BIG SNOWSTORM

HEADING THIS WAY

Toronto, Feb. 7.—The storm which was centered in Indiana yesterday has passed on the middle Atlantic and will now probably move northward to the maritime provinces. The snowfall has been heavy in Southern Ontario and light to the north and east. The weather is fairly cold throughout the Dominion and the snow has been falling steadily in Quebec.

SURFACE DRAINAGE.

A report of City Engineer Feeney, on surface drainage, was presented to the City Council last night. The report stated that \$629 had been spent upon surface sewers and \$1201.49 on the improvement of the back drain, the expenditure on which had been estimated at \$1200. The City Engineer recommended the construction of a new surface sewer along the entire length of York street before that street should be paved. He also recommended that an application be made to the Militia Department for permission to lay a surface sewer direct from Wilmet's Alley to the river, through military property.

TORIES IN A BAD FIX OVER RECIPROCITY

Cannot Agree Over It and Their Leader Had to Ask for Postponement of the Debate Until Thursday--Liberals Are Unanimous for the Agreement.

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—The opposition has secured two days of grace from the reciprocity discussion. This was obtained by the personal application of R. L. Borden to Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

There were two caucuses this morning. The Liberals had an enthusiastic and unanimous meeting, at which all of the sentiments expressed were strongly in favor of the measure for reciprocity, which Messrs Fielding and Paterson brought back from Washington.

The Conservatives at their caucus, could not come to an agreement as to the attitude which they should adopt toward the measure. There was talk of raising the disloyalty cry and waving the flag, but the Conservatives from the west pointed out that this would commit them against the bill, and they would be compelled to vote against it. It was decided to seek more delay and in this Mr. Borden was successful, Sir Wilfrid feeling that the more the measure is studied the more popular it is bound to become, and he readily acceded to the request.

As a result when the house opened in the afternoon Sir Wilfrid announced that as a result of an understanding between Mr. Borden and himself, the discussion of the reciprocity measure would not be resumed until Thursday.

The remainder of the sitting was devoted to the passing of public works estimates for public buildings in the far west.

TAFT SANGUINE

Washington Feb. 7.—President Taft is satisfied with the progress which is being made looking toward the

passing by congress of the reciprocity agreement between this country and Canada. Although he had expected opposition to the measure he thinks that on the whole it has been well received by the people of the United States and there has been much less genuine opposition than he had expected.

Among the White House callers today who discussed reciprocity with the president were Representatives McCall and Mann.

LUMBERMEN SATISFIED

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—Contrary to expectations, the Canadian Lumbermen's Association did not take any action with regard to reciprocity at their annual meeting here this afternoon. It has been reported recently that the western branch of the association has taken a decided stand on the matter, but explanations given at the meeting showed that some misapprehension had been created by the reports sent out of their meeting. No resolution was passed by the association.

The lumbermen will ask the board of railway commissioners to review their orders relating to export freight rates on lumber. The question has been before the board recently and the lumbermen are not satisfied with the decision.

Reports of the various officers showed that the association has had a very satisfactory year. It now has eighty-one members, divided among the provinces as follows:

Ontario, 47; Quebec, 17; British Columbia, 5; Manitoba, 1; and Saskatchewan, 1. The retiring board of directors were all re-elected.

MANEY TORIES WILL SUPPORT RECIPROCITY

Among the well-informed at Ottawa, it is considered doubtful whether much more than a half dozen of Opposition members would vote against the ratification of the tariff agreement with the United States, if it once became clear that the Americans mean to back up President Taft. Indeed, only the uncertainty on that point enables the Opposition to make any show of resistance at all. So long as there is a chance that the agreement may fall of ratification, so long therefore as there is a chance that the hopes which have been raised may be disappointed, those on the Opposition side who condemn Mr. Fielding are left to do the talking. If the affair takes a bad turn the others, now silent, can fall in and attack the government on any plan they like, but if it becomes clear that the agreement is really to be made effective then, when it comes to the vote, the members who are now silent will make the influence felt. The Western Conservative members, who came to the session eager and determined to advocate some form of that reciprocity for which the grain growers have been clamoring, make little secret of the admission that the agreement is what the west wants, and that it involves far more than they ever believed could be attained. They can be counted upon to vote for it almost to a man, notwithstanding the angry invective of Mr. Robert Rogers, because they realize that otherwise, and perhaps anyhow, the Liberals stand to sweep the

M. P. A. A. REPRESENTATIVE TALKS OF BROGAN'S AND TITUS' CASE

St. John, Feb. 8.—"There will be no reinstatement of Brogan of the Marysville Hockey Team, nor will the St. John-Fredericton game be replayed." This is the decision given by A. W. Covey, acting for the M.P. A.A.A., in reply to the demand of the Marysville team and E. P. Howard, manager of the St. John team. It has been shown that Brogan was once a member of the Clipper baseball team, which played for money, and in this respect his case is identical with that of Cribbs, of the St. John team. It is held in the case of Titus in the Fredericton team, that he is not eligible to play because no registration card has been signed. Manager Howard, says that St. John is in no way responsible for the suspension of Titus. He places the responsibility at the door of The Fredericton Gleaner, which some time ago published an article stating that Titus was at one time a member of the Fredericton Capitals. Personally he thinks it would be better to have allowed both Brogan and Titus to play out the balance of the season.

The N.B.H.L. will have an opportunity of deciding whether or not the Fredericton-St. John game will be replayed, that not being in the jurisdiction of Mr. Covey.

ANNUAL REPORT ON STREET LIGHTING SUB- MITTED TO COUNCIL

Supt. McGinn Reports Plant and System in Good State of Repair--Lights Added to Equipment.

The annual report of Supt. W. H. McGinn of the City Street Lighting Department was submitted to the City Council last night by Ald. Harrison. The report which was adopted was as follows:

To His Worship Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Fredericton:

Gentlemen:—As Superintendent of our Street Lighting Department I desire to submit the following report:

All the machinery in your Power Station, including steam and electric, are in good operative condition. Your boilers have undergone several inspections during the year by Inspector Crowley, the last being on December 12th. He then recommended certain renewals in valves and feed pipes which the Chairman instructed me to make and which have been made. Certain repairs to insure their respective efficiencies have been made to engines, dynamos. The exterior line has received considerable repairs in the way of new cross arms, suspension ropes and general straightening up.

During the year the three following lamps have been added to the service:

Lamp, Corner Queen and Grey Streets.

Lamp, Corner Smyth and Aberdeen Streets.

Lamp, Centre of Allen Street.

thus making a total number of street lights, 87 an increase of 37 lamps over the original number installed.

The total number of lighting hours during the year was 2,887, an increase over that of 1909 of 250 hours.

The cost of maintenance, a detailed statement of which will be found in the Auditor's Report, is as follows:

Deducting the assets from other departments mentioned the actual cost of maintenance of Street Lights for 1910 was \$6,155.43.

Amount assessed to run the Department.....\$7,000.00

In view of present conditions of the plant in general I have no recommendations to make for any additional machinery or building repairs, other than the ordinary preservation of same.

I desire in conclusion to thank the Council in general and the Street Lighting Committee in particular for the courtesy and assistance they have given me in my efforts to properly discharge the duties pertaining to the Superintendent of Street Lights.
