SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

TORIES FLIRTING WITH NATIONALISTS

Orrawa, Ont., Feb. 9.—There is some flirting going on between the Nationalists and the Conservatives. Mr. Bourassa is in Ottawa, and last night there was a dinner at which there was present Messrs. Bourassa, Monk, Blondin, Paquet, Nantel, Lortie and Gilbert.

It is evident that there was a purpose in the meeting between the Nationalists' leader and the French Conservative and Nationalist members from the Province of Quebec, and it is certain that more than the weather was talked of, for the affair was held in one of the private dining rooms of the House of Commons restaurant, and it was arranged that the party should be served by a waiter who did not understand a word of French.

The conference around the board was long and confidential, and as a result there was another conference this morning. This was between Mr. Bourassa and Mr. George Perley, the chief Conservative whip. The two gentlemen spent the better part of an hour together in the chief whip's room in the House of Commons, though Mr. Borden and his English Conservative followers waited to get the support of Mr. Monk and other French Nationalists to the official Conservative naval amendment. It is understood that there is a feeling that it will be possible for the Conservatives and the Nationalists to get together on the reciprocity agreement and show a united front, which they hope will prove inconvenient to the Government.

U. N. B. TIED WITH ACADIA AFTER 80 MINUTES OVERTIME

U. N. B. Led 2 to 1 at Half-time—Acadia Evened Score in Second Half—Eight Ten Minute Periods Overtime Played—Babbitt, Feeney and Sterling U. N. B. Stars—Barss, Murray and Richmond for Acadia.

Wolfville, N. S., Feb. 10.—The ice was in good shape and enthusiasm ran high tonight when about 600 people saw Acadia and U. N. B. play The game ended in a tie after eighty minutes overtime the score being 2 to 2.

The game was characterized by considerable mixing up. Of the visitors, Sterling, Feeney and Babbitt shone, while Barss, Murray and Richmond were the pick of Acadia.

FIRST HALF

Play was around centre. Machum carried the puck to Acadia's end and was checked by Barss who got one minute. Potter and Forrey carried the puck to U. N. B.'s end, and Curry tallied the first goal after two minutes play. In one minute Feeney evened the score. Barss and Potter got a minute for tripping. Sterling got five minutes for tripping. After ten minutes' play, Feeney found Acadia's net making the score 2 to 1 in favor of the visitors.

SECOND HALF

Murray took the place of Curry, who was injured in the first half. From the face-off play went to the U. N. B. end. Barry and Feeney

combined but failed on a shot. Richmond carried the puck to the U. N. B. end and passed to Correy, who shot Acadia's second goal.

Play lingered around the U. N. B. goal and Binney stopped some hot ones. Potter got two minutes for tripping. Barry got hurt and caused a delay of ten minutes of the game. Play ended with the puck in the centre of the ice. Score 2 to 2

OVERTIME

After a twenty minutes' delay, play continued in ten minute periods. Potter and Machum were sent off for five minutes for roughing it. The U. N. B. goal was bombarded by Correy, Murray and Richmond. Babbitt made a pretty rush but Barss blocked. Murray made a pretty dribble but Sterling tripped and got three minutes. Murray dribbled and sagged the net, but the whistle had blown for off-side.

At the end of forty minutes' over-play the captains tossed the puck to decide whether they would play further or not. Play continued but after eighty minutes' over-play the score still stood 2 to 2, and the men being too tired to continue the game, it ended in a tie.

MONCTON PROS OUTPLAYED NEW GLASGOW SCORE 6 to 3

New Glasgow, Feb. 10.—The horse-shoe that Doctor Worman hung up in the dressing room when New Glasgow went on the ice tonight, did not prove the magnet of good luck that was hoped for, and New Glasgow went down to defeat before Moncton, by the score of 6 to 3. However, the horse-shoe was not altogether to blame, for lack of team-work on the part of New Glasgow was for the most part responsible for defeat.

Of course the almost unimpregnable defence of Doran, Brown and Worman had considerable to do in balancing the scales of victory, while the fast forwards, Scott, Nicholls, Crockett and Norman were important factors in clinching the game for the railway town. There was something about the home team tonight that fans can hardly express. Something lacking that should have been there, but it was not. For one thing, Jimmie Williams, the little speed marvel, could not get away. He was watched and watched closely. One or two times he did get loose only to be held up by that great cover point, Mr. Doran.

MIKE MURPHY WORKED HARD.

Mike Murphy, while playing a good effective defence game, did not produce any of his usual brilliant rushes. Gregory was the hard-working man on the team. He stayed with the fast Moncton forwards all the time, and it was no fault of Gregory's that New Glasgow lost. On New Glasgow's wing there was something lacking. Simpson and Dunphy seemingly played hard, but they did not hold Norman and Crockett.

Cooke was very much in evidence

in the game and made many nice rushes. Morrison was a busy man, and he made good. A good many more shots went against Morrison's pads than went into the nets.

LIKE CLOCKWORK.

It was the machine-like working of Moncton that took the admiration of the 2,000 spectators. Four abreast, they came down the ice, and as straight as a line. Every man in his position and their combination plays were of great assistance in their scoring. It was generally conceded that the best team won. Although the judge of play, Mr. Dehant, came in for a greater amount of hissing than he was entitled to, although his judgment at times, was not what it might have been. Wisener, who had the game in charge, handled the game satisfactorily and at all events Moncton can be satisfied that she got a square deal in New Glasgow.

There has been a great deal of talk for some years past, both in America and Europe, but particularly in such British periodicals as John Bull, concerning conditions in the steerage of transatlantic vessels, and the treatment to which unprotected women are there exposed. In order to avoid the possibility of any such criticism in connection with its new Royal line, the Canadian Northern Railway has decided to place matrons in the steerage of their boats, irrespective of what provision may be made by the various immigration societies in order to guarantee the good treatment of its women passengers. The first of these personally conducted parties left Bristol yesterday afternoon in the Royal Edward, under the charge of Mrs. Morrison. According to local officials, the public are already showing appreciation of this step in their bookings and while the exact numbers were not yet known, the Royal Edward's steerage passenger list is said to be an unusually large one for this time of year.

Notice of Legislation

The City of Fredericton will present at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, of New Brunswick Bills for enactment as follows:

- (1) A Bill to extend the Water, Fire and Light limits of the City of Fredericton from O'Dell Avenue to the Hermitage (so called) and for authority to issue debentures in aid of such extension.
- (2) A Bill in aid of John Palmer Company, Limited, authorizing the City to enter into an agreement with the Company to guarantee and pay interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on ten thousand dollars of the Company's debentures for the space of ten years, upon the erection by the Company of a new Factory and Warehouse in this city at a cost of not less than twenty-five thousand dollars, to provide a free site for such Factory and Warehouse by paying ground rent for the period of twenty-one years, and to grant exemption from taxes on such buildings of the company and free water from the city system for the period of ten years.
- (3) A Bill revising and amending the Civic Election Laws of the City of Fredericton, and to provide for a secret ballot thereat, and the election of the Mayor and Aldermen for two years, one Alderman for each ward being elected annually.
- (4) A Bill to confirm the issue of Street Debentures.
