YORK LIBERALS TO MEET HERE ON SATURDAY NEXT

To Select Candidate for House of Commons--- Many Conservatives are strong for Reciprocity Pact.

The Liberals of York will meet in convention in the Pitts building, on York Street at two o'clock on Saturday afternoon to nominate a candidate to contest the County for the House of Commons. The call for the convention has been issued by Ald. Edward Moore, president of the York Liberal Association. The feeling in York in favor of reciprocity and the larger market is very strong and all indications are that the party convention will be a record breaker in point of numbers. With a strong candidate and a united party behind him York County can and will be redeemed on Sept. 21st.

CONSERVATIVES FOR PACT

Many hitherto strong Conservatives in different parts of the county have come out squarely for the reciprocity agreement. They declare that York County stands to benefit from reciprocity more than any county in New Brunswick and that when Mr. O. S. Crockett opposed its passage in parliament he did so on his own responsibility, and must take the consequences of his act. The situation is causing much uneasiness among the little clique in this city who attempt to dominate the affairs of the Tory party in York. Keyhole reporters and pimps dog the footsteps of every prominent Liberal who visits the city those days, and there are other signs which go to show that the peace of mind of Mr. Crockett and his satellites is greatly perturbed. An incident which occurred on Saturday evening bears out this statement. Mr. E. S. Carter, the Liberal organizer, arrived from St. John by the evening train on a week end visit. A ubiquitous Tory scribe learned of his arrival shortly afterwards and promptly reported the matter to Mr. O. S. Crockett. He was told to go to the Queen Hotel and see if there was anything doing. The scribe loitered about the corridors of the Queen until after midnight, and on leaving was heard to mutter "There is nothing doing here." I guess I will go home and manufacture some dope.

THE PREMIER'S VISIT

Premier Hazen arrived in the city on Saturday evening, on his first visit since his return from the coronation. He was warmly greeted by O. S. Crockett, J. H. Crockett, F. P. Robinson, J. D. Black, Joshua Chappell and other political leaders. He was offered the free use of an auto in which to visit Sunbury, but declined it with thanks, saying that he would rather hire one. The Premier met a delegation at his office in the departmental building, on Sunday morning, and left soon afterwards by auto for Sunbury County to attend to some political missionary work.

COUN. EVERETT FOR RECIPROCITY

Coun. Tabor C. Everett of Kingsclear, one of the leading farmers of York County and a life long Conservative, has come out squarely for the reciprocity agreement. Speaking to a representative of The Mail on Saturday, he said: "I am for reciprocity and will vote the Liberal ticket this time and I don't care who knows it. I am not the least bit afraid of American competition in agricultural products. If one hundred new farmers were to come into the Parish of Kingsclear tomorrow, I would be the first man to extend them a welcome. Do you think that I or any other farmer in my neighborhood would lose a moment's sleep because of the competition these new farmers would give us. On the contrary we would welcome them as neighbors because they would help us pay the taxes and generally assist in the affairs of the parish. I have sixteen acres of potatoes this year and they are doing fine. I see there is a short crop in the United States. I am for reciprocity because I firmly believe that it is a measure designed to aid the farmer."

Mr. James S. Grant, a stalwart farmer and a life long Conservative of Macquac was here on Saturday. Discussing reciprocity with the Mail he said: "I am for it every time, my mind is made up and I am going to vote for it."

VISITING FORMER HOME

Mr. Clarence Sansom of High River Alta., a New Brunswick teacher who has made his mark in the west is visiting his former home at St. Mary's. Mr. Sansom was graduated by the U. N. B. in 1905 and five years ago left for Alberta. In March last he was appointed school inspector of one of the Alberta districts with headquarters at High River. The district is one hundred miles square. Mr. Sansom states that the agricultural districts of the west strongly favor reciprocity.

PERJURY CASE BEFORE POLICE COURT TO-DAY

Three Witnesses Heard in Case Against James Pyne of Marysville---Continued This Afternoon

The case against James Pyne of Marysville who is charged with perjury in the matter of swearing to an affidavit before Judge Wilson on a Habeas Corpus application was begun before Police Magistrate March this morning and was continued this afternoon. The witnesses whose evidence was taken this morning were Ernest A. McKay, Wm. H. Gray of Marysville and Police Magistrate Claude D. Clayton of Marysville. The case will probably be a lengthy one as several witnesses are to be called by both prosecution and defence. Mr. R. B. Hanson is conducting the prosecution and Mr. P. J. Hughes is acting for the defence. During today's proceedings there were two or three verbal clashes between counsel.

E. A. MCKAY

Mr. McKay the first witness this morning stated that the affidavit sworn to by the prisoner had been sworn before himself.

MR. W. H. GREY.

Mr. Grey, the second witness, stated that he had been present in February last when the prisoner, James Pyne, had been tried before Mr. Clayton, then acting as police magistrate on the charge of theft. Witness swore that Clayton had asked the prisoner if he wished to be tried by him or by judge and jury. Witness stated that he could not swear that Clayton had used the words "higher court" or "county court." Pyne's reply to the question had been, "By you."

CLAUDE D. CLAYTON.

The evidence of Police Magistrate Clayton was not completed this morning and was continued this afternoon. The witness stated that he had tried the prisoner on the charge of theft, believing at the time that he was police magistrate of Marysville. He swore that he had asked Pyne whether he wished to be tried by himself or by judge and jury.

MRS. JAMES KELLY DIED SUDDENLY IN WEST SUNDAY

Was Seized With Hemorrhage While Visiting Her Son Near Regina---To Be Buried Here

Word was received here yesterday of the sudden death near Regina, Alberta, of Mrs. James Kelly of Woodstock Road. The deceased according to the telegram was seized with hemorrhage early yesterday and died within a few hours. The remains will be brought here for burial leaving Regina today.

RELATIVES HERE

The deceased was well known in Fredericton and vicinity being a sister-in-law of Mrs. George Kitchen and an aunt of Messrs. Willard and Coles Kitchen and Ald. A. B. Kitchen of this city. She was about fifty years of age. Three daughters and four sons survive. They are Mrs. Dell Hartt of this city and the Misses Olive and Alida at home, Ernest and Alphonsus of Fredericton, Otis of Regina and William of Vancouver.

ON WESTERN TOUR

The deceased, accompanied by her husband left on an extensive tour of the west a week ago Wednesday. The intention was to visit Regina and Vancouver where their sons were located and also visit Minneapolis and Chicago on their return a brother of Mrs. Kelly being located at Minneapolis and a brother of Mr. Kelly residing in Chicago.

NEWS CAME AS SHOCK

The news of her death came as a decided shock to her friends and relatives here as when she left home Mrs. Kelly had been in the best of health. A few days ago relatives here received a post-card from Regina which stated that Mr. and Mrs. Kelly were both enjoying themselves at the Regina Exhibition.

Announcement will be made later concerning the day and hour of the funeral.
