BEAR ISLAND MAN  
HAD NARROW ESCAPE  
FROM DROWNING

Daniel Parent Taken from River Saturday Night Unconscious from Exhaustion

Daniel Parent of Bear Island, narrowly escaped death by drowning Saturday night at Long Island, when the canvas canoe in which he was paddling from Pekio to his home was overturned. It is thought that his craft struck a submerged log and was upset by it. As soon as he came to the surface of the water the victim of the accident began to shout for help in the hope of attracting the attention of someone on the bank. He was able to get a grasp on the overturned canoe and so keep his head above water.

A little daughter of Mr. William Moses, who was standing at the door of her home, heard the man's cries for help and running into the house told the other members of her family. They also heard the cries and set out as soon as possible for the dwelling of Messrs. Harry and Wilson Hagerman, farther up the road. There they were able to get a boat and rowed out to the spot where the canoe had upset.

Parent had by that time been in the cold water for a considerable time and was so chilled that he had lapsed into unconsciousness and let go his grip on the canoe just as the boat and rescuers reached him. He was taken ashore to the home of Mr. John Hagerman, attempts to revive him proving fruitless. Dr. McKenzie happened along at the time and was called in. He worked over the man for some time before he was revived and then issued instructions for him to remain quiet. On Monday Parent had sufficiently recovered his strength to be removed to his home, but was still too weak to walk.

The wonder is that the man survived after his experience. He was clothed heavily and wore a pair of long boots when the canoe overturned. So hampered he was unable to swim.

ILLEGAL KILLING  
OF SALMON ON THE  
MIRAMICHI REPORTED

Residents of District Killing Fish Out of Season by Hundreds--Protective System Disorganized

A report comes from the Miramichi through guides that the fisheries regulations with regard to the killing of salmon have been grossly violated by residents of that section within the past few weeks. It is said that certain men living along that river have killed hundreds of salmon and cured them for winter use regardless of the fact that the season which was extended fifteen days expired some weeks ago. This violation has gone on unchecked, the fisheries protective system having been entirely disorganized by threats of partisans of the present Dominion government to replace the wardens who had been performing the duties. The slaughter of the salmon has been carried on regardless of the fact that at this time of the year the fish are in poor condition and their flesh unpalatable. It is not known what steps will be taken to check this. The periods of service of wardens expire today and it is not likely that their successors will be appointed this season.

On the St. John River near this city few cases of illegal fishing have been observed. The season for salmon has been a poor one, the only run coming in the open season. It was a fairly good one but could not compare with that on the Miramichi which has been the largest in years.

Fisheries Inspector H. E. Harrison returned on Saturday after a week's trip on Salmon River, Victoria Co., which he looked over with the intention of reporting on the advisability of installing fishways in the dams on the stream.

## NEW STATION

Work on the new railway station at McGivney Junction is to begin this week but the building will not be completed until next spring. It will be wood with concrete foundation and will be used by the Intercolonial and Transcontinental Railways.
