"Yes! The only time she ever left off the golden wig for a long period."

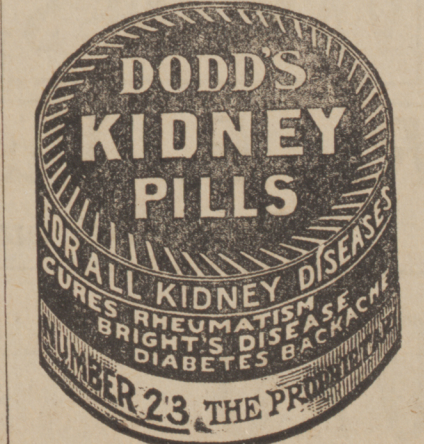
"And Alva, then, was the woman of the Catacombs?"

ASQUITH IN EARNEST OVER HOME RULE

London, Dec. 6.—Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that the government would use all the constitutional means at its disposal to pass a home rule bill, for Ireland during the lifetime of the present parliament. He declared this in reply to a question from William O'Brien member for Cork City, who expressed concern at a recent report that Mr. Asquith was trying to get the House of Lords to throw out the home rule bill when it reaches the upper house. The premier by his announcement today, means that he undertakes to force the home rule bill through three consecutive sessions if necessary, thus making it become effective in spite of the opposition of the peers.
