Word has drifted into Fredericton of a love-feast which took place in a public store at Pokiak a few days ago with Hon. Mr. McLeod and his loving colleague, Hon. Mr. Maxwell, as the participants. Just how the function started is not known here but, at all events, the two gentlemen who try to help in guiding the provincial ship of state became involved in an argument in respect to some Crown Land matters. They may have been discussing the question as to why certain people paid a tunpage arrears when the Opposition people began to ask questions as to who really were in arrears or they may have been discussing the Autocrat of the Crown Lands, Hon. Ward Chipman Hazen Grimmer, himself. But no matter what they were discussing they threw moderation to the winds and provided some very interesting entertainment for the by-standers who gathered to listen to a couple of the members of the same government tell one another just what they thought of the other fellow.

Fortunately, they did not pass beyond the stage of verbal warfare but they are reported to have certainly made the language crackle in a fiery way. One by-stander ventured the remark that apparently the Hazen government is a very happy family. This didn't make McLeod-Maxwell matters any calmer and when it was again suggested that to bring about the highest degree of happiness Mr. McLeod's friend, Mr. Pinder, should be sent for, there was nearly a crisis.

Happily, however, so the story goes, nothing more came out of the affair than a telephone message sent to Fredericton by the genial and modest Solicitor General declaring that he must have another man to travel with him as he couldn't stand Maxwell any longer. At last, though, the sulphur drifted out of the air, and the loving brothers are again on the stump together. But, oh, if Mr. Pinder and Mr. Slipp had only been there, with Hon. John Morrissey thrown in for good measure!

THE REORGANIZATION OF THE MILITIA

(Toronto Globe)

Before the Minister of Militia proceeded with the reorganization of the land defences of the Dominion along the lines laid down by Sir John French it would be well to study the effect of a general arbitration treaty between Great Britain and the United States on the military needs of Canada. There is no doubt that the movement for the adoption of a treaty providing for the arbitration of all disputes whatsoever is a serious one. Within a year or two there may be no more possibility of war on the border between Canada and the United States than there is on the border between Ontario and Manitoba.

At present it is the obvious duty of our military chiefs to make their plans upon the supposition that the United States may be hostile. Under the new conditions—perpetual peace being assured on our land borders by an unlimited treaty of arbitration—we could direct all our energies toward safeguarding our Pacific and Atlantic coasts, the only remaining frontiers upon which an attack could be launched.

Under such conditions it is obvious that a much larger part of the money spent on defence than is at present devoted to naval expenditure should be set apart for coast defence. We could not hope to prevent at all times and under all conditions the landing of hostile troops on Canadian soil. Land forces would therefore still be necessary but they would have to be drilled with special reference to the country in which they would have to fight—British Columbia, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Quebec. For British Columbia's defence coast artillery, mountain batteries, plenty of engineers and in fantry equipped for campaigning in mountainous regions would be essential. In the Maritime Provinces the woodsman trained as a sharpshooter would be the most useful, apart from coast artillery for the defence of Halifax, St. John and other ports. The militia forces of the interior Provinces could be utilized as parts of a very carefully organized plan of defence for coast provinces.

It may be that some day Canada will be in a position to maintain a highly trained "striking force" for use outside of the Dominion should occasion arise. It is to be hoped that no attempt will be made to organize such a force prematurely, but that the militia will be fashioned in to an organization specially intended for the defence of the Maritime Provinces on both coasts. It is by the ocean that an enemy must come if perpetual peace is secured for the various branches of the Anglo-Saxon race on this continent.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE CORONATION

London, Mar. 25—King George has decided that the Archbishop of Canterbury shall crown the Queen as well as him next June. This is in accordance with the precedent of the early times, practically the only exception being at the Coronation of King Edward when Queen Alexandra was crowned by the Archbishop of York. There was no sermon at the coronation of King Edward, the service having been specially shortened owing to the fact that the King had not completely recovered from a serious illness, but at the approaching Coronation, the sermon will be preached by the Archbishop of York.

King George is gaining in popularity daily by the determination he is showing to obtain an insight into the everyday people. Last evening the King, accompanied by the Queen and Princess Mary, paid a surprise visit to the new General Post Office and spent two hours in investigating its immense ramifications.

The King and Queen sent cordial greetings to the European capitals and witnessed with interest the replies coming over the wires.

