Thanksgiving week will find the trotting horse men of the country in close touch with New York. Hundreds of them will be in that city sometime between now and Saturday night, while those who do not go will centre their thoughts there. The attraction is the 17th annual "Old Glory" sale.

This is the last Fall sale that will be held in Madison sq. Garden, and like the horse show of last week it promises to be one of the most successful that the famous building has ever seen. More than 830 horses have been catalogued and taken as a whole, they are a splendid lot.

ATTRACTIVE YOUNGSTERS

Ready-to-race material, as for a number of years is rather scarce but no "Old Glory" of the past has had so many attractive youngsters. Record horses are there in plenty, some 230 having marks which entitle them to places in the standard list. The number of producing sires is unusually large. Breeders looking for mares will find many with pedigrees and individuality that make them desirable.

Among the offerings there appears to be no really sensational animal, that is one that will command a fancy price, but there are so many useful ones that the average price for the sale should be up to the best figures of recent years. New York is not a good market for useless horses a fact that sellers have apparently become aware of.

Mainsheet, 2.05; Kinney Lou, 2.07; Direct Hal, 2.04; Ess H. Kay, 2.00; Custer 2.10, Nico II 2.21, Jack McKerron 2.07, Allwood, 2.09; Baron McKinney 2.10, Foros 2.22 are among the leading stallions to be offered for stud purposes. Direct Hal is almost at the head of the list of pacing sires and naturally there is much interest as to the value the public will set on a horse who gets pacers only.

BRANHAM BAUGHMAN IN LIST

Ess H. Kay, while still a young

horse and capable of beating 2.00, should bring a price that will put him out of the reach of men looking for a free-for-all pacer. A royalty, bred horse and already a producing sire, having a 3-year-old trotter with a record of 2.20 to his credit, he looks to be one of the most promising young sires in sight.

New England is sending over many horses, the star being Branham Baughman, 2.05, from the Cox stable. Few will dispute the claim of his owners that this son of Gambetta Wilkes is the best 2.05 pacer before the public. Sound and only 6 years old, with ability to race all the afternoon around 2.05, he is the most valuable fast record pacer in sight for the grand circuit next year. He races clean limbed, and in condition is one of the handsomest stallions in the country. He has raced two years down the big line, never missing an engagement, and this past season won more money by several thousand dollars than any other pacer.

COX'S OFFERINGS

Cox is also selling Ernest, 2.05; Sara Ann Patch, 2.06; Asa Wilkes, 2.07; Check Hook, 2.14; and several well-bred youngsters. Sara Ann Patch is a much better racing prospect than many who have never seen her perform in high society believe her to be.

She is a mud lark for sure, and the way she can tramp on rough footing tells that on the speedway she would be almost unbeatable. She needs no extra rigging of any sort and is the easiest thing in the world to drive. Ernest is a whirlwind and can pace a half better than a minute without hiccups. Asa Wilkes will probably go to some one looking for a free-for-all horse to race over the half-mile tracks, and this remarkable little stallion will be hard to trim on the twice arounds. On the grand circuit he did not have a fair chance, being asked to meet The Abbe and the unbeaten Walter W before he was up to racing the clip they could step.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate and erect a house worth \$300.00.
