that our own civilization will be immune to like influences? Is there any reason to doubt that in the future as in the past, the greatness of a nation ran only be assured by being founded upon the character and ideals of its people?

DANGER OF WEALTH IN A FEW HANDS

"I have the opportunity merely to hint at problems that are common to the English speaking Democrats. There are others which may be regarded as in some sense peculiar to the United States and Canada. I do not pretend to deal with those but merely to suggest them. Both countries are endowed with enormous and abundant resources. The tendency is naturally toward wastefulness and prodigality.

"On the other hand, the vast accumulation of wealth in the hands of a few men confronts us with the possibility that the great national resources may pass into the hands of an oligarchy of wealth and may be used for the oppression rather than for the benefit of the people. We in Canada are not insensible to these dangers and in this as in other respects we hope to profit by your experiences.

"Our natural resources have not been very appreciably diminished by waste but we are approaching the danger line and already we have taken precautions."

NO ANTI-AMERICAN FEELING.

"It is fitting that I should not close without some reference to the recent political developments in my country. You may possibly have heard of the recent campaign in Canada and of its results. Permit me to assure you that the result was not due in any sense or in any respect to a spirit of unfriendliness to this great country. Admitted facts demonstrate with certainty that no such spirit exists.

"From 1878 to 1897 Canada had placed and kept upon her statute books a standing offer to the United States of reciprocity in natural products. During all that period you declined to entertain the offer and no Canadian could deny your perfect and absolute right to take that course, believing, as you did, that it was in the interest of your people. "In the early days of our development and progress we imagined that we were almost completely dependent upon your markets; and when the reciprocity treaty of 1854 was renounced in 1866 a feeling of despair prevailed in some parts of our country. That feeling has since passed away, never to return. For thirty years and more we have followed certain national ideas and policies which we firmly intend to pursue and continue in the future.

"We reached the conclusion that the recent proposals were inconsistent with those ideals and policies. Moreover, we entirely disbelieve in the framing of tariffs by diplomatic methods.

thods. That system has been tested between different states under the British flag, notably in South Africa, and the results have been far from satisfactory.

"May I be permitted to express my personal conviction that in the interests of good relations between our countries, it is better that each should maintain and preserve unhampered to the fullest extent, the control of its own fiscal policy. And as surely good relations between the two countries do not depend upon the existence of any particular form of reciprocal trade relations. No press, however jaundiced, can lead me to accept any such conclusion.

WANTS 'TRUCK WITH THE YANKEES.'

"I ask you to believe that the recent decision did not proceed from any desire to refuse your trade. During the past ten years we have bought your products to the amount of \$1,784,000,000, and sold to you our own products to the amount of \$869,000,000, leaving in your favor a trade balance of \$915,000,000. In other words, one Canadian buys from you as much as twenty-six of your citizens do from us.

"Last year we imported from the United States commodities to the amount of \$285,000,000, and in the same year we sold to you our products to the value of \$104,000,000 only. Great Britain has paid to us during the past ten years a trade balance of \$505,000,000, which has gone to pay in part the balance which you hold against us. Our producers are met at your customs house with an average tariff of about 43 per cent. We meet you with an average tariff of less than twenty-six per cent. Our average duties against imports from the United States are less than our average duties on imports from Great Britain. I trust that this brief summary will convince you that Canada has not discriminated against her good neighbor.

"Let me say, in conclusion, that I recognize the duty of Canada is to become more and more a bond of good will and friendship between this great republic and our empire. It may well be said that for the cause of kinship and neighborliness Canada owes this to you, but I would rather put it on this higher ground, that for the cause of Christianity and civilization she owes it to herself. If I may recall some words that come to me from the memories of my boyhood days let me say this in conclusion: "As long as the rivers shall flow to the ocean, as long as the mountains shall cast their shadows across the valleys, as long as the heavens shall nourish the stars, let good will, friendship and peace endure between these two great kindred nations."

Hon. James Bryce, British ambassador at Washington, followed with an able address, in which he referred to the good feeling existing between the American and British people.

PARIS DRESSMAKER COLLECTED HER BILL

Paris, Dec. 9.—A Paris dressmaker who has an unpaid bill of \$150 against an inmate of the Sultan Abdul Hamid's harem, placed an embargo to day on the money realized by the sale of the deposed ruler's jewels, which now amounts to some \$1,400,000. The Turkish embassy promptly settled the bill and the embargo was removed.

GOT HIS GAME

A handsome moosehead secured by Dr. L. W. Walker of Glasgow at Charles B. Loves Camps on Rocky Brook, arrived by the L. C. R. train today. It had a spread of fifty inches and twenty-six points. A nice caribou head was also included. The doctor will remain in the woods until Christmas.

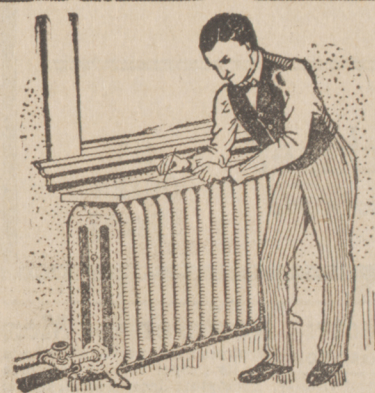
