LORDS CENSURE THE GOVERNMENT

London, Aug. 8.—By a vote of 282 to 38 the house of lords tonight carried a motion made by Lord Curzon censuring the government for having secured from the king a promise of sufficient peers to pass the veto bill should that measure be rejected by the upper house of parliament. The motion was similar to that of Arthur J. Balfour, the opposition leader which was lost in the house of commons yesterday by a majority of 119.

With the result a foregone conclusion the debate in the lords tonight created little interest. The speeches of the Conservative peers rang with charges that the government had prostituted the prerogatives of the crown for the purpose of carrying home rule for Ireland without consulting the people.

The Earl of Crewe in opposing the motion caused something of a sensation by admitting that the members of the government were not all of one mind with respect to the creation of new peers. He said King George regarded the plan "with legitimate reluctance" and that it depended upon the action of the house of lords whether the government would be compelled to create new peers.

The Earl of Halsbury charged Premier Asquith with being guilty of an atrocious breach of trust. He drew a pathetic picture of the young and inexperienced king at the mercy of an astute lawyer who told him that the creation of peers was the only way of saving the problem of the veto bill.

Viscount Haldane and Lord Loreburn were among those who spoke on behalf of the government, while Lord Selborne and Lord Lansdowne supported the censure.

MORE BRITONS TO CANADA

London, Aug. 9.—Under the pilotage of the Duke of Sutherland, who has acquired extensive interests in western Canada and built a home there with a view of making it his residence during a considerable part of each year, a distinguished party of English legislators, journalists and others sailed on the Olympic today to become acquainted with the wonders of the Canadian west. After landing at New York the tourists are to travel in the Duke's yacht up the Hudson River and through the Erie Canal and the Great Lakes to Fort William, Ont. From that point they are to go by rail to Winnipeg and thence to the properties of the Duke of Sutherland, in Alberta. The party will go as far west as Vancouver and Victoria and will return to England about the end of October.

LIVELY POLITICS IN MARYLAND

Baltimore, Md., Aug. 8.—Three weeks from today both the Democrats and Republicans of Maryland will hold their primaries for the nomination of candidates for governor and other State officers to be voted for at the fall election. With the near approach of the primaries the contest for places on the tickets have intensified to a noticeable degree and from now on Maryland is likely to see one of the most spirited campaigns in some years.

The liveliest fight is that for the place and they are putting up a veritable "battle royal" for the honor. Governor Austin L. Crothers is a hero two who are ambitious to head the ticket are Blair Lee, a member of the State senate, and Arthur P. German, also a State senator and a son of the late United States Senator German. The Republican ticket probably will be headed by either State Chairman John B. Hanna or Internal Revenue Collector Philip Lee Goldsborough.

UNKNOWN COWARD SAW BOY DROWNED

Cobalt, Ont., Aug. 9.—While Wilfred the thirteen year old son of Fred Lefebvre, Temiskaming and Northern Ontario constable, was drowning in Lake Temiskaming at Hailbury yesterday afternoon, an unknown man stood on the dock nearby laughing at the boy's efforts to help himself and offered no help.

WESTMORLAND TORIES ARE IN BAD PLIGHT

Sackville, N. B., Aug. 9.—The Conservatives of Westmorland county met here today for purpose of selecting a candidate to be their standard bearer in the approaching election. Considering the hot weather and busy season the attendance was good. The convention opened with P. G. Mahoney, Melrose, in the chair. A committee was appointed to select a candidate, and then began the tug-of-war. Following out the Biblical story, they all, with one consent began to make excuses. First Robert W. Hewson, barrister of Moncton, was offered the nomination, then Frank B. Black, Sackville, was the choice, but he followed the example of Mr. Hewson and declined. An effort was made to induce P. G. Mahoney to run but there was still nothing doing.

At the last matter narrowed down to three men, Dr. O. B. Price, Moncton; O. Lionel Hanington, Dochester, and Medley G. Siddall, Port Elgin. After considerable talk and worry a vote was taken and resulted as follows: Medley G. Siddall 89; C. L. Hanington, 33; Dr. Price, 12. It was moved by C. L. Hanington and seconded by Dr. Price that the nomination be made unanimous and the motion carried amidst much applause.

The search for a candidate had been a strenuous one and all were relieved that a victim had been secured at last during the afternoon speeches were made by F. B. Black, Dr. Price, M. G. Siddall and R. W. Hewson.

