## WESTERN TORY M. P. FAVORS RECIPROCITY

Ottawa, March 22.—The voice of the west is making itself emphatically heard and heeded on the reciprocity trade arrangement. Conservative opposition at the capital is beginning to scurry for shelter.

R. S. Lake, Qu'Appelle, the only Conservative member from the Province of Saskatchewan, led the retreat in the Commons this afternoon. Mr. Lake rose to a question of privilege. In the course of his address in the reciprocity debate, Mr. MacKenzie had declared that there was not a single individual in the whole wheat growing province who was opposed to the government proposals with the exception of the member for Qu'Appelle.

Mr. Lake challenged the right of the Liberals to say he was opposed to the agreement. He had felt it necessary to carefully weigh the information obtainable, and had so far refrained from expressing any opinion. His constituents had forwarded three requests in the form of resolutions, viz.: The ratification of the government proposals at the present session of parliament; further reduction in the duty on agricultural implements and an increase of the British preference to fifty per cent.

Mr. Lake said that this situation placed him in a peculiar position as the result of the prime minister's declaration that manufactured products were not going to be further dealt with, and that the Canadian government would not even listen to the proposals of the United States to towards that end. The proposed reduction in the duty in agricultural implements, he said, was so small as to be of no material advantage.

Mr. MacDonald—Do I understand then that the policy of the Opposition is a material reduction of duty upon such manufactured products?

**MR. LAKE FAVORS RECIPROCITY**

Mr. Lake was unable to say, his failure to answer being greeted by ironical Liberal laughter and cheers. "I firmly believe," the Conservative member proceeded, "that for a time great advantages will accrue to the farmers of the northwest by the present agreement. (Renewed Liberal applause and "hear, hear.")

"It will give them larger markets, better competition for their products and enable them to get true value for them. I am favorably disposed to the act in itself. But we are told that we have to take it as it stands, that it must be taken as a whole or left alone and it now appears from the premier's statement that it involves the retention of protection on manufactured goods."

Mr. Fowke—Then do we understand that your opposition to the agreement results from the fact that it does not involve reciprocity in manufactured articles?

"I have made a definite statement as to my position," replied the Saskatchewan Conservative.

Interviewed after leaving the chamber, Mr. Lake said he was not in a position at the present time to say how he would vote on the government's proposal. He desired first to secure more information. Saskatchewan

was, he said, was practically a unit in support of reciprocity, but desired just as earnestly the reduction in agricultural implements and the increased British preference. He did not want to be flinched in the position of having to make a choice.

"I am heartily in favor of the arrangement so far as it goes," said he. "because it will give better prices to the farmers and work for the advantage of the people generally, if it leads to a general lowering of the tariff on manufactured goods, too, but I do not want to be forced into the position of voting against further reduction in manufactured products as the premier's recent statement would imply."

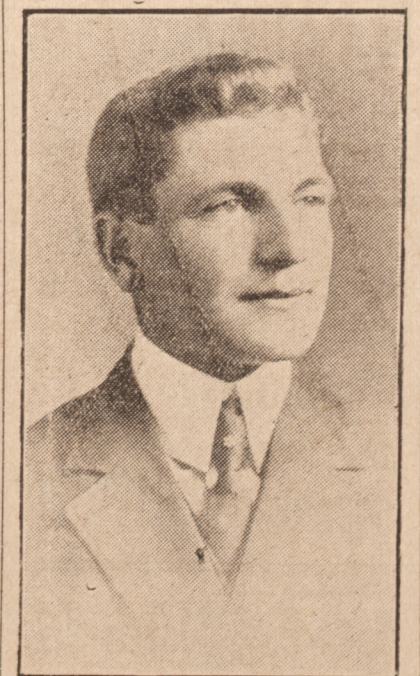

premier to the fact that there was information that the rails on the Harvey Branch were also disappearing.

When some time ago he referred to the Albert County matters and said that a constable had arrested a man at his father's graveside, the premier had stated that, of course, the statement did not in any way reflect upon the government as the Constable would be appointed by the Albert County Council. As a matter of fact, the constable was a provincial constable appointed by this government. If the premier had not full knowledge of the condition of affairs in Albert County, he should take steps to obtain enlightenment. There are Conservatives in Albert, fair, honorable men who could give him (Hazen) information that would open his eyes and startle him. In all earnestness he (Robinson) would say that something should be done to remedy the existing state of affairs in Albert where almost a reign of terror exists in certain sections because of the course of some appointments of this administration. ONE MAGISTRATE FOR INSTANCE, HAD BEEN MORE THAN ONCE ARRESTED. AT ONE TIME HE HAD BEEN ARRESTED FOR STEALING OFFICIAL PAPERS AND WHEN THE MATTER CAME UP FOR TRIAL, THE SOLICITOR GENERAL ADVANCED THE NOVEL IDEA NEVER HEARD OF BY ANY ATTORNEY GENERAL OF THIS OR ANY OTHER PROVINCE THAT THE GRAND JURY SHOULD NOT PRESENT AN INDICTMENT IF THERE HAD BEEN ANYTHING WRONG WITH THE PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION. Further Resolved that it is desirable that there should be an increase in the British preference to 50 per cent of the general tariff."

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
