TO DISCUSS WELFARE OF THE STATES

the grounds surrounded the official residence of the warden.

When the present warden, Garvin, came to Wetherfield prison about four years ago, he continued to allow to Warren the privileges which the former warden had granted him, and not only retained him as gardener, but also placed him in charge of the furnace of the warden's residence and made him sort of general helper about the house.

For many years Warren had the privilege of passing unchallenged through the prison gates and frequently he spends all day outside of the prison in the pursuit of his garden work, but never did he make an attempt to escape or to violate in any way the confidence which the warden of the institution had placed in him. The comparative freedom which he enjoyed, had a beneficial effect upon Warren's physical and mental condition. Although he is now more than seventy-two years of age he is still active and energetic and looks scarcely more than fifty. His hair is turning gray, but he stoops but little and his steps are still elastic.

In case the Board of Pardons should release Warren, his two young or brothers of Wilhelmine and his nephews and cousins, all people of excellent standing in their respective communities, are prepared to take care of the old man, who, unless his health should unexpectedly fail, seem fully able to take care of himself for some years to come.

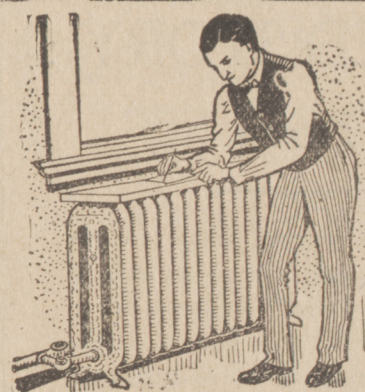
