#### THE REORGANIZATION ARRANGEMENTS

(Toronto Globe)

Before the Minister of Militia proeeds with the reorganization of the land defences of the Dominion along effect of a general arbitration treaty between Great Britain and the United States on the military needs of Canada. There is no qoubt that the movement for the adoption of a treaty providing for the arbitration of all disputes whatsoever is a serious one. Within a year or two there may be no more possibility if war the border between Canada and the United States than there is on between Ontario and

At present ot is the obvious duty of our military chiefs to make their plans upon the supposition that the United States may be hostile. Under the new conditions-perpetual peace being assured on our land borders by an unlimited treaty of arbitration-we could direct all our energies toward safeguarding our Pacific and Atlantic coasts, the only remaining frontiers upon which an attack could be launched.

Under such conditions it is obvious that a much larger part of the money spent on defence than is at present devoted to maval expenditure should be set apart for coast defence We could not hope to prevent at all times and under all conditions the landing of hostile troops on Canadian soil. Land forces would thereference to the country in which they The militia forces of the interior young peach trees. rovinces could be utilized as parts a very carefully organized plan of efence for coast provinces.

It may be that some day Canada will be in a position to maintain a highly trained "striking force" for use outside of the Dominion should occasion arise. It is to be hoped that no attempt &ill be made to orgamize such a force prematurely, but that the militia will be fashioned in to an organization specially intended for the defence of the Maritime Provinces on both coasts. It is by the ocean that an enemy must come if perpetual peace is secured for the various branches of the Anglo-Saxon race oh this continent.

The second resolution was one movshown today when Mr. J. J. Fee, who ed by Mr. Roblin at the suggestion of a member of the Opposition yesterday, and appoints a joint committee from both sides of the House to proceed to Ottawa and re-open tiations on the question of the site for the new Parliament buildings, for which the Dominion wants \$1,000,000 It is contended that the Dominion was given this land by the Hudson's Bay Company for public purposes, for any but public purposes, so that the value set upon it is entirely erroneous, and the committee has power to suggest to the Federal Depart ment of Militia means by which the Province would accommodate the built or secured, as the Legislature is unanimous that it cannot wait five years or six years before getting the new buildings.
