## THE DELAY WILL COST THE PEOPLE MORE MONEY

No matter whether the legislative duties are neglected or not seems to be the motto which the government members of the House have adopted at the present time. "Anything to win York county" is apparently the cry.

Hon. Mr. McLeod has hardly spent an hour in the House since the campaign was called on. Other ministers have followed his lead to a considerable extent while the majority of the private members on the government side have been scouring the county at all times in the interests of Dr. Morehouse.

On one morning of last week when the Public Accounts Committee had been called to meet, the government members were not on hand, though both the Opposition members of the committee were in the House, waiting for the summons to the committee room. No notice whatever was given the Opposition men that the meeting would not take place.

This morning the Opposition men were again on hand at the time set for the meeting, but the committee was not called together. On this occasion, however, the Opposition men, after they reached the House, were told that the meeting would not take place. The government men, you know, are too busy trying to carry Morehouse against the tide of anti-government sentiment which is sweeping the county.

Every day the House sits means expense to the country and the course of the government members in neglecting their legislative duties means prolonging the session at additional cost to the people.

## IT'S VERY MUCH UP TO MR. FLEMMING AT PRESENT

Opposition Men Are Ready to Give the Provincial Secretary All the Chances He's Looking for--It's to be Hoped He'll do Better than at Meductic.

The Opposition party is ready to give the government speakers all the opportunities they want to meet supporters of Mr. Burden in joint debate.

The government was given an opportunity to send a representative to Meductic on Saturday evening to discuss the Valley Railway question with Mr. Carvell, M.P. Hon. Mr. Flemming put in appearance; the government people are sorry he went now.

If Mr. Flemming wants to talk Valley Railway with Mr. Carvell he will have a chance at the Opera House on Wednesday evening.

If Mr. Flemming wants to discuss provincial issues generally he will have a chance to meet Mr. A. B. Copp, M.P.P., at Marysville on Tuesday evening.

Dear Sir—In reply to your letter of the 24th inst., in which you state that Mr. Carvell will be pleased to meet Hon. Mr. Flemming in the Opera House on Wednesday evening, March 29th inst., there to discuss the Valley Railway question, I may say that I have been instructed by our Executive to advise you that Hon. Mr. Flemming will be pleased to meet Mr. Carvell on the above date. We will require half the time, which of course will be satisfactory to you.

We understand that Mr. Carvell is to address a meeting at Marysville on Tuesday evening. In view of Mr. Carvell's many statements that he is willing to meet Mr. Flemming at any time and at any place, I have been instructed by our Executive to say that Mr. Flemming will be pleased to meet Mr. Carvell at Marysville at his meeting there. As Marysville would not be so particularly interested in the Valley Railway project as the St. John River sections we would expect Mr. Carvell to deal with the general

issues of the campaign, and would be prepared to meet him on any and every subject relating to the administration of the public business by the present or past government of this province.

Copp, he referred the matter to the Liberal Executive and I am instructed by them to inform you that there has been a special request for Mr. Copp's appearance at Marysville and as there will be some difficulty dividing the time between three speakers, to suggest that Hon. ### MOCK PARLIAMENT

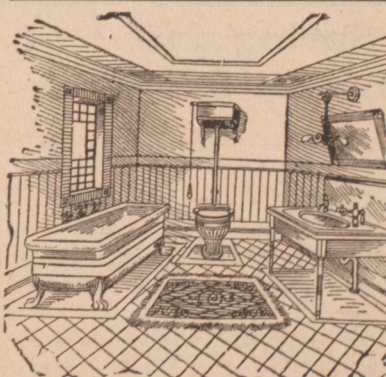