THE BENEFITS OF RECIPROCITY

St. Catharines, March 23—Another case of real evidence as to how little fear is entertained on the part of practical fruit men of proposed reciprocity with the United States was shown today when Mr. J. J. Fee, who already has several valuable farms, formed a partnership with Mr. J. L. Weller, chief engineer of the Welland Canal, in the purchase of thirty acres of land in the north-easterly end of the city, which for years has been known as "Gardner's Bush." Twenty acres are now clear, and an order has been given for twenty-seven hundred peach trees, which will be set out at once. The other ten acres, which will be cleared, will also be set with young peach trees.

COLBURN FAVORS RECIPROCITY

Colborne, Mar. 23—"Will reciprocity help us?" is a question that is generally being asked here, and there are many who believe that it will. "Go back thirty years," said one citizen, "when we had free trade, and I have seen a mile of teams standing one behind the other, waiting to be unloaded. Then vessels were loaded at the docks here almost daily. A considerable quantity of barley was grown, and farmers got big prices. Now it is estimated that there is grain brought into Colborne than is shipped out." At present large quantities of apples are shipped yearly from Colborne, but the apple-men are not afraid of reciprocity hurting this industry. In fact, farms with good orchards command a better price than ever before.

MANITOBA REJECTS BOUNDARY OFFER

Winnipeg, March 24.—Two resolutions, both directed against the Dominion government policy with regard to Manitoba, passed unanimously in the Manitoba Legislature today, both being proposed by Premier Roblin and seconded by Liberal Whip Valentine Winkler of Rhineland, in the unavoidable absence of Liberal Leader Norris, who, it was announced, was favorable to both. First was the resolution refusing to accept the added territory proposed to be given Manitoba and the proposed financial terms.

MR. ROBLIN'S VIEW.

In speaking of this Mr. Roblin reviewed the negotiations since 1901, and claimed that the Federal authorities had always refused to give Manitoba equality of terms. He asserted that Manitoba was entitled both by the decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council and by the act of the Dominion Parliament, which the Dominion Government had refused to put into force by proclamation, to all the land on the northern boundary of Ontario, which it was now proposed to give to Ontario. As to the question of terms, he asserted that at one of the interviews with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Wilfrid offered to give the public domain in the new territory of Manitoba, but when Mr. Rogers promptly accepted, the offer was withdrawn by Sir Wilfrid, who said that it was only a suggestion and could not be dealt with.

Another allegation made by Premier Roblin was that in all the negotiations with Ottawa when the question of financial terms had come up the Provincial delegates had offered to allow the swamp lands to be capitalized at five per cent. and the amount deducted. He claimed that the present offer gave Manitoba only fifty cents for every dollar now paid to Alberta and Saskatchewan, and yet those Provinces were dissatisfied and asking for more.

SIR WILFRID THE ENEMY.

Mr. Roblin asserted there were not twenty-five public men in Canada today who would not give Manitoba better terms, and alleged that the last offer was an insult, and that any Government and any man at the head of it, except Sir Wilfrid, would be willing to consider Manitoba's case upon the facts.

Mr. Valentine Winkler, Liberal member for Rhineland, in the unavoidable absence of Mr. Norris, Leader of the Opposition, seconded the resolution with which, he stated, the Opposition was in perfect agreement. The resolution was then carried unanimously.

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS SITE.

The second resolution was one moved by Mr. Roblin at the suggestion of a member of the Opposition yesterday, and appoints a joint committee from both sides of the House to proceed to Ottawa and re-open negotiations on the question of the site for the new Parliament buildings, for which the Dominion wants \$1,000,000. It is contended that the Dominion was given this land by the Hudson's Bay Company for public purposes, and that it cannot be sold or used for any but public purposes, so that the value set upon it is entirely erroneous, and the committee has power to suggest to the Federal Department of Militia means by which the Province would accommodate the troops until other barracks could be built or secured, as the Legislature is unanimous that it cannot wait five years or six years before getting the new buildings. If the negotiations prove a failure, the local Government have intimated that they will abolish the official residence of the Lieutenant Governor and use that site for the new buildings.

The City Council is unanimous with the Legislature in regard to the site asked for as the only proper one.

LOCOMOTIVE RAN AWAY IN OTTAWA DEPOT

Ottawa, March 25—Engine 1259 was left standing in Union Depot last evening the crew having abandoned it to the hostlers who left it standing for a few minutes preparatory to moving it into the engine house. Suddenly the locomotive started to back up at great speed, and before any one could reach it to shut off the steam, it dashed into the front of the engine on Gaitneau train which was just slowly backing into the station. One woman on the train was injured.
