OWNER OF PROF.
SPHINX MAY HAVE
OPERATED IN N. S.

Albert Richardson Raced Ringer at
Truro Twenty-two Years ago--
Thought to be the Same

(Acadian Recorder.)
The case of the ringer Prof. Sphinx
2:11, who is now claimed to be
Jack London, 2:12, which has at-
tracted so much attention throughout
the turf world, will recall to some
Maritime Province turfmen an inci-
dent of a visit of American horsemen
to the Provinces, in which a ringer
figured, and in which the driver's
name proved to be Albert Richard-
son, the same as the man who entered
Prof. Sphinx this year. He came
from Massachusetts, as does the pre-
sent Richardson, and when his horse
was protested he and his trotter left
the country as Prof. Sphinx and his
driver when they were protested at
Montreal this year.

TWENTY-TWO YEARS AGO.

This happened twenty-two years
ago, in the Maritime Province races
1889. There were two horses brought
here from across the border, Kittie
C., a trappy-gaited black mare, en-
tered by J. Churchill, Lowell, Mass.,
and Jackson, a lofty bay gelding,
entered by C. Johnson, Lowell, Mass.
There were some suspicions about
both horses, but more particularly of
the latter. He made his first start
at Truro, Sept. 3, 1889, in the 2:37
class, when he was protested by Peter
Carroll, who asked for identifica-
tion. Johnson took the oath that
the horse was eligible and gave his
address as Charles Johnson, Malden,
Mass. Johnson retaliated by pro-
testing Peabody, driven by Peter
Carroll, that he had a record of 2:34,
made at Bangor, but telegrams showed
his record was 2:38. The St. John
mare, Maud C., won the race in 2:33 1/2
2:34 1/2, 2:36 1/2, with Jackson second,
Peabody, Lord Dufferin and Joe
Hooke, finishing in the order named.
He raced the next day in the 2:28
class, when he was again second,
Bronze Chief winning in 2:30 1/2, 2:30 1/2,
2:30. He was again protested, and
his winnings were held up. Jackson
was a bay gelding, with numerous
grey hairs, rather leggy, with long
high neck, was of the peacock style,
and gave the appearance that he had
raced before, though his driver said
he did not know that he had a record.
Horsemen then wondered why John-
son did not enter him in the slow
classes, and this added to the suspi-
cion.

POSITIVELY IDENTIFIED.

A horseman who was at the Truro
races said he was positive that he
had seen the horse race in Massachu-
setts, and that Jackson was a horse
called Chinaman and Johnson's pro-
per name was Richardson. A groom
who had worked in Boston was also
of the same opinion. With the infor-
mation given above available, the
sporting editor of The Recorder, who
was at the races, communicated with
the National Trotting Association. A
letter from Mayor Palmer of Lowell,
gave evidence that everything was
regular about Kitty C. and her driver,
but investigations by the Associa-
tion showed that the descriptions of
Jackson answered that of Chinaman,
a horse of unknown breeding, with a
record of 2:29 1/2, and furthermore that
Chinaman and Albert Richardson
were not at home and had left for
the Maritime Provinces.

LEFT PROVINCES.

The speedy recognition at Truro of
Jackson and Johnson as Chinaman
and Richardson deterred the latter
from racing his horse in Nova Scotia
again; their only start was at Truro
and they then left the country. It
will thus be seen how much similarity
there is between Prof. Sphinx and
Jackson case, which would seem to
indicate that the Richardson men-
tioned might be the one and the same.

JENNINGS' CONDITION
IS MUCH IMPROVED

Scranton, Penn., Dec. 4--The critical
condition of Hugh Jennings who with
Rev. Peter J. Lynett, was injured in
an automobile accident Friday night
is somewhat improved tonight and it
is now believed by his physicians that
he is out of danger.

Mr. Lynett's condition is worse.
Pneumonia has set in and it is feared
he cannot successfully combat it in
his weakened condition.

SEVEN HORSES BOUGHT AT NEW YORK EXPECTED SATURDAY

Master Walnut Bought by J. E. Sullivan of Queen
Hotel, best bred horse ever Brought into this Sec-
tion--Society Lead Bought by Same--Wm. A.
Clarke Buys Stallion Keros and Two Mares--Roy
W. Smith buys Stallion Star Todd and Hackney

Seven horses purchased by local
horsemen at the New York sale dur-
ing the past week are expected to
arrive here on Saturday. Messrs.
William A. Clark and Roy W. Smith,
who, with Mr. J. E. Sullivan, made
the purchases, will come with the
horses. Mr. Sullivan and Ald. H. C.
Jewett arrived here last night. The
importation will be about the best
that ever came into this section. The
breeding of Mr. Sullivan's horses is
given below and that of the balance
of the importation will appear in
these columns tomorrow.

RECEIVED GOOD OFFERS.

Mr. Sullivan's best purchase is
Master Walnut, the best bred horse
that has ever come into this section
of the country. A full brother of
Master Walnut was sold at New York
last year for \$2,200. Mr. Sullivan
was pressed by the Fasig Tipton peo-
ple to allow the horse to be again
put up for sale but declined. He
also received an offer which was
\$500 above the price he had paid, but
refused to consider it.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

ANY PERSON who is the sole head
of a family, or any male over eigh-
teen years old, may homestead a
quarter section of available Domin-
ion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan
or Alberta. The applicant must ap-
pear in person at the Dominion Lands
Agency for the district. Entry by
proxy may be made at any agency,
on certain conditions, by father,
mother, son, daughter, brother or
sister of intending homesteader.
Duties--Six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each
of three years. A homesteader may
live within nine miles of his home-
stead on a farm of at least eighty
acres, solely owned and occupied by
him or by his father, mother, son,
daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader
in good standing may pre-empt a
quarter section alongside his home-
stead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties
--Must reside upon the homestead or
(including the time required to earn
homestead patent) and cultivate fifty
acres extra.
A homesteader who has exhausted
his homestead right and cannot ob-
tain a pre-emption, may enter for a
purchased homestead in certain dis-
tricts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties
--Must reside six months in each
of three years, cultivate fifty acres and
erect a house worth \$300.00.
