RETIRE FROM THE
HOSPITAL BOARD

Letter of Resignation Read at Regular Monthly Meeting of Trustees—Secretary Sampson Submits Report for July

HOSPITAL REGULATIONS
TO BE STRICTLY ENFORCED

Notwithstanding the excitement attending the first day of Old Home Week celebration the Trustees of Victoria Hospital attended the regular monthly meeting in the building yesterday. Many matters engaged the attention of the members and several matters of importance were under consideration. Hon. Judge Barry, the president, occupied the chair, and among the others present were Vice-President Sterling, His Worship the Mayor, Mr. W. G. Clark, and Sec'y Sampson.

The Sec'y-Treasurer submitted the usual budget of expenditures for the past month, together with a bunch of bills awaiting payment. The monthly report of the matron showed that thirty-eight patients received treatment in July. Fifteen were discharged and one died, and the Dow Wing was open for a contagious case. Three out-patients were treated, and two received X Ray treatment. A feast of good things was enjoyed through the thoughtfulness of Mr. Hamilton, who sent a freezer of ice cream, and Mr. W. Clark supplied strawberries in abundance. In order to keep the kettle boiling (for the cook is on a strike) Mr. W. Gunter sent two loads of wood.

Great regret was expressed by the members of the Board when the Secretary read the resignation of Ald. Edward Moore, who for several reasons felt impelled to take this action which he intimated would have to be final. During his term as Trustee Mr. Moore gave practical proof of the warm interest he has always shown in the hospital. Upon motion of His Worship the Mayor the resignation was adopted and a letter of appreciation and regret ordered.

A statement of investments was laid on the table by the Secretary-Treasurer, and upon investigation the securities were pronounced good.

Owing to the absence of Dr. McGrath, his notice of motion relating to the admission of emergency cases, was laid over, but in the meantime the usual regulations will be strictly adhered to. It is felt by the Trustees that the doors of the hospital must swing as wide open as possible to accommodate the sick of the city and county and also of the Province, but the nurses must not be overworked and the hospital swamped by foreigners unless somebody is responsible for the expense of careful treatment.

The Hospital is receiving pleasant visits from the tread of former patients during this Old Home Week, and the matron has the exterior of the building very neatly decorated.

After disposing of some routine business the meeting was adjourned.

WELL KNOWN RESIDENT
OF ST. MARY'S IS DEAD

Mr. Edward Murphy Passed away Last Evening After a Lingerin Illness Was an Native of Kingsclear

The death occurred at his home at St. Mary's last night of Mr. Edward Murphy a well known and highly esteemed resident of that place. He had been in failing health for some time, and the news of his death did not come as a surprise. The deceased gentleman was a native of the parish of Kingsclear but removed to the Parish of Douglas when a young man and resided there for many years, afterwards removing to St. Mary's. In the old days before the New Brunswick Railway was built he drove a stage coach between St. Mary's and Woodstock, and had a wide acquaintance throughout the district.

The deceased was twice married and is survived by a family of six children, three of whom were by his first wife. The members of the family are Mrs. Edwin Currie of Douglas, Mrs. Frank R. Brooks and Mrs. B. W. Akerley of Southampton, Mrs. W. L. McFarlane of Nashwaak, Miss Prudence A. Murphy at home and Edward Murphy of Vancouver. The late Mr. Murphy had reached the advanced age of eighty-six years. One brother Mr. Judson Murphy of Kingsclear, and one sister, Mrs. John A. Campbell of the same place survive. The funeral will take place on Wednesday at two o'clock with interment at Kingsclear.

BISHOP CASEY'S
ELEVATION RECEIVED
WITH PLEASURE

Former Rector of St. Dunstons' Church Becomes Arch Bishop of Vancouver—Well Remembered by Catholics of Fredericton

WARMLY CONGRATULATED
BY PRESS OF ST JOHN

Members of the Roman Catholic Church in this city are much gratified on account of the honor conferred upon His Lordship Bishop Casey of St. John in his elevation to the archbishopric of Vancouver. The gratification is the keener because of the fact that for some years Bishop Casey before being elevated to episcopal rank was rector of St. Dunstan's Church in this city succeeding the late Rev. Father McDevitt in 1897 and occupying the rectorship until his appointment as coadjutor bishop in 1900. Some years before coming to Fredericton as rector he had been assistant to Rev. Father McDevitt for some time.

IMPORTANT ACHIEVEMENTS

His stay in Fredericton was marked by several important achievements in the way of material as well as spiritual progress. One of the first problems which claimed his attention was the remodeling of the St. Dunstan's Church. Overcoming what others would have been almost insurmountable difficulties he set to work to put the edifice in a state of first class repair, modernizing the old building where possible without entirely eliminating the historic associations. A new heating system was installed, and the church was fitted up to meet the needs concomitant with the increased congregation. Other important works in connection with the parish were undertaken and remain as monuments to his administrative power and energy.

ST. JOHN TO DIGBY

Transportation Orders Received—Lt. Col. Mersereau to Command Cadet Camp at Aldershot—Capt. F. A. Good Musketry Officer

ABOUT FORTY WILL
GO FROM THIS VICINITY

Orders dealing with the cadet camp which is to be held at Aldershot, N. S., August 16th to 21st, have been received here. The transportation arrangements are different from what was expected. Instead of proceeding from Fredericton to Aldershot by rail direct, the cadets from this section will go to St. John by rail and will proceed to their destination by special D. A. R. steamer and train. The cadets will leave Fredericton by C. P. R. at 9.15 a. m. Aug. 16th and will leave St. John by steamer "Yarmouth" at 12.30 p. m. the same day reaching Aldershot at 8.15 p. m.

LOCAL DETACHMENT

The local detachment it is expected will number about forty cadets. Mr. W. M. Burns will have charge of a number of boys from the Gibson-St. Mary's school, and from St. Paul's Presbyterian Church. Clarence Burden will be in charge of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church and Chauncey D. Orchard will take Capt. F. A. Good's place in command of the Fredericton High School Cadets.

STAFF APPOINTMENTS

Capt. Good has been appointed to the camp staff as musketry instructor. Lt. Col. G. W. Mersereau of Doaktown will be camp commandant. The boys will be in camp three week days and one Sunday. Battalion drill and musketry are to be the chief items of instruction.
