## WITHDRAWAL OF TEAM ENDORSED BY EXECUTIVE

Fredericton Baseball Club Executive Heard Report  
of Representatives Last Night--Action re Other  
Games to be Taken after Thursday

The executive of the Fredericton Baseball Club met last night at the Barker House and discussed the baseball situation. The report of the delegates who attended the league meeting at McAdam on Friday last at which the Fredericton and Woodstock teams withdrew from the N. B. and Maine League and a resolution endorsing the action of the club's representatives in that matter was adopted.

No action was taken with regard to games after tomorrow's game with Woodstock which is to be played here beginning at 2.30. If the attendance today and tomorrow warrants it is probable that further games will be arranged.

Reporting on the league meeting at McAdam the clubs representatives reported that the following resolution had been passed on that occasion:

LEAGUE MEETING AT  
ST. STEPHEN

We the representatives of the St. Stephen, Calais, Fredericton and Woodstock Baseball Clubs hereby agree from this date henceforth not to play any games of baseball whatsoever—either league or exhibition—with any St. John Baseball Club during the season of 1911. The above agreement being made on account of the unsportsmanlike way Mr. D. B. Donald, manager of the Syndicate Baseball in St. John, has acted with the teams in the New Brunswick and

Maine League.

ACTION APPROVED

After reports from the various departments of the club had been received the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved that this executive approve of the action of its representatives in withdrawing the Fredericton Baseball Club team from the New Brunswick and Maine League when the St. Johns had been unnecessarily withdrawn from the league at a critical time for the Fredericton club and other members of the league.

"Further resolved that owing to the unsportsmanlike conduct of D.B. Donald throughout the season this executive feels that no games should be played with the Marathons or any other club of the syndicate controlling baseball in St. John with which Mr. Donald is connected his conduct having been such as to strike a blow at baseball in New Brunswick from which the sport cannot recover for some years.

"Further resolved that this executive also express appreciation of the sportsmanlike way in which the Woodstock Baseball Club has carried on all business with the Fredericton club this season.

"And further resolved that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Fredericton, St. John and Woodstock newspapers for publication."

## VERNON MCKINNEY MADE NEW WORLD'S RECORD AT COLUMBUS

Time in Three-heat Race Fastest ever  
Stepped by Pacing Stallion—"Silver Bill" Riley Dead

Columbus, O., Aug. 22.—Another world's record was broken here yesterday at the opening of the second week of racing, when Vernon McKinney paced the three fastest heats ever negotiated in a race by a pacing stallion. His winning miles—2.03½, 2.02, 2.02½—easily outdid those of The Bel in 1908, when he won a three heat race by stepping in 0.02½, 0.02½, 2.04½.

Vernon McKinney wore the bridle equipped with a blind covering his left eye, in which he won the C. of C. at Detroit. It is a fact that, for this cause or some other, he went the best race of his career. He never made break, something unusual for him. Sir. R. pushed him out each time and won second money in the Board of Trade purse worth \$300.

Geers and Cox came down from Buffalo and participated in the race. Although neither put over a winner both were inside the money.

Tommy Murphy, leading money-winner last week, won two races again today. Charlie Mitchell lowered his own trotting record from 2.07½ to 2.06½ when Fuzz Johnson and Major Wellington made him step fast. Cascade, also piloted by Murphy, landed the 2.18 trot in straight heats, his best mile being in 2.09½.

Word was received here today that "Silver Bill" Riley, noted auctioneer of pools, had died at Buffalo today of uraemic poisoning.

Five physicians visited Wagner at his home today. A number of X-ray photographs were taken of the injured member, and the statement was given out following an examination of the pictures. The player's ankle was given a "baking" late today, and tomorrow Wagner will be permitted to exercise.

While it is said that Wagner will not be able to join the team before the end of the present eastern trip, he entertains hopes of playing at least a few games before the eastern invasion comes to an end.
