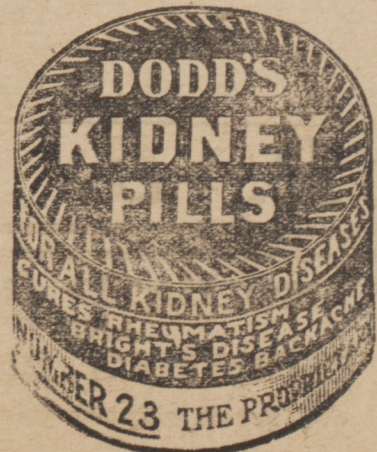
"Believing that this generous outpouring of sympathy with the Queen and myself is, under God, our surest source of strength, I am encouraged to go forward with the renewed hope that whatever perplexities or difficulties may be before me and my people we shall unite in facing them resolutely and calmly, and with public spirit, confident that under Divine guidance the ultimate outcome will be to the common good."

THIS IS HIS 38TH BIRTHDAY

Takashi Nakamura, who holds the important post of Consul-General for Japan in Canada, was born in Yuasamachi, Ku., Japan, July 3, 1873, and received his education in the best schools of his native land. Later he travelled extensively in Europe and America. In 1895, after a thorough preliminary training, he entered the Japanese diplomatic and consular service. For ten years he served at various points in Korea, in China and in the United States. From the latter country he was recalled in 1906 to fill the important position of secretary to the Foreign Office in Tokio. Three years later he was appointed to his present position of Consul-General in Canada.

Dublin, July 3.—The unveiling of the St. Gaudens monument of Charles Stewart Parnell, which was originally fixed to take place today, has been indefinitely postponed owing to the failure to complete the foundation for the memorial.



SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The contents of the Second Annual Report of the Commission of Conservation have been considered to be of such present and future importance that the volume has been substantially bound in cloth. The Report contains much that is of interest to the newspaper-reading public.

On page 24, in "Agricultural Work" many of the results obtained by an agricultural census of Canada. Last year the Commission sent out to 100 representative farms in each province to find out what was the condition of agriculture. The results show how great a field there is for the education of the farmer and the adoption of scientific methods of farming.

On page 24, in "Agricultural Work in Ontario," Mr. C. J. James, the Deputy Minister of Agriculture for that Province, shows how Ontario is solving the problem of the indifferent farmer by the District Representative System. Graduates of the Ontario Agricultural College are sent to live in agricultural communities and show the farmers how to farm scientifically. The story of what these young men are accomplishing in increasing production reads like a romance.

Instances are becoming more numerous in Canada of municipalities realizing how corporations having monopolies of water-powers in their vicinity can demand unreasonable prices for electricity. On page 19 will be found the principles re-granting of water-powers that were sanctioned by the Commission with a view to securing for the public its share of the unearned increment in water-powers.

Resolutions re forest fires set by railways will be found on page 11. These were placed before the Dominion Government and it is gratifying to know that at the last session of Parliament the Railway Act was so amended as to give the Railway Commission important powers for compelling railways to safeguard from the fire country through which they run.

On page 97, Mr. A. C. Flumerfelt gives a lucid description of the work done by the British Columbia Forestry Commission.

Some idea of the wide range of the activities of the Commission is to be had from the brief outline of the work done during the past year on page 105 and 113. Forecasts of reports to be issued within the next few months are there given.

At the Dominion Public Health Conference the Provincial and Dominion public health officials met for the first time to discuss national health problems. Their recommendations to the Government (page 153 et seq.) are of the first importance and deserve the widest possible publicity. As a result of these, it has recently been announced that a National Council of Health and a National Laboratory will be established by the Government (see p. 209), while at the last session of Parliament a bill to prevent the pollution of waterways (see p. 167) was introduced into the Senate.

PRINCE WILLIAM

June 30—The Presbyterian Sewing Circle of Prince William held their famous annual strawberry festival and sale on Wednesday, June 28th. There was an abundance of strawberries and other good things at supper, while refreshments of all sorts were sold outside in the booths, where also the ladies sold some of their fancy work. There were quite a number from a distance who seemed to enjoy renewing friendships. Everywhere smiles were seen, no where frowns, and not an angry word. Through an inadvertence the names of the winners of the ladies and gentlemen's bean toss were not announced. They were respectively Mrs. John Nicholson, Lake George, and Mr. Gerald Kelly of Kingsclear. The exact amount of the proceeds will probably be a trifle over \$70. The evening entertainment was provided by the school, under the efficient direction of Miss B. J. Norrad, who has had charge of the school for the last term. The audience were in good humor throughout, and their pleasure at the performances of the scholars was manifested in respected acclamations, to which they heartily responded. The concert consisted of choruses, solos and duets, dialogues, readings, and tableaux, all of which were rendered well and without any prompting, showing painstaking care in preparation. The sum realized was \$29.70.
