TY COBB FELL

TWO SHORT OF
LAJOIE'S RECORD

Detroit Player Holds 1911 Batting Record with .420—Joe Jackson of Cleveland Second

Chicago, November 6.—Falling short two points of equalling Lajoie's record of .422, made while a member of the Philadelphia club, in 1901, Ty Cobb, of Detroit, topped the 1911 American League batters for the fourth successive year, with an average of .428, according to the official averages just announced by President Johnson, of the American League.

Second to Cobb is John Jackson, of Cleveland, whose average is .405. Jackson played in 47 games, while Cobb took part in one game less.

Napoleon Lajoie, of Cleveland, who gave Cobb such a close race for batting honors in 1910, has an average of .365. Last year Cobb finished with an average of .385 and Lajoie with .384.

The world's champion Philadelphia Club has seven men in the select .300 class, Collins leading with an average of .365. Lapp hit for .350; Baker for .334, Murphy .328, Coombs .319 and Lord .310.

Detroit had four men hitting above .300, including Cobb. Crawford is fourth among the league batters with an average of .378, while D'Amant made .339. Gainer has an average of .302.

In club batting Philadelphia leads, with .297, with Detroit second with .291, and Cleveland third with .282.

Cobb also got the largest number of runs, scoring 147 times, and made the largest number of hits, 248. Of those 47 were two-base, 24 three-base hits, and eight home runs.

Cobb's nearest rival in base-stealing was Jackson of Cleveland. He stole 41, while Cobb stole 83.

**FRANK MANTELL GIVEN
DECISION OVER PERRIN**

Providence, Nov. 10.—Frank Mantell of Pawtucket and Frank Perrin, also of that city, fought a fast fifteen-round bout at the Rhode Island A.C. in Thornton last evening. The former received the decision on points, neither being much the worse for the struggle. The men fought at 158 lbs. Starting off Perrin was very aggressive and forced Mantell all the time, but whenever he opened up he usually met a right or left jab on the face.

Perrin got in a few good ones now and then, but they were usually at close range and ineffective, while Mantell landed swing after swing. Perrin received some cuts about the mouth and a badly damaged eye.

**BROWN AND HOGAN
MATCHED FOR 10 ROUNDS**

New York, Nov. 10.—"Jack Alder," manager of the Madison Athletic Club, announced tonight that he had matched "One Round" Hogan of California, and "Knockout" Brown of New York, for a ten-round bout at the Madison A.C. here a week from tonight, Nov. 17. The men will weigh in at 135 pounds at 6-30.

Bert Keyes and "K. O." Brown of New York, are billed for a bout at New Haven Nov. 27.

Tommy Kilbane, the Cleveland lightweight, has called off all his matches, as he is suffering from blood poisoning. He will not be able to box again till after Jan. 1.

Johnny McCarthy of the Armory A. A., is now manager of Bob Lee, the big colored heavyweight. McCarthy has had experience in that line and will get the heavyweight some good engagements.

Jimmy Barry, the Chicago heavyweight, is going to try his luck in Sydney, N.S.W., and will leave for Australia in a few days. When he has fought in that country he will have boxed in every country in the world where there is boxing.

Tim Hurst, the veteran referee, calls the present champions a lot of four-flushers. If they were on the level, Tim says, they would box either on a winner take all or a winner and loser basis, as the old champions did, instead of demanding the lion's share of the purse before they start.

Ray Temple the Milwaukee lightweight, is going to Australia to box for Promoter McIntosh.

After his recent bout with Bob Moha, Bill Papke said that he was through with the game for good.

Matt Wells has returned to his home in England and will perhaps be matched to meet Packey McFarland in London.

KID MERCIER

BEATEN FOR SIX
ROUNDS WON BOUT

Lawrence Boxer Put One over on Dave Deshler—Winner was Badly Battered

Lawrence, Nov. 10.—Something seldom seen in Lawrence occurred in the main event at the Unity Club here last night, when Kid Mercier of this city, after getting walloped good and plenty for six rounds, came back, battered as he was, and won the decision over Dave Deshler of Cambridge, at the end of the twelve rounds that they boxed.

The bout opened fast, with Deshler getting away in the lead. In the seventh round Mercier began to solve Deshler's defense, and although his face was badly battered, he began to land telling right hooks and short right uppercuts on Dave's jaw.

Deshler tired in the eighth round, and then Mercier began to show his hand. He staggered the lad from the University City twice in this round, and at the bell had Deshler wabbly. The ninth and tenth were close, but in the eleventh Mercier again drove Deshler to the ropes. It was plain in the twelfth that Mercier was the stronger of the pair, so Referee Jimmy Burke awarded the decision to him.

Eddie Foye of Lawrence, was knocked out in the fifth round of a six-round go by Young Scanlon of Lawrence. Frank Rearbon of Lawrence, out-pointed Joe Mars of Lawrence, in six rounds. In the semi-final Tim O'Connor of Cambridge, showed superiority over Jack Smith of Melhusen, in the six rounds that they boxed.

About 700 fans attended the event. Jimmy Burke of Lawrence, refereed the bouts and Charlie Duffin of Lawrence, acted as timer.

**YOUNG LOUGHREY BOXED
WITH HIS RIBS BROKEN**

New York, Nov. 10.—In a fast, rough fight last night at the National Sporting Club of America, Walter Coffey of California, defeated Young Loughrey of Philadelphia, in a ten-round bout. Jeff Smith was scheduled to meet Coffey, but owing to a broken hand received in training, he was unable to fight and Loughrey was substituted.

In the second round Coffey landed a crushing blow on Loughrey's body. The latter's seconds claimed that the blow had broken some of the Philadelphia's ribs, but he gamely finished the ten rounds. In the tenth round Coffey had Loughrey staggering around the ring, but was unable to finish a knockout blow.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate and erect a house worth \$300.00.
