## THE POLICE CONSPIRACY HAS STIRRED NEW YORK

New York, Aug. 5—A police fund of \$50,000 is being raised for the defence of Chas. Becker, the police lieutenant, charged with instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal, according to the information in the hands of District Attorney Whitman tonight.

The money is being collected, it is said, by the so-called "System," which, aside from the murder case, is to be the subject of a separate investigation by the district attorney, who believes that there is corrupt alliance between the "System" and the gambling fraternity, founded on graft and blackmail.

The information came to the prosecutor today in connection with the arraignment of Becker to answer the indictment against him. During five hours of legal procedure, which included the withdrawal by Becker of his plea of "not guilty" for the purpose of offering motions to invalidate the indictment.

### THREE LAWYERS FOR BECKER.

The prisoner was represented by three lawyers, one of whom entered the case and mysteriously withdrew, when the status of the other two seemed doubtful in their own minds when the proceedings were over.

It was said that the lawyers engaged by Becker were not satisfactory to the collectors of the defense fund who, the district attorney heard have practically engaged a prominent criminal lawyer to defend the lieutenant, superseding the prisoner's own personal choice.

John W. Hart, who has thus far represented Becker, was the lawyer who conducted the public part of today's legal proceedings. After withdrawing his client's plea of "not guilty" he made one motion to dismiss the indictment on the ground that it was irregular and another to review the grand jury minutes and take evidence to show whether the ground for the indictment was sufficient. Judge Mulqueen refused to

hear arguments on the motion today and set the case over until Wednesday.

Hart, in his application to inspect the jury minutes, held that the evidence produced was not legal in that it was testimony of accomplices in the alleged crime, namely "Jack Ross," "Bridgie" Webber and Harry Valon.

### CROOKS THROUGH THE COURT HOUSE

The fact that Webber was to appear for arraignment attracted an immense crowd to the criminal court building in the hope of getting a glimpse of the man who is the central figure in New York's greatest police scandal. Among them were many recognized gamblers and characters of the underworld, and plain clothes men and policemen circulated through the building and guarded the entrance to the courtroom ready to forestall possible violence.

The crowd eventually became so dense that corridors were cleared and only persons having business were admitted to the court. Becker looking somewhat pale from his week of prison life, walked from the tombs across the Bridge of Sighs to the court room with a firm step and maintained a self-possession but grave demeanor during the proceedings.

Although the district attorney says that he has evidence in his possession that he could use in pressing a charge of extortion against the lieutenant in connection with his relations with gamblers as head of the "Strong Arm Squad" the prosecutor said tonight that he proposed to press only the murder charge at the present time, and that he would not hasten the trial until his evidence to support the latter was in shape. If the argument of Attorney Hart should prevail to quash the present indictment it would be easy to supersede it with another indictment. Mr. Whitman said on the additional evidence he had collected.

## IRREGULARITY SHOWN IN STOCK MARKET TRADING.

### TO DISCUSS FUTURE OF ORGAN

Ocean Grove, N. J., Aug. 6—Representatives of nearly all prominent organ building concerns in the United States are in attendance today at the conference which marks the second day of the National Convention of Organists, in session here at present. Invitations to the conference had been sent out with a view of making an effort toward securing greater uniformity of plan and construction of organs and the standardization of the console and its mechanical accessories. Organ building has been completely revolutionized within the last ten years and the orchestral organs of today are fast pushing their way to the front as concert instruments in public halls. The remarkable success attending such concerns at a popular-priced admission, as tried in the Pittsburgh Carnegie Institute, the Atlanta City Hall and the Ocean Grove Auditorium, gives but a slight hint of the work the modern concert organ is destined to accomplish in the near future in cities where the maintenance of a Symphony orchestra would be an impossibility.
