### A STRONG FINISH COUNTS

### A PROMPT CLOSING

### THE JUDGES

They will take over the ballot box, count and tabulate the votes found in the box which have been cast during Friday and Saturday, add them to the scores of the candidates which appear in Friday's issue of The Mail, and announce the winners. Names of the judges will be published in tomorrow's issue.

### VOTE EARLY

As the last day of every contest is always a busy one, candidates are requested to co-operate with the office force by voting early thus avoiding a rush and delay at the last. The manager of the tour department will make his last count of votes at 9 o'clock on Thursday evening, result of which will appear in Friday's issue of The Mail.

All subscriptions arriving on Friday and Saturday will be deposited in the ballot box, there to remain until taken out by the judges on the last night of the contest. To make it easy for the contest department, out-of-town candidates should begin sending in their subscriptions on Thursday and Friday, leaving only their last collections for Saturday, and those sent on Saturday should be timed to reach this office not later than the eight p.m. mail. It will be well for all those living at a distance to visit Fredericton in person on Saturday if possible, to cast their last ballots. Those living in Fredericton will confer a favor on this department if they will also cast the bulk of their subscriptions on Friday night, Saturday morning or afternoon, leaving only their last collections for Saturday night. As the voting will be in secret and no one can possibly learn how many votes another has cast, there will positively be no advantage in holding back until the last.

Vote early and often if you like—but by all means vote early, and do not delay the count.

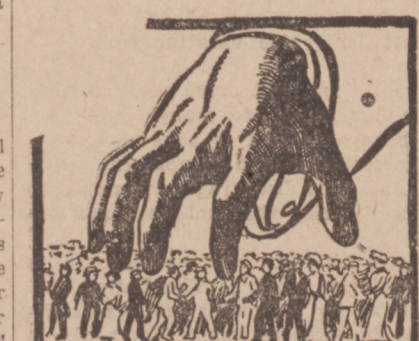
