Miss Stokes 2.08 is the property of George Moore of Dromore farm. She cost him \$10,000 in cash, a portion of her winnings from Sept. 1, and the stallion Wolverine.

Floy Belle, 2.19; The Right, 2.20; Graham Bellis, 2.20; Dock C., 2.23; Buck Leyburn, 2.23 are 2-year-old trotters who have been winning over the half-mile tracks.

The Maine bred pacing stallion, Greenbrino Jr., owned by Lincoln Morrison of Medford, now carries a record of 2.12. He is by Greenbrino, 2.10 out of Suzette, 2.14 by Nelson 2.09.

JOHNSON AND WELLS CHEERED BY LONDON CROWD

People not against Bouts in London
—Injunction Secured by Landlord of Earl's Court

London, Sept. 28.—A crowd of sporting men filled the Bow Street police court yesterday for the hearing of Jack Johnson, Bombahier Wells, their managers, and James White, the promoter of the prize fight scheduled for Oct. 2 who had been summoned on the complaint that they were planning to commit a breach of the peace. The action was instigated by the public prosecutor following a decision of Home Secretary Churchill that the proposed contest would be illegal. The clergy and various organized bodies had protested against the holding of the event on moral grounds while it was disapproved by the authorities because of the probable effect upon the colored subjects of Great Britain which the defeat of a white man by a colored man would have.

TEST CASE

Regarded as a test case which might have a wide bearing on the future pugilism in England, great interest was aroused in the outcome. Prominent attorneys had been retained. Richard D. Muir and Travers Humphreys who prosecuted Dr. H. H. Crippen, the wife murderer appeared for the solicitor-general. Curtis Bennett represented Wells while Sir Forrest Fulton and Eustace Fulton looked after the interests of White. Frederick E. Smith, M. P., had been retained for the defence but was absent. Johnson was not represented by counsel. He announced "I appear for myself."

The court today granted the application of the district railway company the ground landlord of the Earl's Court for an injunction against the lessees of the building to stop the proposed Johnson-Wells fight subject to damages if the decision is reversed on trial.

NO ADJOURNMENT

The defence tried to obtain an adjournment contending that insufficient time had been given them in which to prepare a case upon which the whole future of the boxing depended. The Solicitor-General, Sir John Simon represented that since 1891 in twenty-two heavyweight championships the loser in fourteen had been so punished that he was unable to proceed. Johnson he said had knocked out the last three of his opponents. The hearing was adjourned until Friday to enable Frederick E. Smith to appear.

A great crowd outside cheered the boxers as they arrived at and left the place.

While these proceedings were being conducted the application of the district railway company which controls the freehold of Earl's Court for an injunction to restrain the lessees from permitting the fight was heard in the Vacation Court. The applicants claimed that the contest if held would endanger their license for the exhibition grounds.

The court granted the application subject to damages for the lessees if the decision of the court should be reversed at the Bow Street trial.

MATT WELLS MATCHED TO FIGHT IN TORONTO OCT. 6

New York, Sept. 29.—Matt Wells, lightweight champion of England, has been matched to fight Billy Donovan in a six round bout at the Stadium in Toronto (Ont.) on Oct. 6. The men will meet at 135 pounds. George McDonald manager of Wells, said he would not entertain another match for Wells in America with Freddy Welsh, but says his business is to match Wells with Packey McFarland and Ad. Wolgast, the lightweight champion. McDonald says McFarland is afraid to meet Wells, and that Wolgast demands half of New York as a guarantee. McDonald is willing to match Ward, the English lightweight against Freddy Welsh for a side wager of £500.

DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per week.

Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.
