TERRIFIC BATTING CLIP KEPT UP BY TYRUS COBB

Last Week he made Sixteen Hits With an Average
of .470—New Heads List of American League
With .429—"Heinie" Zimmerman Real Batting
Leader of National League.

Ty Cobb of Detroit continues to hit
him out at the terrific rate he be-
gan to travel at about three weeks
ago, all pitchers looking alike to
Tyrus these days. Last week he turned
in 16 hits for a total of 20 bases
batting at a .470 clip for the seven
days and running his average up
from .425 to .429.

Tris Speaker of the Red Sox is
still second, increasing his standing a
single point in a week, his mark
now being .391. Joe Jackson of Cleve-
land is a distant third with .367,
while next to him is a man new to
the 300 list Larry Papp of the Red
Sox, who however is tied with Koch-
er of Detroit for fourth place.

Larry Gardner is still batting for
.315, but with him Boston's share in
the 300-or-better honors ceases. Jake
Stahl having dropped out of that
group and now being marked at .296.
Next to Cobb, Moeller of Wash-
ington made the most hits last week
getting 13. Incidentally, Moeller made
the greatest gain in percentage of
any man in the league, moving up
from .308 to .323. Speaker made 12
hits in the seven days, Milan of
Washington got 11, while McNis of
the Athletics and Jackson of Cleve-
land turned in eight apiece.
