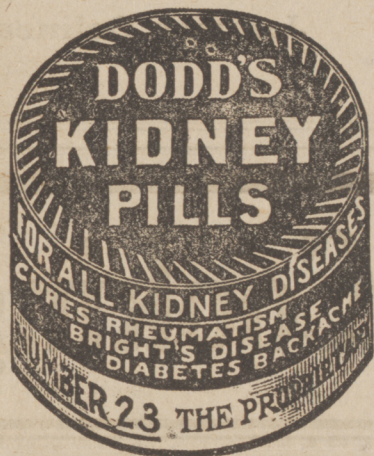
children, our grandchildren and great-grandchildren have been baptized by him. It seems impossible to think of the Church of St. James the Apostle apart from Canon Ellegood, so closely has his life been identified with it. Everywhere he carried with him the spirit of cheerfulness and happiness, for optimism was the dominant note of his life. Not only is this church bereaved, but the whole Canadian church, indeed the Holy Catholic church, has lost one of her brightest ornaments and most worthy priests. His life has been simply lived and he leaves an example that we ought all to strive to emulate.

The speaker also referred to his own personal relations with the deceased canon and of the fact that he had entered into rest on Advent Sunday.

AT GRACE CHURCH.

Yesterday morning at Grace church, Point St. Charles, the Venerable Archdeacon Ker announced the demise of the late Canon Ellegood, and briefly referred to the deceased's connection with Point St. Charles long before his (the speaker's). Canon Ellegood, he said, had done a great deal of excellent work for Grace church, and was one of the pioneers of the institution of the Anglican service in that portion of the city. He was a good man, and a good man had gone home to his rest.

WANT TO GRAB THE TORONTO RAILWAY.

Toronto, Dec. 5.—Steps were taken at the meeting of the City Council yesterday to send a by-law to the people calling for the expropriation of the Toronto Railway Company for arbitration.

The motion was carried, and the first and second readings of the by-law also were passed, but lack of a two-thirds majority prevented the third reading of the bill. This probably will come up at a special meeting which may be held on Wednesday.

At the next discussion a single majority can carry it.

The tube system, to run from the corner of Bay and Front Streets, northerly to St. Clair Avenue and Yonge Street, to cost \$5,386,870, will come before the voters on January 1st.

Rather a gloomy view of C.P.R. stock is taken by the Wall Street Journal in answer to an investor, who asks whether he should buy it:

"Buying a railroad stock at a price within a few points of the highest it ever made partakes more of speculation than investment."

Canadian Pacific sold at 247 in July this year, in

August 20 points lower, and in September at 218. It has not reacted to the low price of 1910, and has been only 11 points below the high price of 1910, but the stock suffered considerable reactions in earlier years as well as sharp advances. The company is a very wealthy one, and it is our opinion that the stock is likely to work higher in time than the present price.

"It would take an increase in the regular rate of 12 per cent., or substantial 'rights' in connection with new stock issues, to make a return equal to the basis on which good seasonable dividend payers, such as Atchison, Great Northern and Northern Pacific, are selling. Even Pennsylvania is selling at a price to yield 4.87 per cent."
