BISHOP CASEY

MAY GO WEST

St. John Globe: Two weeks ago it was announced that His Grace Archbishop Neil McNeil, of Vancouver (a talented Nova Scotian who was transferred twelve or eighteen months ago from Newfoundland to British Columbia) had been appointed Archbishop of Toronto to succeed the late Archbishop McVey. Now it is announced that His Lordship Bishop Casey has been appointed to the position held by Archbishop McNeil. The news was a great surprise to the public. His Lordship has just received intelligence of the honor conferred upon him, but that is all that can be said now. There are no details.

Bishop Casey became Coadjutor Bishop of St. John on Feb. 11, 1900, and on the death of Right Rev. John Sweeney, became Bishop on March 25, 1901. In the intervening eleven years he has zealously performed the duties of his high office and his departure from St. John would be deeply regretted. His new field of labor is far more extensive than his present diocese and its importance yearly increases.

The Archdiocese of Vancouver comprises the whole of the great growing province of British Columbia except Vancouver Island and adjoining islands. These are in the diocese of Victoria presided over by Bishop McDonald a Nova Scotian. Vancouver is the only large city but Nelson, New Westminster, Kamloops City and other places are growing. The Catholic population is 32,000 according to the Canadian Catholic Directory of 1912. The diocese possesses many institutions—industrial schools for Indian, boys' and girls' schools for Indians, boys' and girls' schools for Indians, orphanages, etc.

It is also announced that Rev. E. LeBlanc, pastor of St. Bernard's Church, Weymouth, N.S., is to become Bishop of St. John. There has been a lengthy and persistent agitation of the Acadians in New Brunswick, strongly supported by the French-Canadians in Quebec, for the appointment of one of their race to the hierarchy in the Maritime Provinces. Father LeBlanc is 42 years of age and a man of ability. He is a native of Digby county, N. S., and has been at St. Bernard's Church for a number of years. Previous to being appointed to St. Bernard's he was stationed at Salmon River, N. S., having gone there from the parish of Caledonia and Liverpool. He is a graduate of Church Point College and has assisted in the work at the Seminary in Halifax.

BECKER A NERVOUS WRECK

New York, Aug. 5—"Bald Jack" Rose will soon be a nervous wreck and of little aid to the prosecution in the Rosenthal case, his brother Morris Rose, believes, Morris visited Jack today in the west side court jail, after which Morris said—

"I never saw such a change before in a man. Jack is in a state of nervous collapse. He can't eat, and can't do anything except think about the murder. I tried to cheer him up, but he sat in his cell with his face buried in his hands, brooding about the tragedy. I think he is frightened out of his wits."

Council for Police Lieut. Chas. Becker, the centre figure in the Rosenthal murder case, entered a plea of not guilty to the indictment charging the policeman with murder in the first degree in the killing of Herman Rosenthal.

The police Lieut. was not brought into court and his plea was entered by his counsel, John W. Hart, who appeared before Judge Mulquon in the court of general sessions.

Hart made two motions, first to dismiss the indictment on the ground that he was drawn up under an irregular grand jury, and second that he be given permission to inspect the Grand Jury minutes. The first motion was dismissed and the second will be argued on August 7th.

Dense crowds numbering many hundreds surrounded the prison and court buildings, eager to catch a glimpse of the accused policeman, squads of additional policemen were stationed about the two buildings to keep the crowd moving while scores of policemen and detectives maintained order in the crowded court building.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

Denver, Colo., Aug. 6—Charged with the duty of legislating for the fraternal interests of nearly three-quarters of a million members, the Supreme Lodge of the Knights of Pythias assembled for its biennial meeting here today and will continue in session about ten days.

The meeting promises to be the most important ever held by the governing body of the order. Much interest centers around the general election Thursday. It is expected that the present supreme vice-chancellor, Thomas J. Carling of Macon, Ga., will be elevated to the office of supreme chancellor to George M. Hanson of Maine. The principal contest will be for the office of supreme vice-chancellor, for which there are five candidates: Benjamin I. Salingier of Iowa, B. S. Young of Ohio, William Indew of New York, Charles S. Davis of Colorado and John J. Brown of Illinois.

A number of important legislative matters will come before the Supreme Lodge for consideration and action. Some minor changes in the ritual probably will be made and action will be taken on proposals to reduce the age limit for members from 21 years to 18 and to extend the order into foreignlands. The grand lodges of Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia have asked that the order be extended to the "mother country," and it is probable that the request will be granted.

Another topic that will engage the attention of the Supreme Lodge will be "Pythian Education," the extension of the knowledge of Pythian knighthood and its work. Supreme Chancellor Hanson will speak at length on this subject and it is expected that the body will give much thoughtful consideration to the plans proposed.

The meeting will discuss preliminary plans for the proper observance of the golden jubilee of the order two years hence. It is proposed that the anniversary shall be celebrated with a great meeting of the membership in Washington, D. C., where the first lodge of the order was instituted Feb. 19, 1861, by Justus H. Rathbone and about a dozen associates. From this modest beginning the Knights of Pythias has increased its membership to a total of 711,000 distributed among 7,800 local lodges in all parts of the United States and Canada and in Mexico, China, Cuba, Hawaii, Panama and the Philippines.

A unique feature of the week's programme will be a meeting at which representatives of three of the great


