LORD STRATHCONA

LANDS AT NEW YORK

New York, Sept. 28.—Lord Strathcona arrived tonight on the (Mauritania), accompanied by the Hon. Mrs. Robert Howard on a flying trip to Montreal and possibly to Ottawa.

His Lordship had expected to get away on the regular Montreal Express tonight, but a thick smoke so obscured the lower bay that it was long after eight o'clock before the big Cunarder reached her dock. Lord Strathcona declined to discuss reciprocity, explaining that as high commissioner he could not talk about any matter that was or had been a political issue in Canada.

"Is there any truth in the rumor that you have consented to spend another year in England as high commissioner?" he was asked.

His Lordship laughed heartily at the question and remarked:

"Why I am going right back on Wednesday next. This is only a flying visit. I hope to get off to Montreal tonight and get through my business in ample time to get this very boat back."

"Will you also visit Ottawa?"

"Why, Ottawa is only the door of Montreal. I may run up there too."

His Lordship remarked in the course of conversation that he could not recall how many voyages he had made across the ocean.

"It is well upwards of a hundred, and I have gone across in all kinds of ships. When I crossed for the first time, seventy-three years ago, I came over in a sailing vessel. We made the passage to Canada in forty-three days and the vessel was considered a very fast one at that. Now I have come over and will be back again in half that time."

LONDON ELECTS A
NEW LORD MAYOR

London, Sept. 29.—Having been an alderman for thirteen years and filled the office of Sheriff for one term, Sir Thomas Boor Crosby, wealthy merchant and financier, today went through the solemn farce of being elected Lord Mayor of the City of London. He will be formally installed in office on November 9, when the time-honored pageant known as the "Lord Mayor's Show" will take place.

Unlike all other great municipalities, London's Lord Mayor is not chosen by the people, though there was a time—some 200 or more years ago—when they really were elected by the citizens. But the aldermen, who are elected for life, decided that a position so exalted as that of Lord Mayor should not be thrown open to outsiders and made dependent on popular favor. So they fixed things up so that every alderman, if he live long enough, is assured of becoming Lord Mayor when his turns comes. When Sir Thomas Vesey Strong was elected last year, Sir Thomas Crosby was "next," and now it is his turn to take the civic chair.

The system pleases the aldermen and does not make much difference to anybody else. The office of Lord Mayor has long since been shorn of its once great powers and has become a mere figurehead billet, though it is invested with more fictitious dignity than any other post in England. No more violent contrast is to be found the world over than that existing between the various duties of the Lord Mayor. Theoretically, at least, the King of Great Britain and Ireland and Emperor of India cannot enter the city of London without his consent. Yet he spends a considerable part of each day dispensing justice upon the inebriates and other petty offenders who have broken the peace of the square mile of territory over which he rules.

In addition to his duties as a magistrate he is required to attend probably five hundred public and semi-public dinners, balls, receptions and meetings of various kinds during the year he spends in the high office. For these duties he receives a salary equal to that of the President of the United States and twice as much as that of the Prime Minister of Great Britain.

Perhaps it is as well that the Lord Mayor nowadays does not possess the supreme power of some of his early predecessors. The Mayor who did fealty to Henry III, for instance, had the temerity to add, "My lord, so long as you unto us will be a good lord and king, we will be faithful and dutiful unto you." When there was the Norman Mayor who, being interrupted by a member of the mob when reading what would now correspond to the Riot act, merely ordered the offender to be taken into the neighboring street to be beheaded, and went on reading.

SHREVEPORT RATE CASE

New Orleans, La., Sept. 29.—The so-called Shreveport rate case, in which the Louisiana Railroad Commission seeks to secure for Louisiana Texas freight business the same rates in force between points in Texas, came up for hearing before representatives of the Interstate Commerce Commission here today. The Texas railroads and the Texas Railroad Commission are the defendants. The case is of vast importance to the railroads and shippers of the two States. Should the contentions of Shreveport be sustained, either the Texas rates must be increased as to place them on an equal footing with those now applying from Shreveport to Texas points, or the interstate rates reduced to the Texas schedule, which latter step would enable Louisiana shippers to become strong competitors for Texas business.

CANADIAN METHODS
UNNERVED BRYAN

"I have been through three campaigns, but I have never been accused of anything so bad as the leaders up in Canada," said William Jennings Bryan, Thursday night in telling the Portland, Me., State Board of Trade of his visit to Nova Scotia, from which he had just returned.

Said Mr. Bryan: "I am glad to bring a word of encouragement from Canada. You will be pleased to know that I felt perfectly at home there. I never saw a place where public men are regarded as bad as I was, except in Canada." Mr. Bryan said he was unnerved at what he saw in Halifax.

He described at some length their electioneering methods and the way the city is placarded. He said one set of posters say that Halifax is doomed if the election goes one way, while others equally convincing say that to vote down reciprocity will be to commit suicide for the city. It is a case, according to them, of the nation being lost no matter which way the election goes. Mr. Bryan said he took occasion while down there to impress upon the people that their case is not so serious as they seem to think and that whichever side wins the great nation, for it is a great nation, will live and prosper and gain in wealth and importance for years to come.

Mr. Bryan then raised another laugh by telling how the partisan papers in Halifax treat the situation each one reflecting its own views all through its columns. He said it reminded him of a case of his own in which two papers, one Republican and the other Democratic, undertook to report one of his speeches. Each one colored it according to its views and he had always had a great laugh over this, thinking it was a unique experience. But since he had been down in the provinces he found the same thing going on exactly with the exception that over there they claim that all of the leaders of the other party are bad men, and if they cannot otherwise specify they assert that they are plotting against the government.

FOUR PERSONS KILLED
BY AN EARTHQUAKE

Port Limon, Costa Rica, Sept. 29.—A telegram from La Union, San Carlos, on the Pacific Coast of the Republic, received here yesterday, tells of an earthquake that destroyed many buildings in Los Canos de Aguas Zarcas. Four persons were killed and several others fatally injured.
