PRESIDENT TAFT GRANTS REPRIEVE

Sewanee, Tenn., Nov. 10.—President Taft today granted a ninety days' reprieve to Mrs. Mattie E. Lomax, a colored woman of Washington, D.C., sentenced to suffer the death penalty for murder of her husband. If the sentence had been carried out she would have been the first woman to suffer capital punishment in the district of Columbia since the execution of Mrs. Surratt for complicity in Lincoln's assassination.

IMPRESSIVE SCENE IN NEW YORK STREET

New York, N.Y., Nov. 10.—Father Patrick Murray, an assistant at St. Thomas Aquinas Church, was struck and probably mortally injured by a trolley car on Lexington Avenue last night. As the priest lay unconscious from a fractured skull, under the glare of an arc light, four Dominican Fathers, summoned from a nearby parish house, dressed in their white robes, administered extreme unction while a silent crowd, with bared heads watched the unusual and impressive scene.

CANADIAN CLUB BANQUET

New York, Nov. 11.—The Canadian club of New York is to hold its annual banquet at the Hotel Astor next Monday night and as it will be the first dinner of this representative Canadian organization since the defeat of reciprocity, much interest is being shown as to the prospective utterances of the distinguished Canadians and Americans who will address the club. The new Cabinet at Ottawa will be represented by Hon. George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce. Other Canadian speakers will be Robert A. Falconer of Toronto, C. P. Bransford of Montreal, the Right Rev. Frederick Courtney, former bishop of Nova Scotia; Judge D. B. MacTavish of Ottawa, and C.R. McCullough, honorary president of the Association of Canadian Clubs.

COMING SESSION GOING TO BE LIVELY

Ottawa, November, 10.—There has been as yet no discussion of the Opposition programme in Parliament, but it is certain that the Borden Government is not going unscratched through its first public appearance in power.

The line of attack will be largely entrusted by Liberal members to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who is recognized as a past master in parliamentary tactics. He will have behind him a capable fighting line, in which are such men as E. M. MacDonald, A. H. Clark, Dr. Clark, of Reed Deer; B. G. Turfitt, Frank Carvell, Mr. Kyte, Dr. Beland, Hon. Mr. Lemieux, Hugh Guthrie, Hon. Charles Murphy and Hon. William Pugsley.

With such a capable group of critics the first session of Parliament is certain to be no tame affair, and the chances are that there will be the most interest debate on the Address which Parliament has ever enjoyed.

Among the topics likely to be touched upon will be the navy; the great alleged corruption fund which was said to be such a factor in the Conservative elections, and possibly the Ne-Temere decree.

Whether the estimates are dealt with in one session or two, the fight is not likely to be as brief as some people have predicted.

Albany, N.Y., Nov. 11.—Miss Dorothy Douglas, daughter of Curtis W. Douglas and niece of Governor Dix, was the bride this afternoon at one of the largest and most fashionable weddings that Albany has seen in a long time. Miss Douglas was married to George Cabot Ward Low son of A. A. Low of Brooklyn. The ceremony was performed in St. Peter's Church and was followed by a large reception.

WELL KNOWN PEDLAR FOUND DEAD ON ROAD

Thomas Kelly, an aged puck pedlar was found dead on the road between Giberson Settlement and Holmesville Carleton County about seven o'clock last Sunday morning by Albert P. Broad of Plaster Rock.

The man was found lying across the road about 100 rods from the home of Gabe McIsaac with his pack nearby. Mr. Broad made an unsuccessful effort to arouse him but upon examination found that the man was dead. He notified Dr. M.M.E. Cummings coroner, who pronounced death due to exposure.

It developed later that Ralph Giberson heard the sound of dogs barking coming from the direction where Kelly was found. Kelly was seen walking along the road the day before by Mr. Broad who at that time was driving.

The man's remains were taken to the home of his son John at Johnville. Interment was made in Johnville Tuesday.

VICTOR EMMANUEL 42 YEARS OLD

Rome, Nov. 11.—King Victor Emmanuel was forty-two years old today and popular enthusiasm over the war caused the anniversary to be marked by national rejoicing upon an unusually extensive scale. The national colors and pictures of the royal family were displayed everywhere. Military reviews were held and dinners were given by the municipalities and villages for the poor. During the day all of the foreign diplomats resident in Rome called at the Quirinal and presented messages of greeting in behalf of the sovereigns and nations they represent.

Tilbury, Ont., Nov. 6.—Hog cholera has broken out in Tilbury, north township, and active measures have been taken to stamp out the dreaded disease. A number of hogs have been slaughtered by instructions of Dominion Inspector Rowe of Blenheim, and the infected farms have been strictly quarantined.
