## PARLIAMENT REPOSES ITS CONFIDENCE IN FIELDING

### Efforts of Tories to Besmirch the Character of the Able Minister of Finance Meet With Little Favor---Mr. Fielding's Manly and Straightforward Statement in Regard to the Testimonial.

(Special Despatch to The Toronto Globe.)

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—By a vote of 118 to 63, the House of Commons tonight emphatically condemned the misguided attempt of the opposition to besmirch the reputation of Hon. W. S. Fielding. In apparent realization of the added prestige gained by the minister of finance in the success of his diplomatic mission to Washington, Mr. Boyce, the Conservative member for West Algoma, moved a resolution, which, while affirming the long-recognized principle that cabinet ministers should not accept gifts to which favor-seekers had contributed, was obviously inspired by the idea of engendering public suspicion concerning the bona fides of the recent spontaneous tribute to the worth and work of Mr. Fielding.

The original purpose of the mover, as expressed in his notice, was to bolster up the report that W. R. Travers, of the insolvent Farmers' Bank, had contributed to the Fielding fund, but in view of the denial, officially published in The Globe, the opposition were compelled to shield themselves behind the lucubrations of rabid Tory journals, which had originated and circulated the falsehood.

MR. BORDEN OUT OF SYMPATHY.

While the irresponsible members of the Opposition, who had insisted on pressing the resolution, were apparently prepared to go to any length in attacking the minister of finance, Mr. Borden, their leader, evidenced his distaste of their tactics by paying tribute to "the indefatigable service, hard and earnest work" of Mr. Fielding, and showing clearly that he had no sympathy with the aspersions which it was thought to cast upon him.

TRIBUTE TO MR. FIELDING.

The minister of finance obviously keenly felt the position in which the resolution placed him, and took the opportunity of placing before the House, with the utmost frankness, the circumstances which had led him to accept the testimonial. If anything had been required to emphasize the loyalty and confidence in which he is held by the Liberal party, it was the ovation tendered to him, when, having concluded his explanation he retired from the chamber, and the glowing tribute paid to him by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the course of the prime minister's eloquent reply to his lieutenant's traducers.

MR. GILBERT VOTED AGAINST THE GOVERNMENT. The Liberals made a demonstration on the result, and gave three cheers in the House for Mr. Fielding.

A STORM OF GROANS

When Mr. Boyce rose to launch his resolution and endeavored to argue that he was not prompted by partisan motives or by a desire to injure the Minister of Finance, he was greeted with a storm of groans from the Liberal benches as he proceeded with his deliverance, punctuated with caustic reference to the Prime Minister and his first lieutenant the temper of the House did not improve and Opposition cheers were met with counter demonstrations. When the Algoma man reading from a Cape Breton Conservative paper, "Fielding got stolen money" so insistent was the sentiment of the better element that it found expression in hisses. Throughout Mr. Fielding sat with bowed head, while repeated efforts by Mr. Boyce to draw Sir Wilfrid into an altercation were unavailing. Only once did the sentiment of the Government benches find adequate expression during the address of the Algoma representative. "What was the Prime Minister's view?" he asked. "Let me quote him: 'Nothing is too good for Mr. Fielding'"

"Hear, hear," ejaculated Hon. Mr. Brodeur, and the Liberals broke loose in a full minute of enthusiastic cheering.

MR. FIELDING'S REPLY

When the Algoma man sat down, after some forty-five minutes of deliverance, Hon. Mr. Fielding immediately rose. It was the signal for such a demonstration of loyalty and affection as falls to the lot of few public men. The Liberals cheered and cheered again, and it was some moments before the Minister could proceed. Mr. Fielding was evidently much moved and towards the close of his brief address his voice nearly broke on a couple of sentences while paying tribute to those of his political opponents who had joined in congratulatory messages to him, in

opening the Minister of Finance said it had not been his intention to say anything on a question whose character was so largely personal, but he feared his silence might be misunderstood. It was accordingly, his intention to briefly state the facts and withdraw from the House, leaving his fellow-members to deal with the matter as they deemed right and just.

Some years ago the Minister had been approached by a group of friends, who had been generously disposed to press a testimonial upon him. "I told them," said Mr. Fielding, "I thought I saw good reason for the movement not going on, much as I appreciated the kindly thought." A second time he had been approached by a friend since deceased to whom he had given a similar answer. Some years afterwards the suggestion was revived by a man of the highest character whose motives were above suspicion, and who submitted a similar proposal, but Mr. Fielding adhered to his decision, and the offer was declined. "I based my decision," said the Minister, "on the understanding that such a case had occurred when it was alleged that contractors, or men seeking favors from the Government had been accused of contributing to such a testimonial."

THE PRESENT TESTIMONIAL

"Years passed and at the time of the present testimonial I was approached again," continued Mr. Fielding. "It was pointed out that, while my position might be justified in the earlier years, at this stage of my life it might be fairly considered, and he was authorized by his associates to guarantee that not one penny would be contributed by government contractors or anyone seeking office, or looking for favor or patronage from the Government. In order that I should not feel under personal obligation to any contributors I should never know who they were. With this assurance, upon those conditions, and with the concurrence of my friend the Prime Minister, I agreed to accept it."

