The ceremony took place in Trinity Cathedral, where gathered the largest assemblage of bishops, clergy and laymen ever within its walls. The complete ritualistic ceremony of the church was carried out in the consecration ceremonies. Bishop Tuttle of St. Louis presided.

## CONGRESS ON ALCOHOLISM, SOME STIRRING SCENES

### Representatives of Many European Nations in Favor of Total Prohibition—Cheers Great Record of Advancement in Canada

The Hague, Holland, Sept. 16—This is the closing day of the thirteenth International Congress on Alcoholism, which opened last Monday in the Kurhaus at Scheveningen, on the invitation of the Queen of the Netherlands and the Dutch Government. There are in attendance accredited delegates representing the Governments of Great Britain, the United States, Canada, Australia, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Austria, Hungary, Holland, Portugal, Roumania, Sweden, Switzerland and Uruguay. There was also present a great many persons representing organizations of various kinds, all gathered to discuss the great question of how most effectively to oppose the world-wide evil of intemperance. In all, the enrolled membership of the Congress numbers more than twelve hundred. Statesmen, scientists, social reformers and leaders of religious thought and life have brought their knowledge and skill to the duty assigned them, making the Conference representative, strong, and important in every way. Two delegates appointed by the Canadian Government have taken part in the proceedings. They are Controller F. S. Spence of Toronto and Mr. Justice E. Lafontaine of Montreal.

#### PRESENTATION OF FACTS

The Congress was opened on Monday evening with a municipal reception tendered by the Burgomaster and Aldermen of the city of The Hague. Business proper was taken up the morning of the following day, under the guidance of the Hon. Dr. A. L. Alma, Minister of Agriculture of the Government of Holland, who was chosen for the Presidency of the Congress. No resolutions were adopted. The Conference did not attempt to formulate declarations other than those prescribing procedure. It was a comprehensive expert presentation of facts, and a cordial exchange of opinion that sometimes varied widely. The principal topics discussed were the evil effects of intemperance in physical, social, and political life, and the methods by which those evils ought to be opposed and overcome. The effects of alcohol, directly and through heredity, on all human organs and vital functions; the relation of those effects to tuberculosis, insanity, and other pathological conditions; the treatment of habitual inebriety, the duties respectively of individuals, society and the State—these and similar subjects were dealt with in careful detail.

#### FOUR OFFICIAL LANGUAGES

The formal addresses at the opening of the Congress, by the President-elect, by the Hon. the Dean of Hereford on behalf of the Permanent Committee, and by the Secretary in a report reviewing the program of the anti-alcohol movement since last Congress, were inspiring deliverances of forcible expression. The official languages of the gathering were Dutch, English, French and German. Notices were printed, announcements made, and questions stated in all four, but no delegate was refused permission to speak in the language of his country.

Many women were present, titled ladies, widely-known reformers, and other less noted but equally earnest and advanced. A few took part in the discussions, and the appeals of some of these for the enfranchisement class in the interests of the temperance reform were cordially cheered.

#### IN FAVOR OF PROHIBITION

Some of the statements made by the men who dealt with the scientific side of the drink problem were remarkably clear-cut and forcible. "Alcohol is a poison, a cause or an ally of nearly every form of disease," might be said to be the sum of their conclusions. Total abstinence was strongly counseled by nearly all of them. The papers dealing with methods of organization and social effort were instructive. The climax of interest was, however, reached on the third day, when liquor legislation was the topic. It was stirring to hear strong speeches in favor of total prohibition from men of many European nations, and to note the hearty responses of their countrymen to those vigorous assertions. The great record of work done in the United States evoked very hearty greetings. Then when Canada's story of struggle and success was told the atmosphere grew electrically tense, and broke in a thunderstorm of enthusiastic applause.

#### LAC QUI PARLE CELEBRATES

Madison, Minn., Sept. 28—A three-day programme of festivities was ushered in here today in celebration of the fortieth anniversary of the organization of Lac qui Parle County. The county claims the distinction of being the place of birth of the first child born in Minnesota.

The cheque thus sent in will be returned to the respective contractors whose tenders are not accepted.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

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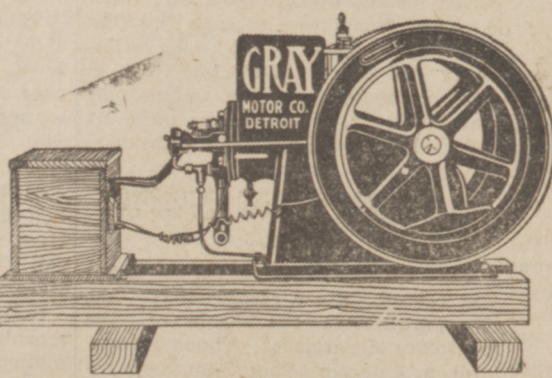
