## UHLAN MADE GREAT PERFORMANCE AT NORTH RANDALL

Gordon Todd, with Geers up, Lost 2.22 Trot—Hal B. Jr. also among Losers

Cleveland, Aug. 9.—With the flags flying straight, indicating the stiff breeze that was blowing, and out in third-horse position, Uhlán, world's champion trotting gelding and the wonder of all ages, according to the opinion of many horsemen, trotted a mile in two minutes flat, in an effort to beat 2:01 to wagon, at North Randall yesterday afternoon.

C. K. G. Billings, owner of the great black gelding, piloted the horse while "Doc" Tanner drove a runner at his side. While the official time for this performance is 2:00, many good timers caught the mile in 1:59 4-5.

## GREAT PERFORMANCE.

Just to show by comparison how great a feat Uhlán accomplished today, the pacers in the 2:05 class could not do the middle half in better than 2:00 1/2 where Uhlán stepped the distance in 1:00 1/2. Of course when the pacers went the wind was probably a little stronger than when Uhlán performed, but the difference was slight. In the other heats these pacers stepped from the quarter to the three-quarters in 1:04, 1:06 1/2. Uhlán stepped the first quarter in 29 1/2, the second quarter in 30 1/2, the third quarter in 30 1/2, and the final quarter in 30 seconds flat.

Today's program provided an excellent lot of racing. In three of the four events favorites were trodden under, and C the Limit, the only surviving first choice, escaped a beating by the narrowest of margins.

## HAL B., JR., LOST.

In the 2:05 pace the Canadian horse Hal B., Jr., in a scintillating performance, landed the first heat in 2:03 flat. He lost the second heat to C the Limit, but in the third round the little black horse was the victim of racing luck, or he probably would have won the race.

In the first race of the day the Geers entry, Gordon Todd, was figured a sure winner, but the Todd horse was lame and could not keep on his stride. Gordon Todd drew the pole at the get-away and was quickly overhauled by Lee Wilson, who lapped the favorite at the turn.

When Geers called upon Gordon Todd for a brush in the stretch, the favorite responded feebly, but at the distance he was carried off his feet by the fast-trotting Lee Wilson. The heat was in 2:10 1/2, Lee Wilson having trotted the final quarter in 30 1/2. There was nothing to it in the third heat but Lee Wilson. The former plow horse, a la R. T. C., trotted a beautiful race and reduced his record of 2:29 1/2 to 2:10 1/2.

The contest in the Forest City stake for 2:08 pacers resulted in a victory for the Oklahoma sidewheeler Sunny Jim. Ginger won the opening heat in 2:05 1/2. In the next heat Ginger again led to the half, but gradually Shively moved Sunny Jim to the front and in the stretch overhauled Ginger and won by two lengths in 2:06 1/2. The third heat was a repetition of the second, in that Ginger set the pace and Sunny Jim outdistanced him.

In the second race Capt. George was picked to win, but he suffered practically the same fate as Twinkling Dan, making it a bad day for the Murphy stable.