After the movement was under way the Minister noted some comment in the press, and urged that it was not yet too late to retrace the steps and return the money; but he was assured that there was nothing approaching impropriety in the entire list.

GOOD-WILL APPRECIATED

"I may tell the House," concluded the Minister, his voice evidencing strong emotion, "that I valued as much as the testimonial the expressions of confidence and good-will with which I was favored at that time from Conservatives as well as Liberals, by some of the honorable members, Mr. Speaker, at the present time sitting upon your left. Let me assure them their sentiments were deeply appreciated. I am through. Whatever others may think, I am satisfied that my political friends and foes alike will know that this is an exact statement of the facts, and I leave my fellow-members of this House to determine whether there was anything in them that reflects upon my honor or independence as a member of the Legislature."

As the Minister of Finance left the Chamber he was accorded another enthusiastic ovation from the Liberal benches.

MR. MILLER

Mr. Miller was gratified to note that the leader of the Opposition had taken no part in the applause which greeted Mr. Boyce's "mud-throwing." He believed that the member from Algoma, alone in the House, would have been guilty of such a tirade as they had heard. Mr. Fielding was one of Canada's great assets. He had refused several offers associated with much greater salary than he was drawing as a Minister of the Crown. "One of the great sources of strength to the present Administration," said Mr. Miller, "is the fact that in the event of a change of government the people of Canada fear that some other man than W. S. Fielding will be Minister of Finance."

SIR WILFRID LAURIER.

Sir Wilfrid approached the question from the point of view of what is due to parliament, to the government, to the country, and to the minister of finance. He believed that Mr. Boyce's motion was designedly an attack upon the minister of finance. It had been brought before the House on a day and in such a way that the government must consider it as a motion of want of confidence, and must either accept or reject it as

## FORWARD MOVEMENT FOR KING'S COLLEGE

(St. John Telegraph)

The board of governors of King's College Windsor met here yesterday to consider the proposed forward movement in the interests of that institution. A new wing will also be added to the college as soon as possible to accommodate the increasing number of students and an educational campaign will be instituted in the maritime provinces in the interests of the college. It was decided to seek legislation to place the collegiate school, Windsor under a separate board of governors. Some discussion took place over the project of substituting the college at Rothesay for the collegiate school at Windsor this was turned down.

There were three sessions yesterday. Those in the morning and afternoon were given over to consideration of the forward movement. Luncheon was served in the school room of Trinity church where the meetings were held by the Women's Association of the congregation, and at 8 o'clock there was a public meeting. This was presided over by Bishop Richardson and was addressed by Bishop Worrell, of Nova Scotia; Rev. Canon Powell, president of King's; Dr. Silas Alward, dean of the Law School and Recorder Baxter, K. C.

Bishop Worrell and Canon Powell spoke of the theological and art courses. The president of the college appealed for help in strengthening the art faculty. Those present might ask him, he said, why he came there asking help for Kings when they had a university already in the province. A university, however, which neglected the religious life was not for a moment to be compared with Kings. Dr. Alward, who had been dean for the last ten years, spoke of the good work done by that institution, and Recorder Baxter followed along the same lines. Among those present were:

Scovill, of West St. John, Judge Forbes of Lunenburg, N.S.; H. M. Bradford, of Halifax, R. J. Wilson of Halifax, W. C. Milner of Halifax, Lionel Hanington of Dorchester, R. G. Harris of Halifax, H. L. Jones of Halifax, and H. H. Pickeett of St. John.

## ENGLAND TO BUILD MONSTER WARSHIP

London, Feb. 2.—The Thunderer, the seventh British Dreadnaught and the fourth of the super-Dreadnaught type, was successfully launched from the yards of the Thames Iron Works Company at Canning Town yesterday. The Archbishop of Canterbury conducted the religious services preceding the christening by Mrs. Davidson.

Fifteen thousand people many of whom had gone by special trains from this city, witnessed the ceremonies and cheered wildly as the great fighter woke to life and plunged into the water. Local officials gave a reception for the several government officials and other prominent personages present.

The Thunderer has a displacement of 22,680 tons and will be equipped with turbines with a total of 27,000 horse-power. She is expected to make a speed of twenty-one knots an hour. The vessel is 584 feet in length and is armed with ten 13.5-inch guns and twenty-four 4-inch guns.

## A HALL OF FAME FOR BASEBALL EXPERTS

Chicago, Feb. 3.—Tentative plans for the creation of a baseball "Hall of Fame" on broader lines than hitherto attempted were announced yesterday by a Detroit manufacturer. He offered to put two automobiles into the hands of a committee of five or seven newspaper men to be awarded at the end of each playing season to the player in a major league who in the opinion of the committee, had done the most for his team in the pennant race.

Details of the proposition, such as the size of the committees, selection, and the method of arriving at the choice of the player entitled to the prize in each league, have not been worked out.

The offer stands for a period of five years and will be open to all the players in each major league exclusive of the manager.
