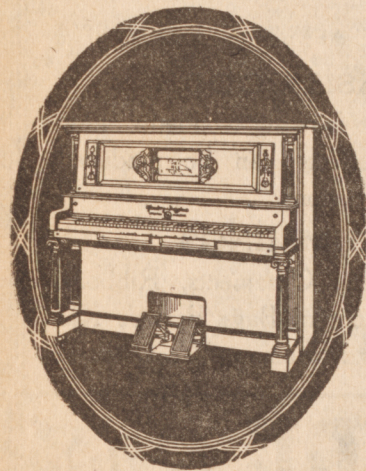

**THE MISSES YOUNG****A STIFF REBUKE FOR COL. HUGHES**

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The Ottawa Ministerial Association, by resolution today, gave a rebuke to Col. Sam Hughes, M.P., for his recent speech on the floor of the House of Commons, in which he attacked the Rev. J. W. H. Milne, of this city, for a sermon the latter had preached in criticism of parliamentarians who took advantage of their privileges to denounce others. After reviewing the Rev. Mr. Milne's sermon, the resolution continued:

"We feel humiliated that any man should pollute the atmosphere of our National Parliament with language so abusive, as seems to have been used on this occasion. Not less deplorable do we think it that the representation of a Canadian constituency should, unrebuked, have publicly repeated to the detriment of a fellow citizen assertions of some irresponsible tale-bearer which he does not pretend to have verified. We accept without reserve Mr. Milne's assurance corroborated by that of members of his congregation, that these assertions are absolutely false. With him moreover, we regret that there are members of Parliament so venomous as to be ready to suggest or say anything that will leave a stain on the character of an opponent, and affirm that such conduct is not in harmony with the spirit of Christian civilization."

**FOUR MILLION DOLLARS IN BIG SHOE MERGER**

(Montreal Herald)

Two of the largest boot and shoe manufacturing companies in the Dominion of Canada have been acquired by Mr. J. Lorne McGibbon, president of the Consolidated Rubber Company of Canada. The two companies Ames-Holden Ltd., and James McCready Company Ltd., will be amalgamated as the Ames-Holden-McCready Company.

It is stated that the deal involved a turnover of four millions, and that the transactions were on a strictly cash basis. Mr. McGibbon in announcing the deal refused to give any details as to the purchase price. The movement for control and been under way for some time and was only consummated late last week.

Mr. McGibbon states that he will introduce many new methods and an altogether modern system into the shoe manufacturing business of Canada. This innovation will be gradual but, Mr. McGibbon states, should effectually make impossible the importation of American shoes, by a reduction of the cost of manufacturing, meeting the American market on an equal basis.

Two new factories will in time, be built. Then there will be one establishment for the making of high grade shoes, another where a medium class article will be turned out, while in the third the cheaper lines will be manufactured. This policy has been followed by the New England makers for some time past, and it has been found to lessen the cost of production and give more efficient work.

Mr. McGibbon will probably be the president of the new company, and the board will include several of the members of the old companies.

The directors of the James McCready Co. are: C. F. Smith, president; Clarence F. Smith, J. Congdon J. Hammill and F. McKenna. The company was founded forty years ago by the late Mr. James McCready. The president Mrs. Charles F. Smith has been connected with the business since 1871. Mr. Hammill has also been in the establishment for forty years or more.

The Ames-Holden Company was established fifty-three years ago. Its present directors are: J. C. Holden,

**RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT A GREAT TRIUMPH**

(Eastern Chronicle.)

Whether ratified or not, the agreement is a great triumph for the contracting parties on both sides of the line. The more the agreement is studied on this side of the line, the more apparent is the work of the master hand of the minister of finance. It is evident that he worked along the lines of the least resistance so far as his own country was concerned. So far as we can see, there is not one protected interest in Canada but can find that what is regarded as its industrial safeguard has not been seriously jeopardized. The reduction of duty on coal to the United States can hardly be regarded as a menace to the industry, and some compensations for even the small cut of eight cents on the long ton may be found in free slack and free coke. Of this, however, we can not speak with knowledge. Anyway, the treaty, whether ratified or not, and whether it may cause a little doubting in one part or another, must be regarded as the crowning act of statesmanship of the two members of the Dominion cabinet who were engaged in it—particularly of the part taken in it by Nova Scotia's greatest practical statesman, Hon. W. S. Fielding.

In this connection a word of praise must be unreservedly rendered to the great Liberal leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who with Parliament on his hands, while his negotiators were cooped up at Washington was cool, collected, debonair, and confident. One day he would be cornered by hundreds of farmers demanding that what he was using all the arts of parliamentary responsibility to secure for them, and another day by those who demanded no let down in the tariff bars, or they and thousands with them would be fit subjects for the poor house. Through it all he was cool calm and confident. Had he shuffled, had he stooped to promise or to hedge, the politics of the Dominion would have been thrown into spasms. Evidently he trusted his faithful Ministers in Washington and best of all the people as a whole trusted him and them, with the result that if the golden treaty will not be ratified there will be no panic that the people will do their best to forget. —Eastern Chronicle.

New York, Feb. 7.—William K. Montgomery, the former president of the Hamilton bank in this city, was convicted of grand larceny in the first degree, before Judge Rosalsky in general sessions today, after a trial lasting over two weeks.

None of Mr. Montgomery's immediate family were present in court when the jury, which had been out over seven hours, brought in a verdict of guilty and his counsel, Jas. W. Osborne, did not arrive until ten minutes after the verdict has been returned.

In thanking the jury, Judge Rosalsky bitterly censured Mr. Osborne for the attack he made on Assistant District Attorney Frank Moss early in the trial, when he alleged that Mr. Moss was prosecuting the case with unusual vigor on account of a personal enmity he felt for the defendant.

**WOULD "PEOPLEIZE" ALL INDUSTRIES**

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—George W. Perkins, formerly partner of J. Pierpont Morgan, and corporation organizer, explained his co-partnership scheme to the Canadian Club on Saturday. He said in part:

"Inter-communication and education have with their monstrous strides, brought us face to face with problems just as great as have been the causes which created them. The individual owner and manager becomes eliminated. Something must be found that will take the place of one directing mind, and the only thing that will do it is a large number of directing minds, by which, of course, is meant co-partnership, corporations reciprocity, profit-sharing methods, all are different names for the one thought, which is 'peopleizing modern industry.'"

"There are only three ways out of the present situation: First, the adoption of a broad co-partnership method of doing business; second, a rapid drifting toward government ownership of many branches of business, or third, socialism."

Mr. Perkins went on to say that experiments along the line of co-partnership in some of the larger industrial concerns in the United States had been most gratifying, but that while they had been carried on it had become very clear that co-partnership must be practised in the broadest and most complete sense of the term. By this he meant, he explained, that it must stand for co-partnership between capital and labor, co-partnership between business and the State. In his opinion the question of wages was not so much whether a man should have so many dollars per day, as whether or not his pay, whatever it might be, was the proper proportion that was his due out of the earnings of the business in which he was engaged.
