SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

GOOD WORDS FOR YORK'S LIBERAL CANDIDATE

"The nomination of Dr. A. B. Atherton by the Liberals of York on Saturday at an unusually large and remarkable enthusiastic convention is one of the best pieces of news the Liberals of this province have heard in a long time. Dr. A. B. Atherton will be pre-eminently a reciprocity candidate. He is acknowledged everywhere as one of the foremost medical men in the country and has long enjoyed the confidence, admiration and esteem of everyone who knows him. While his name was mentioned some time ago as a possible candidate, it was feared that he would not accept and his final and favorable decision comes as an agreeable surprise and reflects the very greatest credit upon those who have been organizing the Liberal cause and seeking out strong standard-bearers."

"The best elements in the fine county of York have now a magnificent opportunity to shake off the Tory machine of Messrs Crockett, McLeod et al., who have done the constituency great injury, and who have done the constituency great injury, and who have given free rein to the very worst tendencies which the Tory party contains. As a reciprocity candidate Dr. Atherton will find one campaign document ready made in Mr. O. S. Crockett's famous letter to the Finance Minister, asking on behalf of the Scott Lumber Company, for a reduction of the duty on shingles entering the American market—a reduction which was duly arranged and which will be granted under the Fielding-Patterson pact. But while York county and New Brunswick generally will profit by the reduced duty on shingles, and while that item is of especial interest because of the foolish position in which it places Mr. Crockett, the free entry of agricultural products and of rough sawn lumber into the American market which reciprocity will give to Canada should give the Liberal cause an overwhelming advantage in York and the other New Brunswick constituencies."

"In 1908 York county was one of the two New Brunswick constituencies which failed to elect a Liberal candidate and York county's case was particularly regrettable because the Conservative it did elect has reflected scant credit upon his constituents and has been wholly reckless and venomous in his treatment of public men and public issues. Harvey Station, August 21—The picnic which was held on the grounds by the lake shore on Thursday, turned out very successful. The picnic was to have been held on Wednesday, but the weather proved unfavorable, causing the postponement. The weather on Thursday was fine although cool and very windy, but the people assembled in large numbers coming from Fredericton Junction, McAdam, Prince William and other outside places. Two hundred people took dinner on the grounds and nearly one thousand sat down to the tea tables which were looked after by the ladies of the Station and vicinity, and their abilities in this line were but a severe test but they were fully equal to the occasion, the meals being good, and well served up.

In the department stand Councilor Hunter and a number of assistants were kept very busy and the Ice Cream stand under the direction of Miss Glendinning was kept very busy also. The mammoth aerolite swing which was looked after by Frank Coleman was kept running all afternoon till late in the evening. The chief events of the day was the sword dance and sailors hornpipe which were very skillfully executed by Mr. D. L. McLaren of St. John to music furnished by Piper Ross of St. John. Messrs. Ross and McLaren also gave selections of Scottish airs on the bagpipes, marching in Highland costume which were very highly appreciated. The Fredericton Junction Brass Band were also in attendance and acquitted themselves in a very satisfactory manner.

Athletic sports including jumping, high kicking and the tug of war was also indulged in. The walking of the greased pole which was erected in the lake was very amusing and was tried by a number of young men and boys. The gathering was the largest ever seen in this place, good order prevailed and a very enjoyable day was spent.

The net proceeds amounted to about four hundred dollars and will be applied to the reduction of the debt on the school house.

CONSERVATIVE FARMER TALKS ON RECIPROCITY

One of the speakers at the Liberal convention at Nanapan, Ont., was Mr. Charles Anderson, a Conservative farmer who had always been prominent in his party. He was one of the farmer delegates who went to Ottawa last winter to ask for reciprocity. He spoke at the Liberal convention last week, and the report of his address says:

"When he returned home he had found that three-quarters of the people of the riding approved of the deputation's demand for reciprocity, but now that it was offered the party had brought the old-time Conservatives all into line, and they opposed what before they had asked for Mr. Anderson believed firmly in the benefits reciprocity would bring to the farmers. He vigorously stated that the manufacturers and the selfish interests were now lined up against it for one specious reason or another, and announced that he would to his utmost to elect a candidate who promised to vote for reciprocity. He declared that he was not a traitor to his party, but rather that the party was traitor to the old policy for which Sir John Macdonald and all other Conservative leaders had stood up to the time reciprocity became possible through the Fielding-Taft agreement."
