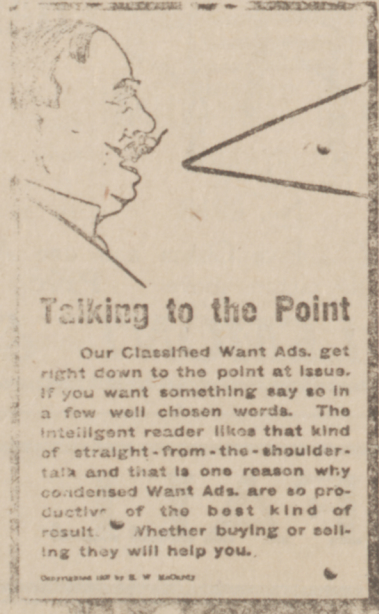

The Fredericton High School Rugby team clinched interscholastic honors on Saturday by defeating the team from Rothesay Collegiate School 6 to 0—two tries to nil. The local high school team has won three out of four games played and lost the fourth obtaining a percentage sufficient to win championship and trophy.

Rothesay was never very dangerous in Saturday's match the Yellow and Black keeping on the aggressive throughout the game and their backs tackling hard. Barbour scored the first try early in the game after a good run. Harvey scored the second try a short time before time was called getting the ball near the Rothesay goal-line on a throw out from touch and dashing across with it. Neither try was converted.

VanWart at full-back played a great game his tackling and kicking being features. On one occasion he saved a sure try for Rothesay getting his man a short distance off the Fredericton H. S. goal-line. Barbour, Stevens, Bellevue and Cass also played well. Brown and Hibbard were prominent for Rothesay.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

POWERFUL FLEET IN HUDSON RIVER

New York, Oct. 30.—The most powerful fleet ever assembled in American waters is riding at anchor in the Hudson River, all spick and span and ready for the great naval review to-morrow. The fleet comprises more than 100 vessels, ranging from the monster battleships of the dreadnought type to the tiny submarines. All day long the New York and New Jersey shores were thronged with thousands of spectators, while steamers, ferriesboats and other crafts were plying up and down the river.
