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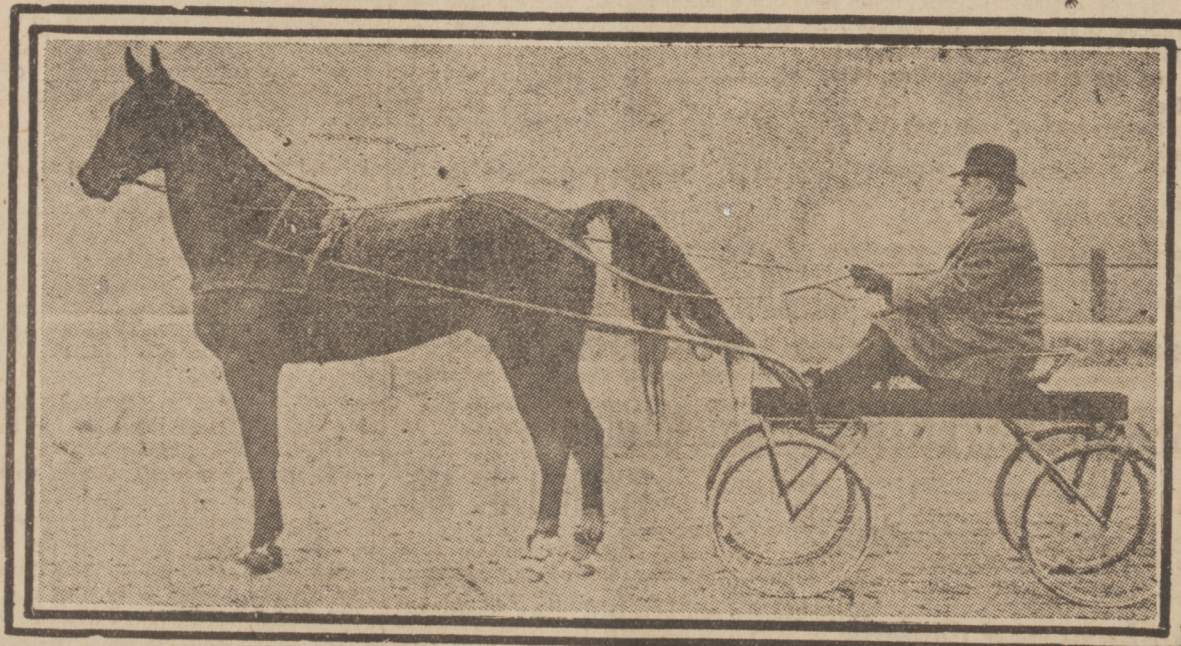
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HALF MILE IN 56 1-4 SECONDS



UHLAN IN C.K.G. BILLINGS DRIVING.

Cleveland, Aug. 12.—In the face of a northwester, Uhlman, the \$35,000 trotting beauty that on Tuesday set a world's record of 2:00 for trotters hitched to wagon, without the aid of a pacer in front, established his second world's record of the week at North Randall track yesterday, when he negotiated a half-mile to wagon in 56 1/4 seconds. This performance lowered by 3/4 s. the best previous performance by a trotter for the distance hitched to wagon.

At the Glenville track on July 31, 1906, Major Delmar, 1:59 1/2, the game old gelding formerly owned by C. K. G. Billings, trotted a half in one minute flat. No one who had his eyes fixed on the dashing black trotter as he shot under the wire at hurricane speed yesterday had to wait

the announcement from the official timers to know that a new world's record had been established.

The actions of "Doc" Tanner, who drove Slat, the runner at the side of Uhlman were sufficient evidence of a record performance. When two lengths from the wire Tanner looked at his watch. He stopped urging the runner instantly, and in a voice that could easily be heard well over in the center, he yelled over to Mr. Billings:

"There's your record for you."

A great record it is. Dan Patch, 1:55 1/2, the world's champion pacer, stepped a half-mile over the Memphis track late in October in 56 1/2 seconds, but that performance was behind a wind shield. In addition, Dan Patch was hitched to a sulky,

while Uhlman pulled a matinee wagon.

With the first quarter trotted in 28 1/2 seconds, official time, Uhlman swerved into the stretch and from the stands his fast-flying feet looked as if they were operated by machinery. Business at every stand was suspended. Caretakers left their charges for the minute and every one of the 7500 persons present fought for a vantage point from which to see the finish of the historic performance.

But as the wire was neared no one doubted that a new record was being made. The timers hung out 56 1/2 seconds, which showed that Uhlman had stepped the last quarter in 27 1/2 seconds.