It is admitted here that Hon. H. R. Emmerson, who will undoubtedly be nominated by the Liberals tomorrow, is absolutely sure of his election. One Conservative said: "If I was as sure of heaven as Emmerson is to be elected I would do no more praying." Another said: "Emmerson is certainly the best representative that Westmorland ever had and nominating a candidate to oppose him is only a formality which affords young Siddall an opportunity to get himself advertised over the country."

HAZEN GOVERNMENT CAUSING THE DELAY

St. John, Aug. 9.—Asked about the Valley Railway situation, Hon. Mr. Pugsley said: "I have nothing new to report beyond the fact that, at a conference recently held in Ottawa, between Hon. Mr. Flemming, acting premier of New Brunswick, and one of his colleagues and the minister of railways and myself at which the president of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company and his solicitor were present, draft contracts were agreed to which were entirely satisfactory to the company and under which, the president stated, they would be prepared to proceed with the work."

"The contracts provide for construction of a first class line which is to be practically up to the standard of the Transcontinental in New Brunswick and to be operated by the I. C. R. as the different sections are completed."

"At the request of the provincial government, action on the part of the minister of railways was delayed until the company submitted some further information desired by Mr. Flemming. Since that time I have had no communication from the provincial government on the subject and I do not know whether the required information has yet been furnished."

In reply to a question as to how the railway would reach St. John, Hon. Mr. Pugsley said: "By the agreement arrived at, it will follow the west side of the river as far as the Mistake, so called, near Evandale will there cross to the east side and reach the Kennebecasis by means of a valley and cross that river at or near Ferry Point and then enter St. John by an independent line or connect with the I. C. R. at Rothesay, and use the I. C. R. tracks to the city."

Toronto, Aug. 8.—As a result of the abrupt cancellation of the aviation meet, Mr. E. E. W. Wilcox the chief promoter of the meet, has decided to institute proceedings for substantial damages against the McCurdy-Willard Aeroplane Company of New York.

EAGLES TO SEE "ROARING CAMP"

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 9.—Advises being received daily by the local committee in charge of arrangements indicate that close to 100,000 delegates and visitors will flock to San Francisco during the last week of this month for the national convention of Eagles. The committee estimates that at least 75 per cent. of the 2,000 local branches of the order scattered over the country will be represented. An entire floor of the St. Francis Hotel has been reserved for the use of the grand president, Senator Grady of New York, and the other national officers. The visitors will be handsomely entertained. The "Roaring Camp" show, which will be one of the most interesting and novel features of the entertainment programme, typifying San Francisco in the days of the gold rush, is now under preparation.

LIBERAL CAMPAIGN OPENED AT CHIPMAN

Chipman, Aug. 9.—The first gun in the election campaign in Queens-Dumfries was fired yesterday afternoon at Chipman (N. B.), when a rousing liberal meeting was held and addresses were given by Colonel McLean, Hon. C. W. Robinson, M. P. P., and A. B. Copp, M. P. P. Fully 1,500 people gathered in a large tent which had been pitched in a field. A strong representation from Northfield, Canning, and other parts were in the gathering. A special train from Minto brought a large delegation to attend the meeting.

Senator King presided, and the first address was given by Hon. C. W. Robinson, who was followed by Colonel McLean, and Mr. Copp. All speakers laid stress on the importance of the reciprocity agreement which has been made with the United States and the great advantage of industry in this province as a result of the trade pact. The hearty reception with which the speakers' reference to reciprocity met showed an overwhelming sentiment in favor of the agreement. The general tone of the meeting was most enthusiastic and it was regarded by all as a most auspicious opening of the contest in that section of the constituency.

Cheers for Col. McLean and Sir Wilfrid Laurier were given with a will at the close. During the afternoon several elections were played in fine style by the band of the 74th Regiment.

Today Col. McLean and Mr. Copp will attend a Foresters' picnic at the Range where they have been invited to speak. Hon. Mr. Robinson returned to Moncton last evening. The Queens-Dumfries Liberal nominating convention will be held in a few days at Gagetown.

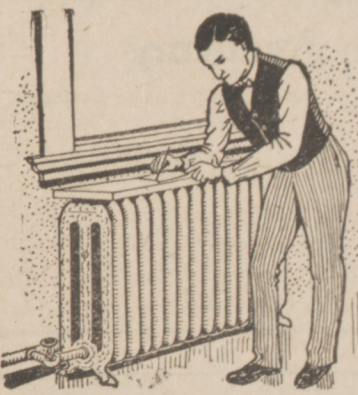
