LORD DECIES AND HIS CHARMING BRIDE



LORD DECIES

MISS VIVIEN GOULD

On February 7th, Helen Vivien, second daughter of George J. Gould, head of one of the wealthiest and most prominent families in America, was married at St. Bartholomew's Episcopal church in Madison avenue at four o'clock in the afternoon, to Lord Decies, an English army officer. She is eighteen years old and he is forty-four.

The church was packed with a brilliant assemblage, representing the best of New York's social and professional life, together with a sprinkling of foreign nobility, relatives and friends of the bridegroom.

Outside in the slushy streets there pushed and shoved the usual crowd of

curious persons, whose persistency makes police arrangements such a necessary part of a fashionable wedding in New York. Yet, notwithstanding the crowd, there was no untoward incident, and none of the many "ran's," who have assailed Lord Decies in anonymous communications, made themselves known.

The ceremony was performed by Bishop David H. Greer, of the Episcopal diocese of New York, and the Rev. Dr. Leighton Parks, rector of St. Bartholomew's. Geo. Gould gave his daughter away and Miss Edith Gould, the bride's next oldest sister, was maid of honor. Lord Alastair Graham, R.N., a son of the Duke of

Montrose, was best man.

LAVISH DECORATIONS.

The church was profusely decorated and the color scheme was green and white. At the entrance of every third pew stood tall slender vases, twined with asparagus and filled with one hundred Easter lilies. From the vaulted roof above hung festoons of feathery asparagus. The windows were massed alternately with Easter lilies and marguerites; the chancel was a mass of spring blossoms and on either side of the altar stood tall palms for a background. Banked against them were white lilac trees, tall calla lilies, apple blossoms and marguerites.

GROOM IN FULL UNIFORM.

The guests began to assemble more than an hour before the wedding. A few were admitted, but through a hitch in the arrangements, more than one hundred shivered outside the church door on the sidewalk for a quarter of an hour. At 3.15 Lord Decies arrived, nearly an hour before his bride's car stopped at the curb. He was resplendent in his uniform of the Seventh Hussars, a glitter with service medals and gold braid. He carried a plumed helmet in the crook of his arm and wore a sabre.

Unnoticed by most of the crowd, he entered the church surrounded by a group of friends, who were apparently taking no chance with cranks. He was as calm as a soldier should be, but a bit perturbed left the crowd should jostle the bride-to-be on her arrival. The police arrangements had been planned carefully however, the line held and there was no rushing of a bridal party, such as occurred when Marjorie Gould married Anthony Drexel last year.

MANY ATTENDANTS.

A cheer went up as George Gould and his daughter stepped from a big limousine car and entered the church and as they did so the first sunshine of the day peeped forth. A moment later the notes of the wedding march sounded. This was at 4.15 and Lord Decies and his best man appeared at the chancel. The six bridesmaids, carrying lilies of the valley, led the bridal party. They were followed by the little attendants, baby Gloria Gould with Master William Beresford and Diana Dalzell with Master Marcus Beresford. Miss Edith Gould, as maid of honor, came next, immediately preceding the bride and her father.

The ceremony was over in twenty-three minutes, and Lord and Lady Decies posed for a moment for a battery of cameras before their car whisked them away to the reception at the Gould mansion on Fifth avenue.

CONFESSES AGAIN TO KINRADE MURDER

London, Feb. 9.—John Corry told the Deal police that he murdered a girl in Canada two years ago. He was charged with being a wandering lunatic. Corry made a statement that he had been incited to shoot a girl named Kinrade in Hamilton Ont by an American who gave him \$100 and secured passage for time on a cattle boat bound for Birkenhead. The magistrates ordered Corry detained at Chatham asylum while further enquiries could be made.

The circumstances surrounding the Kinrade murder are still too fresh in the mind of the public to need retelling. Corry is presumably the same man who made an almost identical confession in London at the time, but was adjudged insane.

LUMBER COMPANY WILL PLANT TREES

St. John, N. B. Feb. 9.—Following an extensive investigation of reforestation an American lumber company, now operating in New Brunswick, plans immediate action in reforesting the more denuded parts of the province. Nurseries will be established at Salmon River and Martins River, where three will be grown from seed. The company has fifty thousand acres at Cookshire, Quebec, which will be seeded this spring.

The work to be done this year is understood is merely preparatory to extensive reforestation in New Brunswick and Maine.

LADY WARWICK ON THE YELLOW PRESS

New York, Feb. 9.—The 'Herald' today prints the following special cable from London:

Lady Warwick, in a letter to the 'Times' regarding her experience with scandal-mongers says:

"Twenty-one years ago at a Doncaster race party, occurred what was termed 'The Tranby Croft Scandal'. The American press without exception published my portrait beneath the heading, 'The babbling brook'—my father-in-law being then alive—accused me of having at this house party revealed the facts of the scandal to the public, and saying that but for my indiscretion this affair might have been kept secret."

"I have never been at Tranby Croft in my life. At the time this party was held, I with all the members of my family was in Scotland at the death bed of my stepfather. The subsequent funeral and our deep mourning prevented me for a long time from joining in any social gatherings so that I was among the last to hear of what at that time set society agog."

"Nevertheless American papers persisted in this story whenever my name was mentioned, and when written to they replied that the facts had been sent to them by their correspondent in London—a lady moving in the best society."

"From time to time during the twenty-one years this story has been reprinted, and when in New York three years ago my having managed to elude an interviewer did not prevent the reappearance of the inevitable portrait and the inevitable tale."

"In course of time if my obituary notice is mentioned in the American press, I have no doubt the latest edition of a story for which there was not even a foundation will figure for the last time."
