## WM. BURKE, FT. FAIRFIELD, CREMATED IN BURNING BARN

Andover, N. B., Oct. 29—William Burke, a prominent farmer of Fort Fairfield, was cremated and George Stone, his brother-in-law, was badly burned on a fire that destroyed the dwelling and barn of Mr. Stone, two miles from here, about noon today.

The men were trying to save some of the live stock in the burning barn. Mr. Stone had made his escape with his hands and face badly burned, but Mr. Burke lost his way in the burning building and perished. Mrs. Burke was standing near, and when she learned that her husband did not reappear she was well nigh frantic. It was thought that during the fire the man's appeals for help were heard but in the excitement were not heeded. Mr. Burke, with his wife and child of four years, were spending Sunday with Mr. and Mrs. Stone and were at dinner when the fire started. Seven horses were saved, when the two men rushed into the barn to save a bull and release a number of hogs. Stone was driven back by a gust of flame. Burke, however, continued on and in groping through the thick smoke for a chance to escape found himself in the basement. He tried to open a door but it was locked and he kicked at the door and shouted but no help came. After the fire the body was found beside the burned bull.

In attempting to drag Burke's body from the ruins one arm was pulled from the socket, so badly was he burned. All the household effects and potato house with 10,000 barrels of potatoes were saved. Both farmers were considered in very comfortable circumstances.

## CHINESE OFFICIALDOM IN ABJECT TERROR

Shanghai, Oct. 31—A very few days will tell the future of China, the burning of the native city of Hankow by the imperialists accompanied according to report by brutal treatment of Chinese by the Manchus has created the worst possible impression. It is predicted that unless the Manchus immediately demonstrate the sincerity of the imperial edicts issued at Peking the slaughter will exceed that of the Tai Ping rebellion. The district south of Yang Tse Kiang is ominously quiet. There is every indication that the native cities of Shanghai, Nanking, Ching-Kiang, Hangchow and the lower Yang Tse will be in the hands of the revolutionists within a week. Whether their quest will be accompanied by a wholesale massacre of Manchus or quietly as heretofore, depends upon the influence of the leaders. Foreigners at no point have been molested, and they will remain unharmed, the rebel chiefs assure the press, unless such actions as those of the officials continue and the reports of the dishonor and murder of defenceless Chinese women and children make it impossible to control the rabble.

Further reports of small upriver towns and others in the heart of Wse Chiun province going over to the rebels are received. The panic among the officials at Peking is regarded as one of the worst features of the situation as it betrays a weakness upon the part of the dynasty before the spirit of the revolution. Leaders of the new party look upon the issuance of the edicts as a victory far greater than anything that has been won on the field of battle.

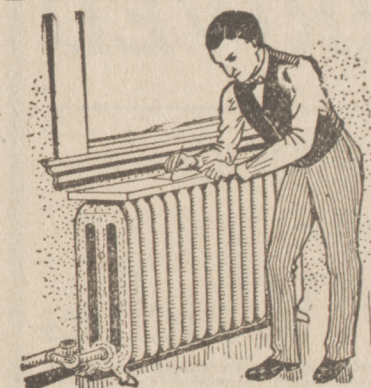

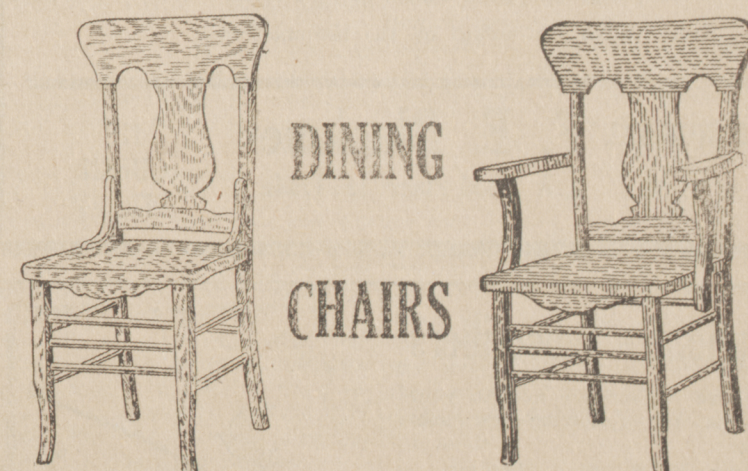
